CANADIAN FAILURES

IN THE SECOND QUARTER OF 1946



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CANADIAN FAILURES UNITE THE PROVISIONS OF BANKRUPTCY AND AINDING UP ACTS IN THE SECOND QUARTER OF 1946.

The number of failures receded to a lower point during the first half of 1946 than in the similar period of any year since the statistics were first collected in 1922. Assignments were reduced to 113 compared with 147, the previous minimum recorded for the first six months of 1945.

The downward trend has persisted since the computation was commenced. As indicated by the inactivity in bankruptcy proceedings, conditions in the current period are obviously favourable for the continuity of business operations. First-half bankruptcies have declined for seven consecutive years.

The highest point in number of failures during the period of observation was reached during the depression following the first world war. Assignments exceeded 1,000 in each of the years from 1929 to 1933, covering the second important depression of the inter-war period.

Bankruptcies in the second quarter numbered 59 being slightly less than in the same period of either 1945 or 1944. Important decline had been shown from 1939 to two years ago, while since that time, the change has been rather insignificant.

The defaulted liabilities which had reached a minimum for the last 24 years during the first half of 1945 showed an increase in the period under review. The total was \$2,511,000 compared with \$1,790,000 in the first six months of 1945. The total for the second quarter rose from \$297,000 to \$1,044,000 in the same comparison. Increased liabilities were recorded in the four provinces reporting failures in the second quarter of both years.

Commercial Failures by Areas. -

During the first six months there was one failure in the Maritime provinces compared with five last year. The situation was improved in Quebec and Ontario, the number dropping from 121 to 96 in the former and from 13 to 10 in the latter. Three failures were shown in the Prairie provinces in each of the last two years and a decline from five to three occurred in British Columbia.

Failures by Branches of Business. -

The failures in trade were greater than in any other groups of the classification, the increase from the first half of 1945 having been from 28 to 31. Failing manufacturing concerns increased from 27 to 30. No change was in evidence for the primary industries where three failures occurred in the first half of each year.

Construction firms numbered nine compared with 26 last year. Defaulting firms in transportation 1011 from 7 to 6, while the number for the finance group doubled at four. The decline in services of different classes was from 43 to 25.


