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COMMERCIAL FAILURES

OF THE BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS

FIRST QUARTER, 1952

During the first quarter of 1952, the number of failures under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts was 404, only slightly above the 402 registered in the corresponding period last year. The data indicate a continuation, however, of the upward trend in the number of failures since the end of the last war. Estimated liabilities involved amounted to \$6.1 million as compared with \$6.7 million in the first quarter of 1951.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July, 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with the statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fail in their purpose the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In Table 6 of this report, the number of proposals is shown so as to give a general impression of the trend.

Failures by Industries

During the first quarter of 1952, failures in the trade sector, where the greatest number of business mortalities usually occurs, totalled 167 compared with 168 in the same period last year. Bankruptcies of manufacturing establishments numbered 74, a decline of 5 from last year. Service insolvencies increased from 77 in the first quarter of 1951 to 85 in 1952. Failures in the construction field declined by 1/5 to 26 in the same comparison.

Failures by Economic Areas

Bankruptcies in the Province of Quebec remained practically unchanged in the first three months, while failures in Ontario rose to 66 from 62 in the first quarter last year. Insolvencies in the Atlantic Provinces advanced from 13 to 16 while in the Prairie Provinces they declined from 13 to 9. In British Columbia the number of failures remained unchanged at 15.

Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act, and various provincial Bulk Sales Acts. Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts only.


