## COMMERCLAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN FEBRUARY, 1233

The number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, showed in February, 1933 a decline from the figure for February, 1932 while the liabilities of the assignors showed a small increase. Commercial failures numbered 214 in February, 1933, as compared with 221 in February, 1932, and 216 in Jonuary, 1933. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to $\$ 3.947,202$, as compared with $\$ 4,049,929$ in January, 1933, showed a slight decline; when compared with $\$ 3,650,728$ in February, 1932, a slight increase is noted.

## COMMRCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces.- In the month under review, there were 14 assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 11 in January, 1933, and 12 in February, 1932. The liabilities of the assignors in February, 1933, were about $\$ 235,000$.

Quebec.- Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec during February, 1933. numbered 85 as against 90 in January, 1933, and 92 in February, 1932. The liabilities were approximately $\$ 1,508,000$. Of these 85 failures, 48 with liabilities of about $\$ 986,000$ were in the city of Montreal.

Ontario.- In Ontario, the failures numbered 80, as compared with 79 in January, 1933, and 79 in February, 1932. The liabilities aggregated about $\$ 1,380,000$. In the city of Toronto, there were 20 failures with liabilities of about $\$ 668,000$.

Prairte Provinces.- In the three Prairie Provinces, failures increased from 27 in January, 1933, to 29 in February, 1933, and may be compared with 30 in February, 1932. The liabilities totalled $\$ 699,000$ principally in Manitoba. There were 6 failures in the city of Winnipeg with liabilities of about $\$ 361,000$.

British Columbia.- In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 6 as compared with 9 in January, 1933, and 8 in February, 1932. In the city of Vancouver there were 2 failures with liabilities of about $\$ 90,000$.

## FAIIURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade.- Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 117 assigning in February, 1933, as compared with 121 in January, 1933, and 104 in February, 1932. Of the 117 concerns assigning, 20 were general stores, 13 groceries, 7 confectionery, 7 fish and meat, 5 boots and shoes, 9 dry goods, 10 clothing, 3 fumiture, 6 hardware and 5 drugs and chemicals.

Manufactures.- Manufacturing establishments to the number of 37 assigned in February, 1933, as compared with 38 in January, 1933, and 48 in February, 1932. The 37 included 3 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 4 in fur and leather, 9 in clothing and 5 in lumber and its manufactured products.

Agriculture.- Agriculturists assigning in February, 1933, numbered 11, as compared with 10 in Jonunry, 1933, and 18 in February, 1932. A large decrease is noted when compared with the same month of the previous year.

Services.- In services the failures numbered 23 as compared with 22 in January, 1933, and 27 in Tebruary, 1932. A considerable decrease is noted in this latter more significant comparison.

Miscellaneous.- There were 3 failures in construction, 2 in transportation and public utilities and In finance.

## CUMULATIVE TWO MONTHS' TOTAL OF FAI UURES AND LIABILITIES

The cumalative total of commercial fllilures for the first two months of 1933 was 430 , as compared with 459, 428 and 466 for the same periods of 1932, 1931 and 1930, respectively. The total failures in trade in the first two months of 1933 were 236, as compared with 225, 212 and 248 for the same periods of 1932,1931 and 1930. In manufactures, 75 failures in the elapsed period of 1933 may be compared with 92,84 and 94 in the same periods of the three preceding years. The defaulted liabilities for the first two months of 1933 were $\$ 7,997,131$ as ednpared with $\$ 7,811,371, \$ 8,760,380$ and $\$ 12,781,606$ for the same periods of 1932, 1931 and 1930.
