Thentatidely Cofy for the period of osservation irom 1922 to the present. A downard trend has been in evidence since the statistics were first collected by the Bureau. The high point of 3,925 was established in 1922 when the brice deflation following the first world war adversely affect: the operations of companios ongnged in trading and productive activities.

Following the iomporefy wor sening of the situntion from 1930 to 1931, a betterment culminated in 1937. The number of foilures was 1,392 in 1939 and a consistent decine was shown during the war period.

The number in 1945 wns 155 compared with 218 in the preceding year. The standing Inst year was only one-ninth of the number in the last peace-time year.

Phile tha number of failures incrensed slightiy in the last quarter of 1945 over the same period of the proceding year, the amount of defaulted liabilities recoded to a still lower point. Nailures were 37 in the last quarter agninst 30 , the liabilities receding from \$755,572 to \$628,991.

Defaulted linbilities also reached n low point lnst year. A considerable deciine was shown from 1944, and the total was less than in afy other yenr since 1923 when the statistics were first collocted. The amount was reduced to \$2,219,942 against $\$ 3,101,435$ in the preceding year. The total in 1939 was $\$ 15,089,461$, while the marimum in the last twenty-two years was reached in 1923 at $\$ 61,617,527$. (See Table $\epsilon$ and Chart 1.)

## Failures by 3ranches of pusiness:-

Failures of trading establishments receded from 46 to 41 in the year under review. In mamactures the runber was 20 , twelve less than in 1944. The decline in services of different classes wats from 74 to 45 , whilo a decreaso fiun 44 to 40 was show in other activities manly construction and transportation. (Sec Tablo 1.)

## Comarcial Fatlures by hons

Three fallures ocourrod in Nova Scotia during 1945 while nono were reported in the Marltime Provincas daring the preceding year. The decline in suebec was from 162 to 119 while only 19 were shown in Ontario ageinst 36 during 1944. In the list for the Prairie Provinces, four failures wero roported in Manitoba against two in the preceding year, tho number in Saskatchewan was reduced from 3 to zero, and the Alberta score was three In 1945, one less than in the preceding year. The net result for the Pralrle Provinces was a reduction in the number of failures from nine to seven. Soven failures occurred in British Columbia reainst 11 in 1944. (See Table 2).
