

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COMMERCIAL FAILURES

UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS SECOND QUARTER, 1952.

During the second quarter of 1952 failures under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts numbered 384 as compared with 321 in the corresponding period of 1951, an increase of nearly 20 percent. The estimated total of liabilities was \$7,335 thousand, or more than 26 percent higher, in the same comparison.

Failures during the first six months totalled 848, representing a gain of 17 percent over the 723 recorded in 1951. These figures reflect a continuation of the upward trend in the number of bank-ruptcies since the end of the last war. Total estimated liabilities in the six-month period were \$14,552 thousand as compared with \$12,484 thousand in the same period last year, an increase of 16 percent. The average liability per failure amounted to \$17,160 a little lower than the average of \$17,267 during the first six months of 1951.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July, 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fail in their purpose the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In Table 6 of this report, the number of proposals submitted is shown so as to give an indication of the trend.

Failures by Industries

During the first six months of 1952 there were 334 insolvencies of trading establishments as compared with 303 in the same period of 1951, an advance of 10 percent. Failures in the construction field declined slightly in the same comparison. Defaults of manufacturing enterprises totalled 167 compared with 137 last year. Failures of service businesses rose from 138 during the first six months of 1951 to 149.

Failures by Economic Areas

Bankruptcies in the Province of Quebec increased 21 percent, from 529 to 641 in the six months comparison. The number of failures in Ontario rose from 112 to 128, a gain of 14 percent. Insolvencies in the Atlantic Provinces increased from 23 in 1951 to 29 this year. By contrast, bankruptcies in the Prairie Provinces declined from 24 to 16 while failures in British Columbia showed little change.

Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Acts. Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts only.


