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COMMERCIAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN MAY, 1933

As compared with May, 1932, a decrease in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in May, 1933. The liabilities of the assignors also showed a decrease. Commercial failures numbered 175 in May, 1933, as compared with 204 in the same month of the previous year and 192 in April, 1933. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to \$2,616,800 as compared with \$3,380,672 in April, 1933, showed a decrease; when compared with \$3,148,067 in May, 1932, a considerable decrease is again noted.

Commercial Failures by Areas

Maritime Provinces.- In the month under review, there were 9 assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 15 in April, 1933, and 14 in May, 1932. The liabilities were about \$83,000.

Quebec.- Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec during May, 1933, numbered 75 as against 75 in April, 1933, and 80 in May, 1932. The liabilities were approximately \$1,148,000. Of these 75 failures, 40 with liabilities of about \$603,000 were in the city of Montreal.

Ontario.- In Ontario, the failures numbered 70 as compared with 68 in April, 1933, and 79 in May, 1932. Liabilities aggregated about \$1,005,000. In the city of Toronto, there were 20 failures with liabilities in the neighbourhood of \$400,000.

Prairie Provinces.- In the three Prairie Provinces, failures numbered 17 as compared with 20 in April, 1933, and 20 in May, 1932. The liabilities were approximately \$213,000. There were 2 failures in the city of Winnipeg with liabilities totalling \$58,000.

British Columbia.- In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 4 as compared with 6 in April, 1933, and 11 in May, 1932. The liabilities were approximately \$168,000. There was 1 failure in Vancouver with liabilities of about \$3,000.

Commercial Failures by Branches of Business

Trade.- Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 87 assigning in May, 1933, as compared with 100 in April, 1933, and 94 in May, 1932. Of these concerns, 14 were general stores, 9 grocery, 5 confectionery, 5 fish and meat, 6 boots and shoes, 5 dry goods, 8 clothing, 3 furniture, 3 books and stationery, 4 electric apparatus, 4 automobile and 2 jewelry.

Manufactures.- Manufacturing establishments to the number of 35 assigned in May, 1933, as against 37 in April, 1933, and 47 in May, 1932. The 35 included 5 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 3 in animal foods, 5 in fur and leather goods, 7 in lumber and its manufactured products and 2 in non-ferrous metals.

Agriculture.- Agriculturists assigning in May, 1933, numbered 8 as compared with 6 in April, 1933, and 11 in May, 1932.

Services.- In services, the failures numbered 21 as compared with 19 in April, 1933, and 21 in May, 1932.

Miscellaneous.- There were 3 failures in transportation and 5 in construction.

Cumulative Five Months' Total of Failures and Liabilities

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first five months of 1933 was 981, as compared with 1,061, 944 and 1,027 for the same periods of 1932, 1931 and 1930, respectively. The total failures in trade for the first five months of 1933 were 523, as compared with 499, 475 and 527, respectively, for the same periods of the three preceding years. The defaulted liabilities for the first five months of 1933 were \$17,027,069 as compared with \$17,427,169 in the same period of 1932 and \$17,996,421 and \$24,002,531 for the same periods of 1931 and 1930, respectively.
