COMMERCIAL FAILURES IN THE FIRST QUAPTER OF 1944.

Commercial failures were at a lower level in the first quarter than in the same period of any other year since the statistics were first tabulated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. A downward trend has been in evidence since the early twenties and the number of fatalities at 76 in the first quarter dropped to a new low point. The drop in the period under review constituted the fifth consecutive decline.

The 76 failures in the first quarter compares with 371 in 1939, a decline of nearly 80 p.c. Betterment in this respect has been recorded year by year since the outbreak of hostilities. Assignments of 76 compares with 114 in the same period of last year and 227 in the first quarter of 1942,

Failures in trade decreased from 46 in the first quarter of 1943 to 21 in the first quarter of 1944,, while in manufacturing there was a decrease from 13 in the first quarter of 1943 to 7 in the same period of 1944,

The defaulted liabilities for the first three months of 1944 were decidedly lower at \$1,075,394 as compared with \$2,061,635 for the first quarter of 1943, and may be compared with \$2,035,864 for the same period of 1942.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. - In the period under review, there were no failures in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 2 in the first quarter of 1943, and 7 in the same period of 1942

Quebec. - Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec during the first three months of 1944 numbered 53 as against 73 for the same quarter of 1943 and 139 in 1942. The liabilities were approximately \$885,000.

Ontario, - In Ontario, the failures numbered 15 as compared with 33 and 60 for similar periods in 1943 and 1942. The Liabilities were about \$121,000.

Prairie Provinces. - In the three Prairie Provinces, failures totalled 3 for the first quarter compared with 1 in 1943 and 17 in 1942. The liabilities were about \$8,000.

British Columbia. - In British Columbia, there were 5 failures reported, compared with 5 for the first quarter of 1943 and 4 for the similar period of 1942. Liabilities aggregated about \$61,000.

FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 21 assigning in the first quarter of 1944, as compared with 46 and 112 in the two preceding years respectively.

Manufactures, - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 7 assigned in 1944, as compared with 13 for the same period of 1943 and 35 in 1942.

Services. - In commercial services, failures numbered 26 compared with 26 for the same period of 1943 and 47 for 1942,

Miscellaneous, - There were 6 failures in construction and 3 in transportation.
