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COMMERCIAL FAILURES

HUNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE BANKRUPTCY AND WINDING UP ACTS

During the second quarter of 1956 there were 687 failures under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acces, about 15 per cent above last year's second quarter total of 597. By contrast, estimated liabilities involved were \$13,175,000, a drop of 11 per cent from the 1955 second quarter total of \$14,796,000. The average value of liabilities per failure was slightly under \$19,200, or 23 per cent less than the corresponding second quarter average of \$24,800 one year ago.

Failures in the first six months of 1956 numbered 1,404, nearly 12 per cent more than the 1,258 insolvencies recorded in the first half of last year. Total estimated liabilities over the six months period, were \$32,614,000, 10 per cent above the 1955 six months total of \$29,654,000.

Owing to changes in the administration of bankruptcies as introduced by the Bankruptcy Act of 1949, the data since July 1950 are not comparable with preceding periods. In the third part of the Act, provision is made for proposals from insolvent persons. Agreements made under this method are not normally included with the statistics of bankruptcies, but when such proposals are rejected by the creditors or fail in their purpose, the proceedings may then come under the Bankruptcy Act. In Table 6 of this report the number of proposals submitted is shown so as to give a general impression of the trend.

Failures by Industries

The number of bankruptcies in the trade sector, where a large proportion of business mortalities usually occurs, fell off from 499 in the first half of 1955 to 443. Failures of manufacturing establishments dropped sharply from 198 to 125 in this comparison. Service bankruptcies, however, advanced from 231 in the first six months of last year to 252. Construction insolvencies rose steeply from 86 in the first half of 1955 to 219.

Failures by Economic Areas

The number of failures in central Canada rose during the first half of 1956 as compared with the same period of the previous year. Bankruptcies in Quebec increased from 888 to 1,024 in this comparison, with insolvencies in Ontario advancing from 242 to 276. On the other hand, failures in Eastern and Western Canada fell off as compared with the first six months of 1955, with insolvencies in the Prairie region declining from 66 to 52, and in British Columbia from 43 to 37. Failures in the Atlantic region dropped from 19 to 15 in the same comparison.

Insolvency

It must be emphasized that insolvencies can occur through other means than the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts. Relevant legislation includes the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act, the Companies' Creditors' Arrangement Act and various provincial Bulk Sales Act. Statistics in this report relate to the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts only. Prepared in the Business Statistics Section, Research and Development Division.


