

CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE, CALENDAR YEAR 1931

The general decline in world trade which set in in the fall of 1929, and which continued throughout the year 1930, was severe during 1931, being more marked than during the year 1930, due largely to a further drop in commodity prices. From 1930 to 1931 Canada's import trade showed a greater decline than that of the United States, but the decline in experts was not as pronounced as that of the United States; Canada's imports declining 37.7 per cent compared with 31.7 per cent for the United States, and her exports 31.8 per cent as against 36.9 per cent for the United States.


The trade of both Canada and the United States suffered more from the world-wide depression than the chief commercial countries of Europe, except Germany and Spain. A comparison of the decline in the imports and exports of the chief trading countries of the world with that of Canada and the United States is of special interest. The statistics in the following table showing (1) the percentage of decrease in the trade of twenty-six representative countries for the twelve months ended November 30, 1931, compared with similar period in 1930; and (2) the percentage relation of exports to imports, 1930 and 1931, indicates that each country had a decrease in both imports and exports, except Bulgaria which had an increase of 1.1 per cent in exports; and that twelve of the twenty-six countries had a favourable trade balance in 1931 compared with nine in 1930. It will also be noted that Canada occupied sixth position in respect of decrease in imports, being exceeded by Australia, Spain, Chile, New Zealand and Estonia, while in respect of decrease in exports she occupied eighth place, being exceeded by Germany, Spain, Hungary, United States, British India, United Kingdom and Norway; whereas in regards to trade balance among the twenty-six countries she occupied fourteenth position in 1931 compared with seventeenth position in 1930.

Canada's Position in International Trade. 1931:- In 1930 Canada occupied fifth position in total trade, total imports, but sixth position in total exports, the Netherlands being in sixth place in total trade and total imports, and British India in fifth place in total exports, but inasmuch as for the twelve months ended November 30, 1931, the total trade and total imports of the Netherlands exceeded Canada's total trade by \$46,012,000, and her total imports by \$123,877,000, and that for the same twelve months Canada's total exports exceeded the total exports of British India by \$13,353,000, it is evident that when world-wide statistics are available for the




calendar year 1931, Canada will, in international trade, occupy sixth position in respect of total trade and total imports, yielding up fifth position to the Netherlands, but in regard to total exports she will once more move up to fifth position, British India moving down to sixth place.

Comparison of Volume and Value: In analyzing the trend of general trade it is essential to remember that values do not reveal the true increase or decrease of a country. Changes in the values of imports and exports over a given period may be caused by (a) variations in quantity. (b) fluctuations in price, or (c) combination of these two factors. For instance, for the year ended March 31, 1931, compared with the similar period of 1929-30, on a quantity basis. Canada's imports decreased 16.3 per cent, and her exports 13.3 per cent. but based on declared values the decreases were: imports, 27.4 per cent, and exports 28.6 per cent. A cursory survey would indicate that Canada's decrease in imports and exports for the calendar year 1931 was chiefly due to declines in commodity prices. The statistics in the following table showing the percentage of increase or decrease in the quantity and value of Canada's imports and exports of some forty leading items or group of items, calendar year 1931 compared with 1930, indicate that while the quantities in both imports and exports, as a rule, show decreases, the values of both imports and exports show greater decreases. For instance in imports: raw cotton decreased 5.4 per cent in quantity and 39.1 per cent in value: manila and sisal grass 1 per cent in quantity and 37.7 per cent in value; crude petrologia 1.1; er cent in quantity and 40.4 per cent in value; crude rubber 12.3 per cent in quantity and 52.4 per cent in value; tin in ingots 22.6 per cent in quantity and 39.3 per cent in value; while binder twin increased 78.6 per cent in quantity and only 15.2 per cent in value; raw silk increased 24 per cent in quantity but decreased 1.7 per cent in value; raw wool inc eased 14.7 per cent in quantity but decreased 20.1 per cent in value; and wool noils, tops and waste increased 23.2 per cent in quantity but decreased 7.4 per cent in value; whereas in exports: wheat decreased 6.2 per cent in quantity and 36.6 per cent in value; lead 4.7 per cent in quantity and 43.7 per cent in value; potatoes 13.9 ner cent in quantity and 46.9 per cent in value; wheat flour 24.2 per cent in quantity and 46.2 per cent in value; silver 23 per cent in quantity and 43.6 per cent in value; wood pulp .8.1 per cent in quantity and 23 per cent in value; newsprint paper 13.9 per cent in quantity and 19.5 per cent in value; fish 2.6 per cent in quantity and 18.1 per cent in value; acids, 12.2 per cent in quantity and 30.1 per cent in value; while cheese increased 5.7 per cent in quantity but decreased 19.8 per cent in value; soda compounds increased 12 per cent in quantity but decreased 9.2 per cent in value; and zinc increased 18 per cent in quantity but decreased ll per dent in value.

PERCENTAGE OF INCREASE OF DECREASE IN CANADA'S IMPORTS AND EXPORTS



Analysis of Canada's Trade, 1931:-Canada's total foreign trade during the calendar year 1931 was valued at \$1,245,341,409, compared with a similar trade in 1929 valued at \$2,507.331.122 and in 1930 at \$1,913,939,832; the decrease in 1931 compared with the year 1929 amounting to \$1,261,989,713 or 50.3 per cent, and with the year 1930 to \$658,598,423 or 34.9 per cent. Imports in 1931 show a decrease compared with a similar trade in 1929 and 1930, the decrease compared with 1929 amounting to \$670,894,306 and with 1930 to \$380,381,093, while the exports also show a decrease compared with 1929 and 1970, the decrease in 1931, compared with 1929 amounting to \$591,095,407, and with 1930 to \$288,217,330. During 1931 imports amounted to \$623,098,386, compared with an import of \$1,298,992,692 in 1929 and in 1930 of \$1,008,479,479; the decrease in 1931 compared with the year 1929 tot 1 ling \$670,894,306 or 51.6 per cent and compared with 1930, a decrease of \$380,381,093 or 37-7 per cent, while the exports (domestic and foreign combined) in 1931 were valued at \$617,243,023 compared with an export trade in 1929 valued at \$1,208,338,430 and in 1970 at \$905,460,353; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1929 amounting to \$591,095,407 or 48.9 er cent, and with 1930 to \$288,217,330 or 31.8 per cent. Canada's domestic exports in 1931 were valued at \$605,336,003, in 1929 at \$1,182,412,313, and in 1930 at \$885,996,366; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1929 amounting to \$577,076,310 or 48.8 per cent, and with 1930 to \$280,660,363 or 31.7 per cent. For the twelve months ended Pecember 31, 1931, Canada's trado balance was unfavourable to the extent of \$10,855,763, compared with an unfavourable by the second s \$10,855,363, compared with an unfavourable balance luring the same period in 1929 of \$30,654,262 and in 1930 of \$103,019.126, the improvement in Canada's trade balance in 1931 commared with 1929 amounting to \$79,798,399, and with 1930 to \$92,163,763. The improvement in the trade balance occurred during the last six months of the calendar year 1931.



Trade by Countries, 1931:
The imports from foreign countries during the calendar year 1931 were valued at \$476,001,000, and from the British Empire at \$152,097,000; the decrease in 1931 commared with the same period in 1930, in the case of foreign countries being \$304,627,000, and of the British Empire \$75,754,000; while the exports of Canadian produce to foreign countries amounted to \$384,746,000, and to the British Empire to \$220,590,000; the exports to foreign countries showing a decrease of \$184,374,000, and to the British Empire a decrease of \$95,785,000. From 1930 to 1931 the imports from foreign countries, except the United States, decreased \$44,723,000, while the imports from the British Empire, except the United Kingdom, decreased \$22,590,000; whereas the exports to foreign countries, except the United States, from 1930 to 1931, decreased \$46,224,000, and to the British Empire, except the United States, from 1930 to 1931, decreased \$46,224,000, and to the British Empire, except the United Kingdom, \$31,971,000.

The trade of Canada with the United States in 1931 amounted to \$660,460,000 or 53 per cent of Canada's total trade with the world. In 1931 Canada's imports from the United States were valued at \$393,778,000, and domestic exports at \$257,078,000; the decrease in imports compared with 1930 being \$259,898,000 or 39.8 per cent, and




in domestic exports, \$138,650.000 or 35.1 per cent. The trade of Canada with the United Kingdom comes next in importance. Imports from the United Kingdom in 1931 amounted to \$109,468.000, and domestic exports to \$171,399,000, the decrease in imports, compared with similar trade in 1930, amounting to \$53,164,000 or 32.7 per cent; and in domestic exports to \$67,815,000 or 27.1 per cent.

"Canada's Trade with Principal Countries, 1931", that thirty-one of the thirty-five in 1931, compared with 1930, show decreases in imports and thirty-two decreases in exports. The four countries to show increases in imports were: Australia (\$1,519,000); British South Africa (\$1,464.000), Mexico (\$83,000), and Trinidad and Tobago (\$784,000); while the three countries in exports to show increases were: Denmark (\$84.000). France (\$3,669,000), and the Netherlands (\$2,730,000). Canada's trade with New Zealand, from 1930 to 1931, shows a decrease of \$23,604,000, the decrease in imports accounting for \$13,168,000 of this amount, and in exports for \$10,436,000.

Trade with the United Kingdom: The total trade of Casada with the United Kingdom cluring the calendar year 1931 amounted to \$281,929,565, command with a similar trade in 1929 of \$486,609,121, and in 1930 of \$599,159,483; the decrease in 1931 command with the year 1929 amounting to \$204,679,558 or 42.1 per cent, and compared with 1930 to \$117,229,920 or 29.4 per cent. Imports as also experts in 1931 show a decrease command with 1930, the decrease in imports amounting to \$53,164,320 or 32.7 per cent, and in exports to \$64.065,600 or 27.1 per cent. Imports from the United Kingdom in 1931 were valued at \$109,468,146, in 1929 at \$194,777,650 and in 1930 at \$162,632,456; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1929 amounting to \$83,309,500 or 43.9 per cent, and with 1930 to \$53,164,320 or 32.7 per cent; while total exports from Canada to the United Kingdom in 1931 were valued at \$172,461,417; in 1929 at \$291,831,471 and in 1930 at \$236,527.017; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1939 amounting to \$119,370,054 or 40.9 per cent, and with 1930 to \$64,065,600 or 27.1 per cent. The domestic exports from Canada to the United Kingdom in 1931 were valued at \$171,398,697; in 1929 at \$290,296,803; and in 1930 at \$235,213,959; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1929 amounting to \$118,893,105, or 40.9 per cent, and with 1930 to \$63,815,262 or 27.1 per cent.


The trade balance with the United Kingdom has been favourable to Canada since 1889. For the calemar year 1931 it was favourable to the extent of \$52.993,271, compared with a favourable balance in 1929 of \$37.053,821 and in 1930 of \$73,894,551. Compared with 1929 the trade balance for 1931 was less favourable than for 1929 by \$34,060.550 and for 1930 by \$10,901,280. Canada's favourable trade balance with the United Kingdom is always greater for the last six months of the calendar year than for the first six months, due to the large exports of grain, especially wheat, during the fall months.

The British Preference:- Since the inauguration of the British preference in 1897 statistics giving the average ad valorem rate of duty on dutiable amports into Canada from the United Kingdom and the United States, respectively, have been frequently in use, the average rate of duty being lower on dutiable imports from the United States than from the United Kingdom. It must be remembered, however, in this connection that the dutiable imports from the United Kingdom consist very sargely of highly manufactured commodities, and necessarily are subject to high rates of duty, whereas the dutiable imports from the United States consist, in a large measure, of semi-manufactured commodities for further processing in Caladian industries, and consequently are admitted at a reasonably low rate of duty.

Another factor in Canada's imports from the United Ringdom, compared with those from the United States, which effects the rates of duty for the two countries and which is frequently ignored, is the trade of alcoholic liquors, which are imported in large volume from the United Ringdom, but in very small volume from the United States. Imports of tobacco should also be added, as in almost all countries alcoholic liquors and tobacco are subject to extraordinary high rates of



duty, the principle of tariff makers in dealing with these commodities being not so much protection as the raising of revenue or the discouraging of consumption. In recent years the Canadian Government has considerably expanded the list of commodities which are admitted free under the preferential tariff, but which are dutiable under the intermediate and general tariffs. In 1931 the immorts from the United Kingdom free under the preferential tariff were valued at \$18,283,442. The statistics in the following tables present (1) Immorts without the adjustments of these items, and (2) Immorts with the adjustments. It will be noted from statement No. 2 that the ad valorem rates of duty on dutiable imports from the United Kingdom, after adjustments have been made for the years 1922 to 1931, are lower than for the United States, and that for the year 1951 the average ad valorem rate of duty for the United Kingdom was 15.65 per cent commared with 24.73 per cent for the United States, indicating an advantage under the preference of 9.08 per cent.



Trade with the United States: The total trade of Canada with the United States for the calendar year 1931 amounted to \$660,460,231, commared with a similar trade in 1929, valued at \$1,438,915,424, and in 1930 at \$1,065,892,729: the decrease in 1931 commared with 1929 amounting to \$778,455,193 or 54.1 per cent, and with 1930 to \$405,432,498 or 38.0 per cent. Compared with 1930 the imports in 1931 show a decrease of \$259,898,207 or 39.7 per cent, and exports a decrease of \$145,534,291 or 35.3 per cent. Imports from the United States in 1931 were valued at \$393,778,289, in 1929 at \$893,585,482, and in 1930 at \$653,675,496; the decrease in 1931 compared with 1929 amounting to \$499,807,193 or 55.9 per cent, and with 1930 to \$259,898,207 or 39.7 per cent; while the total exports to the United States amounted to \$266,681,942 in 1931,




\$545,329,942 in 1929, and to \$412,216,233 in 1930; the decrease in 1931 commared with 1929 amounting to \$278,648,000 or 51.1 per cent, and with 1930 to \$145,534,291 or 35.3 per cent. The domestic exports to the United States in 1931 were valued at \$257,073.170, in 1929 at \$522,677,767, and in 1930 at \$395,728.375; the decrease compared with 1929 amounting to \$265,599,597 or 50.8 per cent, and with 1930 to \$138,650,205 or 35.0 per cent.

The trade balance with the United States has been unfavourable to Canada since 1882. For the calendar year 1931 the unfavourable trade balance with the United States amounted to \$127,096,347, compared with an unfavourable balance in 1929 amounting to \$348,255,540, and in 1930 to \$241,460,263. The improvement in Canada's trade balance with the United States in 1931 compared with 1929 amounted to \$221,159.193 and with the year 1930 to \$114,363,916. For the year 1931 the unfavourable trade balance for the last six months totalled \$31,582,570, compared with an unfavourable balance for the first six months of \$95,513,777. For the last half of the year 1931 the improvement in the unfavourable trade balance with the United States compared with the same period in 1930 was \$74,097,848..


Aralysis of Commodity Trade, 1931:- The decrease in the imports in 1931 comnared with 1930, amounting to \$380,381,093, and in domestic exports, amounting to \$280,660,363, occurred in each of the nine main groups of import and export trade. The value of each import group, arranged in order of importance, with decrease 1931 compared with each identical group in 1930, was: (1) Agricultural and Vegetable Products. \$134,433,000, decrease of \$57,836,000; (2) Iron and Its Products, \$116,209,000, decrease \$107.482,000; (3) Non-Metallic Minerals and Their Products, \$106,088,000, decrease 8.761,000; (4) Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products, \$90,152,000, decrease \$58,998,000; (5) Miscellaneous Commodities, \$47,659,000, decrease \$16,734,000; (6) Non-Ferrous Metals and Their Products, \$38,667,000. decrease \$29,642,000; (7) Wood, Food Products and Paper, \$34,923,000, decrease \$15,050,000; (8) Chemicals and Allied Products, \$31,337,000, decrease \$5,448,000; and (9) Animals and Animal Products, \$28,630,000, decrease \$30,430,000; while the value of each export group arranged in order of importance, with decrease, 1931 compared with each similar group in 1930, was: (1) Agricultural and Vegetable Products, \$209,761.000; decrease \$105,491,000; (2) Wood, Wood Products and Paper, \$185,493,000, decrease \$64,197,000; (3) Non-Ferrous Metals and Their Products, \$73,842,000, decrease \$41,925,000; (4) Animals and Animal Products, \$70,938,000, decrease \$20.622,000; (5) Iron and Its Products, \$19,086,000, decrease \$28,480,000; (6) Miscellancous Commodities, \$14,955,000, decrease \$3,683,000; (7) Non-Metallic Minerals and Their Products, \$14,977,000, decrease \$7,885,000; (8) Chemicals and Allied Products, \$10,849,000, decrease \$5,471,000; and (9) Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products, \$5,394,000, decrease \$1,908,000.
