COMMERCIAL FAILURES FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 1935

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first six months of 1935, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, was 678 as compared with 821, 1,139 and 1,237 for the same periods of 1934, 1933 and 1932, respectively. The defaulted liabilities for the first half of 1935 were \$8,518,270 as compared with \$13,017,644, \$19,355,795 and \$21,221,450, respectively, for the same periods of the three preceding years. Thus defaulted liabilities showed a considerable decrease when compared with the same periods of 1934, 1933 and 1932, while the number of commercial failures also showed a decline in each of the same comparisons.



Commercial failures in trade for the first six months of 1935 were 315 as compared with 439, 604 and 583 for the same periods of 1934, 1933 and 1932, respectively. In manufactures, there were 98 in 1935 as against 111, 216 and 248 for the corresponding periods of the three preceding years. Agricultural failures numbered 79 and may be compared with 47,48 and 98 for the same periods of 1934, 1933 and 1932. The number of general stores failing in the first six months of 1935 was 51 as compared with 79 for the corresponding period of 1934. Thirty-eight grocery stores failed in the first half of 1935 as against 67 in the same period of 1934. There were 21 failures in fish and meat stores, 23 in dry goods, 32 in clothing and 12 in drugs and chemicals.



DOMMERCIAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN JUNE, 1935.

A slight decrease in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in June, 1935, as compared with June 1934, while the liabilities of the assignors also showed a decrease. Commercial failures numbered 109 in June, 1935, as compared with 115 in the same month of the previous year, and 101 in May, 1935. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting in June, 1935, to \$1.878,507, showed a decrease when compared with \$2,420,939 in June, 1934, and an increase when compared with \$1,295,406 in May, 1935.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. In the month under review, there were 6 assignments in the Maritime Provinces as compared with 3 in May, 1935, and 7 in June, 1934. The liabilities were about \$55,000.

Quebec. - Commercial failures in the province of Quebec during June, 1935, numbered 50, as against 52 in May, 1935, and 58 in June, 1934. The liabilities were approximately \$708,000. Of these 50 failures, 28, with liabilities of about \$403,000, took place in the city of Montreal.

Ontario. In Ontario, the failures numbered 32 as compared with 30 in May, 1935, and 34 in June, 1934. The liabilities were about \$902,000. In the city of Toronto, there were 10 failures with liabilities of about \$648,000.

Prairie Provinces. In the three Prairie Provinces, failures increased from 12 in May, 1935, to 19 in June, 1935, and may be compared with 7 in June, 1934. The liabilities totalled \$160,000. There were 2 failures in the city of Winnipeg with liabilities of about \$35,000.

British Columbia. - In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 2 as compared with 3 in May, 1935 and 9 in June, 1934. The liabilities were abour \$53,000.

FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 47 assigning in June, 1935, as compared with 43 in May, 1935, and 68 in June, 1934. A decided decrease is noted when compared with the same month of last year. Of the 47 assigning in June, 1935, 8 were general stores, 3 groceries, 2 confectionery, 3 fish and meat, 3 dry goods, 5 clothing, 3 hardware, 3 coal and wood and 1 drugs and chemicals.

<u>Manufactures.</u>— Manufacturing establishments to the number of 16 assigned in June, 1935, as compared with 15 in May, 1935, and 13 in June, 1934. The 16 included 3 engaged in lumber and its manufactured products, 2 in textiles, 2 in pulp and paper and 1 in non-ferrous metals.

Agriculture. - Agriculturists assigning in June, 1935, numbered 14 as compared with 14 in May, 1935 and 5 in June, 1934.

Services. - In services, the failures numbered 18 as compared with 15 in May, 1935, and 14 in June, 1934.

Miscellaneous. - There were 5 failures in construction, 2 in mining and 2 in transportation and public facilities.

Statistical Tables.— The commercial failures in each month from January, 1932, are given by provinces in Table 1, while Table 2 furnishes statistics for commercial failures by branches of business by months from January, 1932 to June, 1935. The detailed figures of failures during February, March, April, May and June, 1935, are shown by provinces and branches of business in Tables 3,4,5, 6 and 7, and totals for the first six months of the year in Table 8. The assets and liabilities of those failing during February, March, April and May are shown in Table 9. June, 1935, and the first six months of 1935 are shown by provinces in Tables 10 and 11.
