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# CANADIAN FAILURES UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS IN THE SECOND QUARTER OF 1947

Concerns failing in the second quarter of 1947 rose to 146, a larger number than in the same period of any year since 1942. Despite the sharp increase over the second quarter of 1946, failures were considerably lower than in the same period of pre-war years, comparing with 348 for the second quarter of 1939. Concerns failing were more than twice as numerous as in the same period of 1946, when the number was 59, and may be compared with 64 and 61 for the years 1945 and 1944, respectively.

Current liabilities for the second quarter of the year aggregated \$3,101,753 compared with \$1,043,949 in the same period of 1946, a simable increase being noted in this comparison. This is the highest total for the period under review since the prewar year 1939, when liabilities aggregated \$4,189,660.

### Comparison With The First Six Months of 1946.

Failures rose appreciably in the first half of 1947, being greater than in the same period of any year since 1942. The 266 failures, however, were less than in the first half of the previous years of the period of observation from 1922 to the early part of the second world war. The increase over the first half of 1946 was 135 p.c., the total for that period having been 113.

During the first six months there were six failures in the Maritime Provinces compared with one last year. In Quebec and Ontario, the number rose from 96 to 212 in the former and from 10 to 32 in the latter. Six failures were shown in the Prairie Provinces, compared with 3 the preceding year, and an increase from 3 to 10 occurred in British Columbia.

In trade failures totalled 74, compared with 31 in the same period of last year. Failing manufacturing establishments increased from 30 to 77. Nine failures were reported in the primary industries where three failures occurred in the first half of the preceding year. Thirty-two failures were reported in construction, 10 in transportation and 5 in finance.
