

## COMMERCIAL FiILITRES IN CAMADA IN SEFTEIGBER, 1935.

A very decided decrease in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Windiwg Up Licts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was recorded in September, 1935 , as compared with September, 1934, while the liabilities of the assignors also showd a pronounced docrease. Commercial failuros numbered 98 as compared with 94 in august, 1935 and 113 in the same month of the proceding year, a decrease of about 13 p.c., veing notod in this lattor comparison. The estimated liabilitics of the assignors, amounting to $\$ 1,564,546$ as compared with $\$ 1,254,522$ in August, 1935, showed an increase; When compared with $1,628,426$ in September, 1934, a decrease is noted.

## COIRERCIAL FiILURES BY AREAS

ilaritime Provinces,- In the month under review, there were 4 assignments in the Faritime Provinces, as compared with 8 in August, 2935 and 2 in September, 1934. The liabjilities in Soptember, 1935 were about $\$ 28,000$.

Quebec, - Commercial failures in the province of Quebec during September, 1935, numbered 50 as against 41 in August, 1935, and 60 in September, 1934. A substantial decrease is noted in the latter more significant comparison. The estimated liabilities were approximately $\$ 987,000$. Of these 50 failures, 36 with estimated liabilities of about $\$ \$ 97,000$ occurred in the city of Montreal.

Ontario, - In Ontario, failures numbered 33 as against 30 in hugust, 1935, and 38 in September, 1934. Liabilities aggregated about $\$ 408,000$. In the city of Toronto, there were 3 assigments with liabilities of about $\$ 52,000$.

Prairie Provinces,- In the three Prairie Provincos, failures decreased from 13 in August, 1935 to 8 in September, 1935, and may be compared with 11 in August, 1934. Liabilities aggregated about $\$ 56,000$.

British Columbia, - In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 3 as against 2 in N. gुust, 1935 , and 2 in September, 1934. The estimated liabilities were $\$ 85,000$. There was 1 failure in the city of vancouver.

## FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 48 assigning in September, 1935, as compared with 43 in August, 1935, and 54 in September, 1934, thus showing a considerable decrease in both comparisons.

Manufacture - Nanufacturing establishments to the number of 11 assigned in September, $\overline{9355}$, as against 10 in August, 1935, and 20 in September, 1934. The 11 included 3 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 2 in lumber and 1 in iron and steel.

Agriculture - Agriculturists assigning in September, 1935, numbered 9 as compared with 17 in August, 1935, and 4 in September of last year.

Services - In services, the failures numbered 13 as compared with 13 in August, 1935, and 18 in September, 1934, a decided decrease boing noted in the latter comparison.

IIscellaneous - Therc were 5 failures in construction, 2 in transportation, 2 in finance and 1 in mining.

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first nine months of 1935 was 980 , as compared with $1,1591,585$ and 1,792 for the same periods of 1934,1933 and 1932, respectively. A considerable decrease is observed as compared with the same periods of the previous years. The total failures in trade in the first nine months of 1935 were 453 as compared with 614, 840 and 872 for the same periods of 1934,1933 and 1932, respectively. In manufacturing, 138 failures in the clapsed period of 1935 mey be comparod with 163,297 and 350 in the same pcriods of the three preceding years. The defaulted liabilitios for tho first nino months of 1935 were $\$ 12,975,483$, as compared with $\$ 17,814,461, \$ 26,347,327$ and $\$ 30,012,931$ in the sume periods of the three preceding years. Thus dofqulted liabilitics showed a marked decrease as compared with the same periods of 1934, 1933 and 1932.

Statistical Tahles - The comercial failures in each month from January, 1931 to September, 1935 are given by provinces in Taile 1, and by branches of business in Table 2. The detailed figures of failures during July, August and September, 1935, are show by provinces and branches of business in Tables 5,4 and 5 , and the nine months: total of failures is shown by provinces and branches of business in Tainle 6 . The assets and liabilities of those failing during July and August, 1935 are shown in Table 7, and September, 1935 is shown by provinces in Table 8, while the nine-month figures are given in Table 9.
