COMMEECIAL FAILUTES FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 1930.
The cumplative total of cormercial failures for the first six months of 1930 , as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, under the provisions of the Bankruptey and Winding Up Acts, was 1,205 as compared with $1,153,986$, and 898 for the same period of 1929 , 1928 and 1927 respectively. The defaulted liabilities for the first half of 1930 we $\$ 26,408,325$ as compared with $\$ 21,025,946, \$ 14,213,748$ and $\$ 14,358,932$ for the same periods of the three preceding years. Thus defaulted liabilities show a considerable increase over the same periods of 1929, 1928 and 1927.

Commercial failures in trade for the first six months of 1930 were 611 as compared with 570,404 and 401 for the same periods of 1929,1928 and 1927 respectively. In manufactures, there were 246 in 1930 as against 268,242 and 206 for the corresponding period of the three preceding years. Agricultural failures decreased from 69 in the first half of 1929 to 55 for the same period of 1930 and may be compared with 51 and 62 for the same period of 1928 and 1927. The number of general stores failing in the first six months of 1930 was 69 as compared with 105 in the corresponding period of 1929. Sixty-two grocery stores failed in the first half of 1930, as against 65 for the same period of 1929, while 45 fish and meat stores assigned in 1930 and may be compared with 36 in the first half of 1929.

Statistical Tables.- The commercial failures in each month from Jamury 1927, are given by provinces in Table 1, while Table 2 furnished statistics of comercial failures by branches of business by months from January 1927 to June 1930. The detailed figures of failures during June 1930 are shown by provinces and branches of business in Table 3 and for the first six months of the year in Table 4. The assets and liabilities of those failing during June 1930 are show by provinces in Table 5, and the first half of 1930, is shown in Table 6.

An increase in the number of assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up Acts, a reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, was experienced in June, 1930 , as compared with June, 1929, while the liabilities of the assignors, also showed an increase. Cormercial failures numbered 178, as compared with 148 in the same month of the previous year, and 166 in May, 1930. The liabilities of the assignors, amounting to $\$ 2,405,794$ 8.s compared with $\$ 2,600,755$ in May, 1930 , showed a decrease; when compared with $\$ 2,956,869$ in June, 1929, a considerable decrease is noted.

## COMMERCIAL FAILURES BY AREAS

Maritime Provinces. - In the month under review, there were 7 assignments in the Maritime Provinces, as compared with 2 in May, 1930 and 6 in June, 1029. The liabilities in June, 1930 were about $\$ 38,000$.

Quebec. - Commercial failures in the Province of Quebec, during June 1930, numbered 67, as against 60 in May, 1930, and in June, 1929, aw merease of about p.c. when compared with the same month of last year. The liabilities were approximately $\$ 902,000$. Of these 67 failures, 40 occurred in the city of Montreal, where the estimated liabilities were about $\$ 482,000$.

Ontario. - In Ontario, the failures numbered 64, as against 65 in May, 1930, and 55 in June, 1929 , an increase of about lip.c. over the same month of last year. Liabilities aggregated about $\$ 1,028,000$. In the city of Toronto, there were 25 assignments with liabilities of about $\$ 452,000$.

Prairie Provinces. - In the three Prairie Provinces, failures increased from 29 in May, $19 \overline{30}$, to 31 in June, 1930, and may be compared with 24 in June, 1929, an increase of about 23 p.c. in the latter comparison. Liabilities were $\$ 295,000$, mainly in Manitoba. There were 6 failures in the city of Winmipeg with liabilities of about $\$ 90,000$.

British Columbia.- In British Columbia, commercial failures numbered 9 as compared with 10 in May, 1930 and 5 in June 1929. The liabilities were about $\$ 135,000$. Of these 9 failures, 7 were in the city of Vancouver, with liabilities of about $\$ 114,000$.

## COMVERCIAL FAI LURES $\rightarrow$ RANCHES OF BUSINESS

Trade. - Trading establishments furnished the largest number of failures, 84 assigning in June, 1930 as compared with 82 in May, 1930, and 79 in June, 1929. Of these concerns, 12 were general stores, 10 grocery, 3 confectlonery, 3 drink and tobacco, 8 fish and meat, 6 dry goods, 8 clothing, 4 books and stationery, 4 hardware, 4 jewelery, and 4 drugs and chemicals.

Manufactures. - Manufacturing establishments to the number of 39 assigned in June, 1930, as against 33 in May, 1930, and 29 in June, 7929. The 39 included 8 engaged in the manufacture of vegetable foods. 3 drink and tobacco, 5 fur and leather, 7 clothing, 3 Iumber and manufactured products, $\therefore$ and 2 non-forrous metals.

Agriculture. - Agriculturists assigning in June, 1930, numbered 6, as compared with 7 in May, 1930 and 8 in June, 1930.

Miscellaneous.- There were 6 failures in construction, 4 in transportation and public utilities, 2 in mining and 2 in finance.
