CAHADA'S FOREIGH TRADE, 1925 (Calendar year)

Canada's external trade was extremely active during 1925, reflecting a general improvement in edonomic acnditions in the Dominion. While imports were less in value than for the peak year, 1920, exports of Canadian produce almost equalled these for 1920, being only about \$1,670,000 less. Although the effect of price changes on the value of trade cannot be exactly measured, it is reasonably cortain that at the same prices that prevailed in 1920, the total valuation of Canada's imports and exports in 1925 would be greater than for 1920. Exports of Canadian produce in 1925 were only exceeded in value on two occasions, viz:-1917 and 1920. In 1917 this was achieved under war-time demands, while in 1920 it was largely due to the high prices of the post-bellum boom.

Imports and Exports: The total value of the trade of Ganada (imports for Consumption and Ganadian exports) during 1925 was \$2,161,254,202, as compared with a trade in 1924 of \$1,866,202,471, being an increase of \$295,051,731. Both imports and exports show increases, the increase in imports amounting to \$82,122,775 and in exports to \$212,928,956. The total value of imports in 1925 was \$890,267,348, and in 1924, \$808,144,573, while Ganadian exports in 1925 tetalled \$1,270,986,854, as against an export in 1924 valued at \$1,058,057,898. Compared with 1920, the total trade in 1925 shows a decrease of \$448,324,261, the decrease in imports being \$446,653,673, and in exports \$1,670,588.


Increases in Imports (1924-1925): The increase in imports in 1925 compared with 1924 (\$82,122,775) was due to gains in agricultural and vegetable products, \$19,986,150; animal products, \$4,721,182; fibres and textiles, \$13,878,983; wood and paper, \$684,705; iron and its products, \$28,593,605; nonferrous metals, \$5,017,224; non-metallic minerals, \$2,980,540; chemical products, \$3,088,245; and miscellaneous commedities, \$3,172,141.

Increases in Exports (1924-1925): The excess of exports in 1925 over 1924, amounting to \$212,928,956, was due to increases in agricultural and vegetable products of \$116,932,988 (principally wheat, \$63,409,353; refined sugar, \$11,705,374; wheat fleur, \$10,023,603; rugber goods, \$7,303,405; seeds, \$6,557,136; and vegetables, \$4,210,848); animal products, \$40,809,245 (chiefly choose, \$12,200,193; and meats, \$12,140,321); fibres and textiles, \$180,902; wood and paper, \$18,336,043 (chiefly wood pulp, \$7,688,933, and paper \$7,375,549); iron and its products, \$10,860,421 (chiefly vehicles (tutes), \$7,039,377); non-ferrous metals, \$18,929,481 (including lead, \$6,500,014; and gold-bearing quartz, nuggets, etc. \$3,074,198); non-metallic minerals, \$3,393,173; chemical products, \$2,020,582; and miscellaneous commedities, \$1,466,121.

Trade Palances: For the calendar year 1920 the visible trade balance, unfavourable to Canada, amounted to \$34,115,907, but since then it has been favourable. For the past five calendar years the favourable trade balances were-1921, \$17,215,798; 1922, \$135,768,542; 1923, \$125,498,608; 1924, \$262,467,043, and 1925, \$392,831,447. The favourable trade balance for 1925 of \$392,831,447 has only been exceeded on one occasion, viz: 1917, when it amounted to \$587,465,180.

Duty Collected: During the calendar year 1925 the duty collected on imports amounted to 0137,858,088, as against 2123,162,781 in 1924; 0136,064,994 in 1923; 0132,172,276 in 1922, and 0117,692,966 in 1921. In 1920 the duty collected totalled 0203,028,802. The average ad valerem rate on total imports for each of the past six calendar years was-1920, 15.2%; 1921, 1-.7%; 1922, 17.3%; 1923, 15.1%; 1924, 15.2%; and 1925, 15.5%.
