COMMERCIAL FAILURES IN THE CALENDAR YEAR 1945

The misser of assumercial failures showed further decline in 1945 to a new low point for the period of observation from 1922 to the present. A downward trend has been in evidence since the statistics were first collected by the Bureau. The high point of 3,925 was established in 1922 when the price deflation following the first world war adversely affects: the operations of companies engaged in trading and productive activities.

Following the temporary worsening of the situation from 1930 to 1931, a betterment culminated in 1937. The number of failures was 1,392 in 1939 and a consistent decline was shown during the war period.

The number in 1945 was 155 compared with 218 in the preceding year. The standing last year was only one-ninth of the number in the last peace-time year.

While the number of failures increased slightly in the last quarter of 1945 over the same period of the preceding year, the amount of defaulted liabilities receded to a still lower point. Failures were 37 in the last quarter against 30, the liabilities receding from \$753,572 to \$628,991.

Defaulted limbilities also reached a low point last year. A considerable decline was shown from 1944, and the total was less than in any other year since 1923 when the statistics were first collected. The amount was reduced to \$2,219,942 against \$3,101,435 in the preceding year. The total in 1939 was \$15,089,461, while the maximum in the last twenty-two years was reached in 1923 at \$61,617,527. (See Table 6 and Chart 1.)

Failures by Branches of Business:-

Failures of trading establishments receded from 46 to 41 in the year under review.

In manufactures the number was 20, twelve less than in 1944. The decline in services of different classes was from 74 to 45, while a decrease from 44 to 40 was shown in other activities mainly construction and transportation. (See Table 1.)

Commercial Failures by Areas

Three failures occurred in Nova Scotia during 1945 while none were reported in the Maritime Provinces during the preceding year. The decline in Quebec was from 162 to 119 while only 19 were shown in Ontario against 36 during 1944. In the list for the Prairie Provinces, four failures were reported in Manitoba against two in the preceding year, the number in Saskatchewan was reduced from 3 to zero, and the Alberta score was three in 1945, one less than in the preceding year. The net result for the Prairie Provinces was a reduction in the number of failures from nine to seven. Seven failures occurred in British Columbia against 11 in 1944. (See Table 2).





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
