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## COMORCIAL PAILURIS

She mamber of fallures in Cansda during the second quarter of 1951 was 318, repreaenting a decline of 6 per cent from the total of 338 regiatered in the corresponding period last year. The ostimated total of liabilities also dropped lightly, having stood at $\$ 5,835$ thousand compared with $\$ 6,135$ thousand in the second quarter of 1950.

Daring the first sis month of 1951 comercial failures numbered 718, showing firtually no change from the 720 recorded is the same period of 1950 . In the ame comparison, liabilities totalled $\$ 12,254$ thousand against $\$ 12,441$ thousand, a decline of less than 2 per cent. The levels of both failures and liabilities in the first half of 1950 were higher than in any comparable period since 1934. The average liablily this gear stood at $\$ 17,067$ compared with $\$ 17,279$ in the corresponding period last year.

Owing to changes in the administration of bapkruptcios an introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the date for the past 12 months axe not comparable wth preceding periodis. Since July 1950. propesals frow insolvent pertons are not included with the statistice of bankruptcies. In table 6 of this report, however, the number of proposals is show so as to give a general ispreselon of the trend.

Failures by Industries
There ware fover insolvencies in manufacturing and Bervice busineses during the first ix months of 1951 than in the mame period last year. Failureg of manufacturing enterprises mumber ed 137 compared with 148 in the first half of 1950 , and bankruptcies in the services field declined from 146 to 139. In the same comparison, defaults of trading establisbments rose more than 6 per cent to 303. There were 67 failures in construction compared with 51 last year.

Failuren by Economic Areas
Bankruptcies in Quebec province decilned neasly 7 per cent, from 566 to 529, in the six months comparison. As explained previously the 1951 figures do not include proposals, the bulk of which are registered in Quebec. In the first half, the total number of proposals vas 102. Failures in Ontario rese 27 per cont to 108. Incresses vere algo recorded in the titantic and Prairio regions, the nuber in the Atlantic Provinces havine risen $1 r o m ~ 18$ to 23 and in the Prairies irom 17 to 24 . Insolvencies in British Columbia remined unchanged at 34 .

Ibsolvoncy
It mut be spphesised that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Baplaruptcy and Vinding Up Acts. Relevant legislation include the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies Creditor,' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Acts. Statistice in this report relate to the Banirruptcy and Winding Up Ants only.
