## COMARRCIAL FAILURES FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OR 1928

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first six monins of 2928 , as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics under the provisions of the Bankruptcy and linding Up Acts, was 960 as compared with 890,857 and 1,097 for the same periods of 1927, 1926 and 1925 respectively, this being an increase over the same periods of 1927 and 1926 but showing a decrease from the same period of 1925. The defaulted liabilities for the first half of 1928 were $\$ 14,085,085$ as compared with $14,358,932,14,194,835$ and $317,314,681$ respectively for the same periods of the three preceding years. Thus defaulted liabilities are about the same as the corresponding period of 1927 and 1926 and show a considerable decline from the same period of 1925.

Commercial failures in trade for the first six montins of 1928 were 400 as compared with 397,406 and 613 for the same periods of 1927, 1926 and 1925 respuctively. In manufactures there were 238 in 1928 as against 203,169 and 195 for the corresponding periods of the three proceding years. Agricultural failures showed a decline from 87 in 1925 to 68 in 1926, 62 in 1927 and 51 in 1928. Though the number failing among the grocers, fish and meat and general stores was large in the first half of the present year, a docline is shown in comparison with the corresponding period of 1927. The number of general stores failing in the first six months of 1928 was 59 , compared with 77 in the corresponding period of 1927 , a decline of $23 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. Thirty-eight grocery stores failed in the first half of 1928, as against 43 for 1927, a docline of 12 p.c., while 29 fish and meat stores assigned in 1928 and may be compared with 31 in the first half of 1927, a decline of 6 p.c.

## Commercial Failures, in Canada in June, 1928.

As compared with June 1927, the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, s. ows a slight decrease, while the liabilities of the assignors also show a decrease. Commercial failures in Canada in June 1928 numbered l30, as compared with 138 in June 192?, and 146 in liay 1928. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to $\mathrm{Z}^{2}, 194,595$, as compared with $22,437,981$ in June 1927, showed a slight decrease; when compared with $2,237,821$ in May 1928, a decrease is also indicated.

## Commercial Failures by Areas.

Maritime Provinces.- In the month under review, there were ll assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 11 in May 1928 and 6 in June 1927. The liabilities in Junc 1928 were about 98,000 .

Quebec.- Commercial failures in the province of Quebec during June 1928 numbered 46, as against 49 in April 1928 and 46 in June 1927. The liabilities were approximately 837,000.

Ontario.- In Ontario, the failures numbered 48, as against 57 in liay 1928 and 60 in June 1927, a decrease of 25 p.c. in the latter comparison. Liabilities aggregated about 982,000 .

Prairit Provinces.- In the three Prairie Provinces, commercial failures decreased from 22 in May 1928 to 21 in June 1928 and may bo compared with 20 in June 1927. Liabilities aggregated about 8229,000 .

British Columbia.- In the Pacific Province, commercial failures totalled 4 as compared with 7 in May 1928 and 6 in June 1927. The liabilities were about 49,000.

## Failurus by Branches of Business

Trade.- Trading establishments contributed as usual the largest number of failures, 51 assigning in June 1928, as compared with 57 in May 1928 and 69 in June 1927, a decrease of 26 p.c. as compared with the same month of last year.

Manufactures. - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 32 assigned during June 1928, as against 40 in May 1928 and 27 in June 1928. The 32 include 5 engagec in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 2 in animal foods, 3 in fur and leather, 5 in clothing and 5 in lumber and its manufactured products.

Agriculture.- Agriculturists assigning in June 1928 numbered 6, as against 5 in May 1928 and 9 in June 1928.

Other Failures.- Otner failures in June 1928 included 5 in constructipn, 5 in transportation and public utilities, 2 in mining and 2 in logging, fishing and trapping.

Statistical Table:- The commercial failures in each month from January 1925 are given by provinces in Table l, vile Table 2 furnishes statistics of commercial failures by branches of business by months from January 1925 to June 1928. The detailed figures of failures during May 1928 are shown by provinces and branches of business in Table 3. The comercial failures in Canada, by provinces and branches of business for the first 6 months of 1928 are shown in Tajle 4 and the assets and liabilitics of those failing during June 1928 are given uy provinces in Table 5 .
