\section*{BANK DEBITS TO INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS}

Amount of Cheques Charged against Bank Accounts at the Clearing House Centres, February, 1930

Financial transfers in the form of bank debits to individual accounts at the clearing house centres of Canada amounted to \(\$ 2,815,000,000\) during February. After seasonal adjustment, the gain over January was 3.2 p.c. Owing to reduction in business operations and in speculation as compared with the high levels of the same month in 1929, the decline in debits in the long-term comparison was \(27.8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\). The decrease in the cumulative total for the first two months of 1930 from the same period of 1929 was about \(20 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\). The total for the two months in the three centres of Quebec province was 26 p.c. Iess than in the same months of last year. Ontario showed a decline of 22 p.c. and British Columbia was down 16.6 p.c. The decline in the Maritime Provinces was 10 p.c., while in the Prairie Provinces the recession was only 5.5 p.c.

\section*{Comparison with February, 1929}

Declines were general in the three clearing centres of the Maritime Provinces during February from the same month of last year. The net result was a decline of 11.4 p.c. in the aggregate for the reporting cintres of these provinces.

Debits in the three centres of Quebec in February were \(\$ 942,000,000\), a decline of 20.7 p.c. from the same month of 1929. Declines wero general in the three centres, Montreal showing a deciline of \(21.6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\).

Among the 12 centres of Ontario, four only, Ottawa, windsor, Peterborough and Sarnia, showed an increase in Fobruary. The decline in Toronto was 19 p.c., while the aggregate for the provinco was down 21 p.c.

Edmonton and Lethbridge were the only centros in the Prairio Provinces showing a gain in Fobruary. The rucossion in winnipog was only 1 p.c. and tha net result for the three provinces was a decling of \(1.4 \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{c}\).

Declines wore general in tho three reporting centres in British Columbia. The decrease in Vancouver was \(21.7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\)., while tho aggregate for tho threo centres of the province was down \(19.6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\).

The gain in the Dominion total during February over January, 1930, after seasonal adjustment, was \(3.2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\). The increase in Winnipeg after the usual adjustment was 12.5 p.c. Montreal showed a decline of \(6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\)., and the drop in Toronto was \(14 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}\). The debits in Vancouver, after seasonal adjustment, were nearly maintained at the level of the preceding month.
