COMNERCIAL FAILURES IN THE FIRST QUARTER OF 1945

The number of commeroial failures receded to a new low level in the first quarter of 1945. Failures dropped to 52 compared with 76 in the first three months of last yoar. The number was less than in the first quarter of any other year since 1922 when the statistics were first oollocted. The trend of first quarter feilures has been downord since the end of the first world war, six oonsecutive deolines having been shown sinoe 1939. The largest number for the first quarter during the period of observation was 1,110 recorded for 1923.

## Defaulted Liabilities.

The defalted liabilities dropped to $\$ 994.000$ in the first quarter of the present year compared with $\$ 2,036,000$ in $194 x$. Liabilitios were at a lower point than In the same three months of any year since 1923 when the computation was commenced. A downward trend was shown from 1939 whon defaults amounted to $\$ 3,592,000$.

## Failures by Branohes of Business.

Fellures of trading establishments receded from 21 to 15 in the period under roview. In manufactures the number at 6 was one less than in the same period of 1944 . The decline in servioes of different classes was to 16 from 26 last year, while an increase from 11 to 15 was shown in other activities, mainly construction and transportation.

Commeroial Pailures by Areas.

Three failures occurred in Nova Sootia in the first quarter, while none were reported in the Maritime Provinces during the same period last year. The deoline in Quebe was from 53 to 37 , while only nine were reported for Ontario against 15 one year ago. In the list for the Prairie Provinces, three failures were reoorded in Sasketchewan last year while one was shown in Alberta in the elapsed period of 1945. Two failures occurred in British Columbia against five one year ago.
