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COMMERCIAL FAILURES

UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS

During the first quarter of 1955, the number of failures under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts was 661, somewhat below last year's first quarter total of 680. Estimated liabilities involved amounted to \$14,858,000, a drop of over 11 per cent from the 1954 first quarter total of \$16,760,000. The average value of liabilities per failure was slightly below \$22,500 as compared with somewhat over \$24,600 one year ago.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with the statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fail in their purpose, the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In table 6 of this report, the number of proposals is shown so as to give a general impression of the trend.

Failures by Industries

The number of bankruptcies in the trade sector, where a large proportion of business mortalities usually occurs, dropped from 299 in the first quarter of 1954 to 253. Failures in the general store, grocery, clothing, automobile and electrical apparatus fields all fell off in this comparison. Bankruptcies of manufacturing establishments totalled 117, as compared with 127 in the same period last year. Service insolvencies rose slightly from 110 in the first quarter of 1954 to 114, with failures in the construction and finance sectors also increasing as compared with the same period last year.

Failures by Economic Areas

The number of bankruptcies in Quebec dropped from 505 to 475 in the first quarter comparison. Failures in British Columbia declined from 27 to 20 and insolvencies in the Atlantic Provinces fell from 15 to 9. Bankruptcies in Ontario rose from 104 in the first quarter of 1954 to 122, while failures in the Prairie region increased from 29 to 35.

Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Acts. Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts only.
