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## MID-YEAR REVIEW-1963

A recent survey of the capital spending intentions of all sectors of the Canadian economy revealed that investment plans for 1963 have been further expanded since the previous survey was made at the start of the year. Present capital spending plans involve total outlays of \$9.3 billion. Such a programme would represent an increase of seven per cent over that of 1962 and would be three per cent greater than that anticipated earlier.

This most recent survey was conducted in late May and in June and covered business establishments, institutions and all levels of government. The total figure includes, as well, estimated outlays for housing. The estimates given here are directly comparable with those published in the March report "Private and Public Investment in Canada, Outlook 1963". Respondents were asked to revise only their estimates of capital spending. The figures shown for repair expenditures are the same as those appearing in the earlier report. The revised figures are only available for national totals and no revision of the regional figures, published earlier, have been made.

The revised plans call for a further expansion of both the construction and the machinery and equipment programmes. Total outlays for new construction are now expected to reach close to \$6.2 billion. This is six per cent more than was spent in 1962 and two per cent above the earlier estimate for 1963. The most important revision is in residential construction with expenditures for this purpose now estimated to exceed those of last year by three to four per cent. Earlier a slight decline in such spending had been anticipated. The present programme involves a seven per cent increase in outlays for non-residential construction. This is only slightly higher than that anticipated in the previous survey. Plans for the purchase of new machinery and equipment have also been further expanded involving total expenditures for this purpose of \$3.15 billion. This represents an addition of more than \$100 million over the earlier estimate and an increase of nine per cent over similar outlays made in 1962.

The results of the survey indicate that business investment, social capital spending and housebuilding with all be higher in 1963. The major changes from the original intentions are in business investment and in housebuilding. Plans now call for an eight per cent rise in business investment compared with the five per cent increase suggested by the earlier intentions. The increase in social capital spending is expected to be about six per cent, only slightly greater than the five per cent rise indicated at the start of the year.

The upward adjustment in the investment plans of business has occurred principally in the resource-based forest and mineral products industries, in commercial building and in secondary manufacturing. Capital spending in the resource-based industries is now expected to exceed that of last year by 17 per cent. The added strength stems from a further expansion of spending plans for new facilities in the paper and wood products sectors, a larger mining programme than had been expected and a lesser decline than was previously indicated in investment plans by the primary metals producers. The earlier survey had suggested that capital spending by secondary industry would be a little lower in 1963, the present survey indicates that it will show an increase of 11 per cent. The added strength appears principally in the capital goods producing industries. Several new office and hotel building projects add strength to commercial type building and total capital expenditure plans in this sector now involve outlays equal to those of last year.

The only major downward revision in investment plans occurs in the fuel and power industries. This is almost entirely attributable to slower progress on one major power development than had been expected. Nevertheless, capital spending by these industries is still expected to exceed that of last year by 11 per cent. Planned capital outlays by farmers and by the transportation and communication industries are little changed from earlier anticipations and still involve a moderate increase from the levels of 1962.

The expanded plans for social capital spending are almost entirely attributable to an upward revision in estimated outlays for new technical schools. School construction is now expected to about equal that of last year. The original anticipation of a sharply higher level of spending for new university and hospital facilities and a more modest increase in construction outlays by governments at the provincial and municipal levels has been confirmed by this most recent survey.

Housebuilding activity in the first half of 1963 has continued at a high level. The number of new units started in the first six months of the year was two to three per cent greater than in the same period of 1962 and the number of houses completed rose by five per cent. At the end of June there were about 2,000 more houses under construction than at the same time last year. With the easier financing now available under the National Housing Act starts can be expected to continue at a high rate in the latter half of the year and for the year as a whole at least equal those of 1962. The number of units completed will probably moderately exceed those of last year. In terms of expenditures this will mean a housing programme three to four per cent above that of 1962.

The revised statement of investment intentions indicates that Canadian productive capacity is being expanded and modernized at an accelerated rate. The increase expected in business investment, if realized, would be the sharpest experienced since 1957. This along with the higher level of spending for housing and social capital purposes will have immediately favourable effects on employment and production in the building materials, construction and capital goods industries.
