

COMMERCIAL FAILURES FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 1933

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first six months of 1933, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding up Acts, was 1,139 as compared with,1,237, 1,109 and 1,205 for the same period of 1932, 1931 and 1930, respectively. The defaulted liabilities for the first half of 1933 were \$19,355,795 as compared with \$21,221,450, \$22,853,013 and \$26,408,325 respectively for the same periods of the three preceding years. Thus defaulted liabilities showed a considerable decrease when compared with the same period of 1932, 1931 and 1930, and the number of commercial failures showed a decline as compared with the same period of 1932.

Commercial failures in trade for the first six months of 1933 were 604 as compared with 583,556 and 611 for the same periods of 1932, 1931 and 1930 respectively. In manufactures, there were 216 in 1933 as against 248,238 and 246 for the corresponding period of the three preceding years. Agricultural failures decreased from 98 in the first half of 1932 to 48 for the same period of 1933 and may be compared with 50 and 55 for the same period of 1931 and 1930. The number of general stores failing in the first six months of 1933 was 94, as compared with 75 for the corresponding period of 1932. Fiftyeight grocery stores failed in the first half of 1933 as against 43 for the same period of 1932. There were 34 failures in fish and meat stores, 32 in boots and shoes, 45 in dry goods, 27 in drugs and chemicals and 21 in jewelry.

Statistical Tables - The commercial failures in each month from January 1930, are given by provinces in Table 1, while Table 2 furnishes statistics of commercial failures by branches of business by months from January 1930 to June 1933. The detailed figures of failures during June 1933 are shown by provinces and branches of business in Table 3 and

for the first six months of the year in Table 4. The assets and liabilities of those failing during June 1933 and during the first half of 1933 are shown by provinces in Tables 5 and 6 respectively.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN JUNE, 1933.

A decrease in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in June, 1933, as compared with June, 1932, while the liabilities of the assignors also showed a decrease. Commercial failures numbered 158, as compared with 179 in the same month of the previous year, and 175 in May, 1933. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to \$2,338,726 as compared with \$2,616,800 in May, 1933, showed a decrease; when compared with \$3,794,281 in June, 1932, a decrease is also noted.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. In the month under review, there were 6 assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 9 in May, 1933 and 18 in June, 1932. A very marked decrease is noted in this latter more significant comparison. The liabilities in June, 1933, were about \$54,000.

Quebec. - Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec, during June, 1933, numbered 70, as against 75 in May 1933, and 64 in June, 1932. The liabilities were approximately \$1,085,000, Of these 70 failures, 37 occurred in the city of Montreal, where the estimated liabilities were about \$644,000.

Ontario. In Ontario, the failures numbered 67 as against 70 in May, 1933, and 70 in June, 1932, a slight decrease being noted in both comparisons. Liabilities aggregated about \$1,067,000. In the city of Toronto, there were 14 assignments with liabilities of about \$250,000.

Prairie Provinces. - In the three Prairie Provinces, failures decreased from 17 in May. 1933, to 9 in June, 1933 and May be compared with 17 in June, 1932. Liabilities were in the neighborhood of \$88,000, principally in Saskatchewan. There were 2 failures in the city of Winnipeg, with liabilities of about \$13,000.

British Columbia. In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 6 as compared with 4 in May, 1933, and 10 in June, 1932. The liabilities were about \$44,000. of these 6 failures, 2 were in the city of Vancouver, with liabilities of approximately \$12,000.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 81 assigning in June, 1933, as compared with 87 in May, 1933, and 84 in June, 1932. Of these concerns, 14 were general stores, 9 grocery, 4 confectionery, 6 fish and meat, 3 boots and shoes, 5 dry goods, 9 clothing, 3 hardware, 3 jewelry, 2 electric apparatus and 4 drugs and chemicals.

Manufactures. - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 31 assigned in June, 1933, as against 35 in May, 1933, and 36 in June, 1932. The 31 included 5 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 3 in fur and leather goods, 6 in clothing, 3 in lumber and its manufactured products, and 2 in non-metallic minerals.

Agriculture. Agriculturists assigning in June, 1933, numbered 3 as compared with 8 in May, 1933, and 11 in June, 1932.


Services. - In services, the failures aggregated 20 as compared with 21 in May, 1933, and 21 in June, 1932.

Miscellaneous. - There were 6 failures in construction, 1 in mining, 3 in transportation, and 1 in finance.




