## COMNERCIAL FAILURES

Historical file CopyUNDER IHE FROVI'SIONS OF THE BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS

During the third quarter of 1952,305 failures were registered under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, 7 fewer than the 312 recorded for the corresponding period last year. The estimated total amount of liabilities was $\$ 6,763$ thousand, an increase of more than 4\% over the third quarter of 1951.

There was a total of 1169 failures during the first nine months of 1952 representing an advance of over $13 \%$ over the 1030 recorded for the same period last year. The upward trend in bankruptcies observable since the end of the last war has thus continued in 1952. Total estimated liabilities for the nine months were $\$ 22,015$ thousand, $16 \%$ above the corresponding total for 1951. The average liability per fallure during the first three quarters was \$18,832 somewhat higher than the average of $\$ 18,401$ shown last year.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fall in their purpose the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In Table 6 of this report, the number of proposals submitted is shown so as to give an indication of the trend.

## Failures by Industries,

There were 451 insolvencies of trading establishments during the first nine months of 1952 , as compared with 435 for the same period last year. In the same comparison, failures of manufacturing enterprises rose from 193 to 236 and defaults of service businesses from 192 to 210. Failures in the construction industry, however, declined from 94 to 86.

Failures by Economic Arease
There were 894 bankruptcies in the Province of kuebec during the mine-month period, an advance of more than $17 \%$ over 1951. The number of failures in Ontario rose by nearly $13 \%$ in the nine months comparison, from 157 to 177. Bankruptcies in the Atlantic Provinces showed little change, and failures in the Frairie frovinces decreased from 33 to 22. In British Columbia, 43 bankruptcies were recorded during the first nine months, the same number as in the corresponding period of 1951.

## Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Actse Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and winding Up Acts only.
