

During the second quarter of 1955, there were 593 failures under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, about 10 per cent above last year's second quarter total of 539. Estimated liabilities involved amounted to \$14,431,000, a drop of over 5 per cent from the 1954 second quarter total of \$15,208,000. The average value of liabilities per failure was slightly over \$24,300, appreciably lower than the corresponding second quarter average of \$28,200 one year ago.

Failures in the first six months of 1955 numbered 1,254, about 3 per cent more than the 1,219 insolvencies recorded in the first half of last year. Total estimated liabilities over the six-months period, however, were \$29,290,000, over 8 per cent below the 1954 six months total of \$31,968,000.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with the statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fail in their purpose, the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In Table 6 of this report the number of proposals submitted is shown so as to give a general impression of the trend.

Failures by Industries

The number of bankruptcies in the trade sector, where a large proportion of business mortalities occurs, dropped from 533 in the first half of 1954 to 496. Failures of manufacturing establishments also fell off from 227 to 198 in this comparison. Insolvencies in the construction field, however, rose from 67 in the first half of 1954 to 85. Service bankruptcies also advanced from 209 last year to 229.

Failures by Economic Areas

The number of failures in Quebec province declined from 902 in the first half of 1954 to 887. Insolvencies in British Columbia also fell off from 46 to 42 in the six-month comparison with bankruptcies in the Atlantic Provinces declining from 24 to 18. Failures in Ontario increased substantially from 194 in the first half of last year to 242, while bankruptcies in the Prairie region rose from 53 to 65 in the same comparison.

Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Acts. Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts only.
