
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# Private and Public Investment in Canada Outlook 1964

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#### MID-YEAR REVIEW - 1964

A recent survey of the capital spending intentions of all sectors of the Canadian economy revealed that investment plans for 1964 had been sharply expanded since the previous survey was made at the beginning of the year. Present plans involve total capital outlays of \$10.8 billion. This programme, if accomplished, would represent an increase of 16 per cent over that of 1963 and would be seven per cent greater than that anticipated earlier. In both value and volume terms such a capital programme would be the largest on record and would represent the sharpest year-over-year increase in such spending since 1956. Fstimates of actual outlays for the early months of 1964 indicate that capital spending was already running close to the annual rate indicated by the recent survey. Accordingly realization of this programme would involve little further increase beyond the level of investment activity already underway in the year to date.

The most recent survey was conducted in late May and June and covered business establishments, institutions, and all levels of government. The total figure includes, as well, estimated outlays for housing. The estimates given here are directly comparable with those published in the March report "Private and Public Investment in Canada, Outlook 1964". Respondents in the survey were asked to revise only their estimates of capital spending, the figures shown for repair expenditures are the same as those appearing in the earlier report. The revised figures are only available for national totals and no revision of the regional figures, published earlier, have been made.

Present plans involve a sharp increase in outlays both for construction and for machinery and equipment. Expenditures for new construction are now expected to tota' \$7.1 billion. This is 15 per cent more than was spent in 1963 and nearly seven per cent above the earlier estimate for 1964. Upward revisions have been made in both housing and non-residential construction. Plans for the purchase of new machinery and equipment now involve a 17 per cent increase over those of 1963, and a total outlay for this purpose of \$3.7 billion. This is \$546 million more than was spent last year and close to nine per cent above the original intentions.

The most significant revisions in capital plans have been in the area of business investment. The revised business investment programme calls for an 18 per cent increase over that of last year, 10 per cent more than was anticipated in the previous survey. Outlays for housing and social capital purposes are also expected to be above earlier anticipations but to a more modest extent.

The largest upward revisions of original investment plans within the business sector appear in manufacturing industries. Capital expenditure programmes of manufacturers have been increased by a further 14 per cent, bringing them to 31 per cent above actual outlays in 1963. While most manufacturing industries are spending more than originally intended the major upward adjustments have occurred in pulp and paper, chemicals, primary iron and steel, motor vehicles and textiles. Mineral industries too have stepped up their expansion activities, particularly the oil companies. A further major revision in business investment plans occurs in the area of commercial construction, where capital expenditure is now expected to show a 20 per cent rise over actual outlays for 1963. Increased spending for new retail outlets, office building and hotels contribute to this acceleration. Elsewhere in the business sector expanded programmes for electric power and pipe line facilities have raised anticipated spending in the utilities field to a level 15 per cent above last year's outlay.

Expenditures for new housing in 1964 are now anticipated to total more than \$2 billion. This is nearly 18 per cent more than such outlays in 1963 and close to six per cent above the earlier estimate. It is presently estimated that new housing starts in the present year will moderately exceed the 149,000 units of 1963. In this regard, initiation of new apartment units are much stronger than previously expected. In addition, the continuation of the winter house-building incentive programme will lead to a high rate of starts late in the year. The number of units completed in 1964 will reflect the unusually large number of starts in late 1963 and early 1964. Such completions may exceed the 128,000 of last year by from 15 to 20 per cent.

Pelatively moderate upward revisions have been made in the expenditure plan for social capital purposes. Such spending is likely to be nine per cent greater than that in 1963. This compares with the seven per cent rise expected earlier. Expanding programmes of municipal governments and universities account for most of the added expenditure.

The large scale build-up of investment plans reflects the strong growth that has taken place in the economy over the past few years. Productive capacity has progressively been more fully utilized, profits have risen and prospects for further increases in demand appear favourable. However, the present programme in terms of both rate of increase and as a proportion of gross national production is the most ambitious that has been attempted in some years. The accomplishment of the programme will be subject to supply considerations to a greater extent than has been the case since 1956-1957. For the first time in a number of years there appears to be some pressure on the available supply of certain basic materials, particularly steel. This could lead to lengthening delivery dates both for steel used in construction and in machinery building with consequent delays for some projects. Other factors, not at present foreseen, such as regional shortages of skilled labour or other labour difficulties could also limit the total volume of work completed.

The build-up of investment plans indicated by the survey has entailed increased activity this year in construction, machinery-producing and related industries and has provided strong expansionary impetus to the economy generally.


