

#### COMMERCIAL FAILURES IN CANADA IN MAY, 1929

A considerable increase in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in May, 1929, as compared with May, 1928, while the liabilities of the assignors showed a slight increase. Commercial failures numbered 185, as compared with 148 in the same month of the previous year and 174 in Afril, 1929. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to \$2,294,769 as compared with \$2,523,033 in April, 1929, showed a decrease; when compared with \$2,288,116 in May, 1928, a slight increase is noted.

#### COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. - In the month under review there were 11 assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 13 in April, 1929, and 11 in May, 1928. The liabilities in May, 1929, were about \$73,000.

Quebec. - Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec during May, 1929, numbered 82, as against 87 in April, 1929 and 51 in May, 1928. The liabilities were approximately \$1,009,000. Of these 82 failures in the province of Quebec, 40 occurred in the city of Montreal, where the estimated liabilities were about \$724,000.

Ontario. - In Ontario, the failures numbered 70, as against 55 in April, 1929 and 57 in May, 1928, an increase of about 23 p.c. over the same month of last year. Liabilities aggregated about \$1,000,000. In the city of Toronto, there were 16 assignments with liabilities of about \$280,000.

Prairie Provinces. - In the three Prairie Provinces, failures increased from 13 in April, 1929 to 18 in May, 1929, as compared with 11 in May, 1928. Liabilities were \$196,000, mainly in Alberta. There were 2 failures in the city of Winnipeg, with liabilities of about \$3,000.


British Columbia. - In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 4 as compared with 3 in April, 1929 and 7 in May, 1928. The liabilities were about \$15,000. Of those, 2 were in the city of Vancouver, with liabilities of about \$10,000.

#### FAILURES BY BRANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 101 assigning in May, 1929, as compared with 83 in April, 1929, and 57 in May, 1928. Of these concerns, 23 were general stores, 12 grocery stores, 6 fish and meat, 8 dry goods, 14 clothing, 3 books and stationery, 5 hardware, 4 coal and wood, and 3 drugs and chemicals.

Manufactures. - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 33 assigned in May, 1929, as against 40 in April, 1929, and 42 in May, 1928. The 33 included 5 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods, 5 in fur and leather goods, 12 in clothing and 2 in lumber and its manufactured products.

Miscollaneous. - Agriculturists assigning in May, 1929 numbered 17, as compared with 11 in April, 1929, and 5 in May, 1928. Six assignments were reported in construction.



## CUMULATIVE FIVE MONTHS' TOTAL OF FAILURES AND LIABILITIES

The cumulative total of commercial failures for the first five months of 1929 was 1,005, as compared with 835, 752 and 715 for the same periods of 1928, 1927 and 1926 respectively. The total failures in trade in the first five months of 1929 were 491, as compared with 350, 328 and 336 for the same periods of 1928, 1927 and 1926; while in manufactures 239 in the elapsed period of 1929 may be compared with 210, 176 and 140 for the same periods of the three preceding years. The defaulted liabilities for the first five months of 1929 were \$18,069,077, as compared with \$11,979,969, \$11,920,751 and \$11,881,922 for the same periods of the three preceding years, thus showing a considerable increase.


