## COMMRCIAL FAILTIES FOR TIES FIRSI SIX MONTES OF 1936

The number of comercial failures in the first half of 1936 was less than in the sarse period of any other year during the tern of observation fros 1921 to the present． The total in the first six nonthe of the present year was 629 against 678 in the sarie口onths of 1935．Significant betiornen＇，was chom over the conditions in the first six months of 1932 then 1,239 fatalities occurred．Records of comsercial failures contribute to the ovidence of economic irmpovanent by tho nejority of appropriate factors．The defaulted liabilitios for the first haif of 1936 wero $\$ 6,511,715$ as cormared with $\$ 5,518,270, \$ 13,017,644$ and $\$ 19,555,795$ respeciively，for the same periods of the three preceding years．Thus defaulted liabsit ties shomed a considerable docrease then capared Wi th the same periods of 1934 ond 2933 and a slight decrease when cormared with the sane period of 1934，while the mwber of liabilitios also showed a decline in each of the sane campari sons．

Commercial failures in trade for the first six months of 1936 were 284 as comm pared with 315,439 and 604 for the sanc periods of 1935,1934 and 1933，respectively． In mamufactures，there were 98 in 1336，as against 98 ， 111 and 216 for the correaponding periods of the three preceding years．Agricultural failmos numbered 65 and may be cam pared with 79， 47 and 48 for the same periods of 1935， 1934 and 1933．The number of general stores failing in the first si：s months of 1936 was 44 as compared with 51 for the corresponding period of 1935．Fifty grocery stores failed in the first half of 1936 as against 38 in the same period of 2935 ．There wore 22 failures in fish and meat stores， 14 in dry goods， 32 in clothing，10，hardware， 1.1 in jowelry and $\bar{b}$ in drugs and chemicals．

## COMURRCIAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN JUNE, 1936.

A slight decrease in the number of assigments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in June, 1936, as compared with June 1935, mhile the liabilities of the assignors also showed a decrease. Commercial failures numbered 100 in June, 1936, as compared with 109 in the same month of the previous year, and 91 in Kay, 19; . The liabilities of the assignors, amounting in June, 1936 to $\$ 1,428,434$, showed a decrease when compared mith $\$ 1,878,507$ in June, 1935, and an increase when compared with $\$ 1,146,019$ in May, 1936.

## COMMMRCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. - In the month under review there were $\mathbb{E}$ assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 3 in May, 1936, and 6 in June, 1935. The liabilities mere about \$77,000.

Quebec. - Comercial failures in the province of Quebec during June, 1936, numbered 37 as against 45 in May, 1936, and 50 in Junc, 1935. The liabilities were approximately $\$ 696,000$. Of these 37 failures, 26 mith liabilities of about $\$ 527,000$ took place in the city of Montreal.

Ontario. - In Ontario the failures numbered 35 as compared with 31 in May, 1936, and 32 in June, 1935. Tie liabilitios were about $\$ 543,000$. In the city of Toronto there were 8, failures with liabilities of about \$112,000

Prairie Provinces. - In the three Prairie Provinces failures increased from 11 in May, 1936 to 15 in June, 1936, and may be compared thith 19 in June, 1935. A decrease is ghom in this latter more significant comparison. The liabilities totalled $\$ 85,000$.

British Columbia. - In British Columbia, comercial failures numbered 5 as compared with 1 in May, 1936 and 2 in June, 1935. The liabilities were about $\$ 36,000$.

## FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 46 asaigning in June, 1936, as compared with 41 in May, 1936, and 47 in June, 1935. of the 46 assigning in June, 1936, 5 were general stores, 13 groceries, 6 fish and meat, 3 boots and shoes, 4 dry goods, 2 clothing and 3 hardware.

Manufactures. - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 11 assigned in June, 1936, as compared wi th 13 in May, 1936, and 16 in June, 1935. A decidod decrease is noted when compared with the same month of last year. The 11 included 2 ongaged in the ranufacture of vegetable foods, 2, textiles, 3 clothing and 2 in luriber and its manufactured products.

Agriculture. - Agriculturists assigning in June, 1936, numbered 12 as compared With 7 in Nay, 1936, and 14 in June, $1935 \circ$

Services. - In scrvices, the failures numbered 17 as compared with 17 in May, 1936 and 18 in June, 1935.

Miscellaneous. - There were 3 failures in nining and 5 in construction.

Statistical Tables. - The comercial failures in each month from January, 1933 are given by provinces in Table 1, while Table 2 furnishes statistics for comercial failures by branches of business by months from January, 1933 to June, 1936. The detailed figures of failures during June, 1936, are ahom by provinces and branches of business in Table 3, and totals for the first six nonthe of the year in Table 5. The assets and liabilities of those failing during June, 1936, and during the first six months of 1936 aro shom by provinces in Tables 5 and 6 .
