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### CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE, CALENDAF YEAR 1930

Canada's traie, both import and export, in general, with that of the chief commercial nations of the world, during the calendar year 1930, compared with 1929, shows a marked decline, reflecting the general economic world depression in trade and industry. Canada's trade decline, however, was not so marked as that of the United States. From 1929 to 1930 Canada's imports declined 22.4 per cent, as against 30.4 per cent for the United States, while her exports of domestic produce declined 25.1 per cent, compared with a decline in United States exports of 26.7 per cent. The trade of both Canada and the United States suffered more from the general trade depression of the world than the chief commercial countries of Europe. It is interesting in this connection to contrast the decline in the imports and exports of the leading commercial countries of the world for the latest period for which statistics are available, viz.: 12 months ended November 30, 1930, with a similar period in 1929.

Percentage of Decrease in Imports and Exports of Chief Commercial



When world-wide statistics are available for the calendar year 1930, it is evident that Canada will, in international trade, as in 1923 and 1929, occupy fifth place in total trade and total imports, but as Canada's exports in 1929 only exceeded the exports of British India by \$300,000, and as Canada's exports, as indicated in the above table, show a decrease of 25.8 per cent, compared with decrease of 20.2 per cent for British India, it is evident that for the calendar year 1930 British India will occupy fifth position in export trade, Canada moving down to sixth position.

Analysis of Canada's Trade, 1930: Canada's total foreign trade during the calendar year 1930 was valued at \$1,913,849,000, compared with a similar trade in 1928, valued at \$2,596,564,000, and in 1929 at \$2,507,331,000; the decrease in 1930 compared with the year 1928 amounting to \$682,715,000 or 26.3 per cent, and with the year 1929 to \$593,432,000 or 23.6 per cent. Imports in 1930 show a decrease, compared with a similar trade in 1928 as well as with 1929, the decrease compared with 1928 amounting to \$213,839,000, and with 1929 to \$290,514,000; while the exports also show a decrease, compared with 1928 as also with 1929, the decrease in 1930, compared with 1928, amounting to \$468,876,000, and with 1929 to \$302,968,000. During 1930 imports amounted to \$1,008,479,000, compared with an import of \$1,222,318,000 in 1928, and in 1929 of \$1,298,992,000; the decrease in 1930 compared with the year 1928 totalling \$213,839,000, or 17.5 per cent, and compared with 1929, a decrease of \$290,513,000, or 22.4 per cent; while the exports



(domestic and foreign combined) in 1930 were valued at \$905,370,000 compared with an export trade in 1928 valued at \$1,374,246,000 and in 1929 at \$1,208,338,000; the decrease in 1930 compared with 1923 amounting to \$468,876,000 or 34.1 per cent, and with 1929 to \$302,963,000 or 25.1 per cent. Canada's domestic exports in 1930 were valued at \$835,906,000; in 1928 at \$1,349,867,000, and in 1929 at \$1,132,412,000; the decrease in 1930 compared with 1928 amounting to \$463,961,000 or 34.4 per cent, and with 1929 to \$296,506,000 or 25.1 per cent.



Trade by Countries, 1930: The imports from foreign countries during the calendar year 1930 were valued at \$780,654,000;

and from the British Empire at \$227,325,000; the decrease in 1930 compared with the same period in 1929, in the case of foreign countries being \$261,239,000, and of the British Empire \$29,274,000; while the exports of Canadian produce to foreign countries amounted to \$569,529,000, and to the British Empire to \$316,377,000, the exports to foreign countries showing a decrease of \$217,495,000, and to the British Empire a decrease of \$79,011,000. From 1929 to 1930 the imports from foreign countries, except the United States, decreased \$21,361,000, while the imports from the British Empire, except the United Kingdom, increased \$2,889,000; whereas the exports to foreign countries, except the United States, from 1929 to 1930, decreased \$90,456,000, and to the British Empire, except the United Kingdom, \$23,928,000. The trade of Canada with the United States in 1930 amounted to \$1,049,345,000, or 55 per cent of Canada's total trade with the world. In 1930 Canada's imports from the United States were valued at \$653,707,000, and domestic exports at \$395,538,000; the decrease in imports compared with 1929 being \$239,878,000, or 26.5 per cent, and in domestic exports \$127,039,000, or 24.3 per cent. The trade of Canada with the United Kingdom comes next in importance. Imports from the United Kingdom in 1930 amounted to \$162,614,000, and domestic exports to \$235,214,000, the decrease in imports, compared with similar trade in 1929, amounting to \$32,163,000, or 16.5 per cent, and in domestic exports to \$55,083,000, or 19.0 per cent.

It will be noted by reference to the statistics in the following table re "Canada's Trade with Principal Countries, 1930" that twenty-one of the thirty-five countries in 1930, compared with 1929, show decreases in both imports and exports, viz.: Argentina, Barbados, Belgium, Brazil, British India, Colombia, 'Caba Czecho-Slovakia, France, Germany, Jamaica, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Snain, Sweden, Switzerland, Trinidad and Tobago, the United Kingdom, and the United States; two show increases in both imports and exports, viz.: Italy and St.Pierre and Miquelon; ten show increases in imports but decreases in exports, viz.: Australia, British East Africa, British Guiana, British South Africa, British West Indies, Other, China, Denmark, Newfoundland, Russia, and Venezuela; while two show decreases in imports but increases in exports, viz.: Greece and Peru.

Insofar as imports are concerned the decreases are quite general in character, but in the case of exports the decreases, though general to a considerable extent, are quite marked in certain lines of products, especially wheat and wheat flour, the decreases in the exports of these products being not only due to decrease




in the quantity exported but also to lower average export prices. The falling off in the exports of these products in 1930 account in a large measure for the decrease in the exports not only to certain European countries, but to the British West Indies and China. Of the total decrease in the exports to the United Kingdom of \$5,035,000, the decrease in the exports of wheat accounted for \$34,449,000 of this amount; in the case of Germany it accounted for \$6,070,000 of the total decrease of \$17.502,000; Belgium \$6,550.000 of the total decrease of \$8,628,000; Netherlands \$4,411,000 of the total decrease of \$10,117,000; while in the case of China the decrease in the exports of wheat of \$4,765,000, and wheat flour of \$11,791,000, accounted for \$16,556,000 of the total decrease of \$18,748,000. Of the total decrease in the exports to Norway of \$1,397,000, wheat accounted for \$977,000, and wheat flour for \$443,000 of this amount; while in the case of Jamaica the decrease in the exports of wheat flour accounted for \$815,000 of the total decrease of \$1,285,000. The marked increase in the exports to St. Pierre and Miquelon, amounting to \$5,265.000, was largely due to increased exports of alcoholic beverages, chiefly whiskey, which increased from \$4,255,000 to \$9,425,000.

Analysis of Commodity Trade, 1930: The decrease in the imports in 1930 compared with 1929, amounting to \$290,513,000, and in the domestic exports, amounting to \$296,506,000, occurred in each of the main groups of import and export trade. The value of each import group, arranged in order of importance, with decrease, 1930 compared with each ilentical group in 1929, was: (1) Iron and Its Products, \$225,068,000, decrease \$117,412,000; (2) Agricultural and Vegetable Products, \$192,269,000. decrease \$40,557,000; (3) Non-Metallic Minerals and Their Products, \$164,849,000, decrease \$21,073,000; (4) Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products, \$149,150,000, decrease \$49,779,000; (5) Non-Ferrous Metals and Their Products, \$65,927,000, decrease \$23,759,000; (6) Miscellaneous Commodities, \$64,398,000, decrease \$10,710,000; (7) Animals and Animal Products, \$59,060,000; decrease \$11,030,000; (8) Wood, Wood Products and Paper, \$49,973,000; decrease \$12,847,000; and (9) Chemicals and Allied Products, \$36,735,000, decrease \$3,346,000; while the value of each export group arranged in order of importance, with decrease, 1930 compared with each similar group in 1929, was: (1) Agricultural and Vegetable Products, \$316,252,000, decrease \$113,549,000; (2) Wood, Wood Products and Paper, \$249,500,000, decrease \$43,001,000; (3) Non-Ferrous Metals and Their Products, \$115,767,000, decrease \$32,397,000; (4) Animals and Animal Products, \$91,560,000, decrease \$49,269,000; (5) Iron and Its Products, \$47,565,000, decrease \$42,536,000; (6) Non-Metallic Minerals and Their Products, \$22,862,000, decrease \$6,858,000; (7) Miscellaneous Commodities, \$18,678,000, decrease \$1,213,000; (8) Chemicals and Allied Products, \$16,320,000, decrease \$5,508,000; and (9) Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products, \$7,302,000, decrease \$2,170,000. 



Imports for Canadian Industries, 1930: It will be noted by reference to the statistics in the following table showing "Imports of Sixty-Two Leading Commodities for Canadian Industries" (Calendar Year 1930) that of the total decrease in Canada's imports in 1930, compared with 1929, amounting to \$290,513,000, the decrease in the imports for use in Canadian industries accounted for \$104,816,000 of this amount. While the value of the imports of raw, semi-manufactured and fully manufactured products for Canadian industries amounted to \$275,905,000, compared with a similar import in 1929 of \$381,721,000, decrease \$104,816,000. The proportion of these imports, with decrease, 1930 compared with 1929, according to degree of manufacture, was: raw materials \$143,019,000, decrease \$444,977,000; semi-manufactured \$62,012,000, decrease \$21,205,000; and fully manufactured products \$71,874,000, decrease \$33,634,000.

A further analysis of the statistics in the following table will show that fifty-six of the sixty-two commodities listed show decreases, and six only show increases; while forty-four of the forty-nine commodities for which there are quantity statistics show decreases, and five only show increases. Of the forty-nine



commodities for which there are quantity statistics, four show increases in both quantity and value imported, viz.: tin plate, crude peanut oil, glycerine for explosives, and logs; seven show increase in the quantity imported but a decrease in the value, viz.: bituminous coal, raw silk, raw coffee, woollen yarn, artificial silk yarn and tops, grease for soap and leather, and bristles; one only shows decrease in the quantity imported and increase in the value, viz.: exide of manganese; while thirty-seven show decreases in both quantity and value imported; viz.: crude petroleum, raw cotton, sugar for refining, raw rubber, rough lumber, copper bars and rods, auto engines, raw hides, raw tobacco, skelp iron for pipe, raw wool, iron ore, manila and sisal fibre, wool tops, cotton yarn, sulphur, silk cloth to be dyed, dyeing and tanning materials, alumina and cryolite, cil for soap industry, gums and resins, crude cotton seed oil, pigs, blooms and ingots, rolled iron and steel for agricultural implements, tin in ingots, raw cocoa, rubber, hard, recovered, etc., wire rons for wire-making, dress goods (wool) to be dyed, locomotive tires in the rough, zinc in sheets and plates, boiler plate, sulphate of alumina, sulphate of soda, sand, silica, for industries, ores of metals, and hemp, dressed or undressed. Of the thirteen commodities entered at value only, twelve show decreases, viz.: auto parts, raw furs, unmanuctured leather, iron and steel for agricultural implements, unset diamonds, amond dust or bort, dressed furs, celluloid in lumps, axles for vehicles, natters' materials, veneers of wood, and broom corn; while only one shows an increase, viz.: sausage casings.
