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CANA'A'S FCREIGN TRADE, CALENDAR YEAR 1933.
The general decline in world trade which had its inception during the fall of 1929, and which continuec throughout the years 1930, 1931 and 1932, was especially severe during the year 1931, and not so marked in 1932. The increasesin tariffs, extension of exchange control:, end deprectaitne currencies, as well as quotas and other trade restrictions, interfered with the free movement of comodities betmeen nations. The trade of Canada, both import and export, during the years 1930. 1931 and 1932, in general With that of the chief commercial countries of the morla, shows a very marked decline, reflecting the gereral economic depression in trado and industry in these years. World trade, as weli as that for Canada, shoms an upard trend during the last six months ci 1933.

Canada:s trade for the past ten years may be divided into three distinct perlods: (1) 1924 to 1029, of expending trade: (2) 1930 to 1932, of general trade uepression; add (3) 2933, of improvement in trade. The decline in Canada's import trade, however, was much eraater then in her exporit trade. The statistics in the following table give the percentages of increase or decrease in Canada's imports and exports on a relue and volume basis, for the calendsr years 1930 to 1933. It will be noted that Canada's inroorts for 1933 compared with 1932, shom a decrease of 11.3 per cent on a value basis, and 7.7 per cent on a volume basis, while the Dominion's exports show an increase of 7.6 fer cent on a value as well as on a volume basis.

## Canada's Trade Shows Upward Trend:-

The upward trend in the total trade of Canada which began in May, 1933, continued during each month from June to December. The Dominion's total trade for the calendar year 1933 amounted to $\$ 938,762,000$, compared with $\$ 954,453,000$ in 1932, the decrease amounting to $\$ 15,691,000$ or 1.7 per cent. From January to April, 1933, compared with simlar months in 1932, the decrease in the total trade varied from 22.9 to 38.9 per cent; in May the decrease was only 7.7 per cent, and in June 2.7 per cent; but from July to December the increase in the total trade varled from 7.0 to 25.7 per cent. Canada's imports in 1933 compared with 1932 decreased from $\$ 452,614,000$ to $\$ 401,254,000$, the decrease amounting to $\$ 51,360,000$ or 11.3 per cent. From January to June, 1933, the decrease in imports compared with similar months of last year, varied from 17.5 to 42.6 per cent; in July the increase was 0.1 per cent; in August it was 6.1 per cent; and from Sentember to December the increase varied from 10.7 to 22.1 per cent. Canada's domestic exports for the calendar year 1933 totalled $\$ 531,474,000$, and in 1932, $\$ 493,809,000$, the increase emounting to $\$ 37,665,000$ or 7.6 per cent. From January to April, 1933, compared with similar months in 1932, the decrease in Conada's exports varied from 8.0 to 27.5 per cent, but from May to December the increase varied from 8.3 to 37.0 per cent.

Canada's Position in International Trade, 1933:- Canada, during the calendar year 1933, has maintained a relatively high place amongst the leading cormerciel nations of the world in international trade. In 1932 the Dominion occupied seventh (7) place in total trade, eighth (8) place in imports, and fifth (5) place in exports. In the calendar year 1933 there have been some notable changes in the relative position of certain chief trading countries of the world. The United Kingdom has moved from third (3) position in 1932 up to second (2) position in 1933 in the value of exports, displacing Germany, while Canada has moved from fifth (5) place in 1932 down to sixth (6) place in 1933. being displaced by ielgium. For the calendar year 1933 Belgian exports exceeded those for Ceneda by only $\$ 10,000,000$, while for the period July-Decemier, 1933, the exports from Canada amounted to $\$ 325,400,000$, compared $\pi 1$ th a similar trade for

Belgim of $\$ 297,700,000$, so that during this period Canada occupied fifth (5) position in export trade. In import trade Canada moved from eighth (8) place down to ninth (9) place, yielding up eighth (8) place to Italy, while in total trade she moved from seventh (7) place in 1932 down to ninth (9) place in 1933, Japan moving from ninth (9) place up to seventh (7), and Italy occupying eighth (8) place in 1933 as in 1932.

The statistics in the following table showing Percentage of Increase or Decrease, 1933 compared with 1932; also Percentage Relation of Exports to Imports, 1932 and 1933, in the trade of twenty-six (26) representative trading countries, indicate an upward trend in world trade in 1933. Of the twenty-six (26) principal countries mentioned in the table, seventeen (17) show increases in imports, and twentyone (21) in exports. It will also be observed that Canada in percentage of increase or decrease in her trade amongst the twenty-six (26) treding countries occupled twentyfourth (24) position in imports, and sixteenth (16) position in exports; while in percentage relation of her exports to imports with the twenty-six (26) countries, she occupied fifth (5) position in 1933, compared with ninth (9) position in 1932. The four countries to have a higher percentage relation of exports to imports than Canada in 1933. $\pi$ ere: Australia, Finland, Hungary and Peru; and in 1932 the eight countries were: Argentina, Australia, Finland, Germany, New Zealend, Peru, Poland and the United States.

 comparing trace for dilierent periods, that values are not necessarily a true measure of the ciuantity or volume of merchandise involved. Changes in the nominal values of imports and exports over a given period may be caused by (a) variations in quantity; (b) fluctuations in price; or (c) combination of these factors. A preliminary compilation has been made compartine the value and volume of Canada's crade for the calendar year 1933 with the for 2932 . The results are set forth in the following table. The declared values by mein gaoups are shown for 1932 and 1933, together with the valuesobiained by re-valuing the quantities of 1933 at tha average import and export prices prevailing in 1932. This eliminates the element of price fluctuation and permits a comerison of the volumo as tracia in tha two years. It will be noted that the declared value of morts feli trom $\$ 452,614,000$ in 1932 to $\$ 401,254,000$ in 1933, a decline of $\$ 51,300,000$. If prices had not fallen from the 1932 level, the value of imoorts in 1933 morld keve amounted to $\$ 417,833,000$, and the decline mould have boen reduced to $\$ j+781,000$. The cieciarcd value on exports increased from $\$ 493,810,000$ in 1932 to $\$ 531,475,000$ in 2933, Fipresenting an increase of $\$ 37,665,000$. If prices had remained as they mere in 1932, the orports in 1933 would have been morth $\$ 531,504,000$ being an increase of $\$ 37,634,000$. It vilil thus be seen that the increase in exporta this year is entirely due to increased volume which was only slightly offset by a decline in prices.

The statistics in the folicwing table show the percentage incieases and decreases in vaiue and volume of dmports and emports by main grouns for each of the years 1931, 1932. and 1933, as commarad with the years 1930, 1931 pind 1932, respectively. It will be seen that the declining tondency of recent years has been reversed in the case of exports, kinch show inciease, in both vaiue and volume for 1933 over 1932, as contrasted

W1th decreases in the previous years. The increase in exports is entirely due to increased volume, the increase of 7.6 per cent in volume comparing with the same percentage increase in declared value. Imports, however, continue to regintor declines but on a smaller scale than in previous years. It will be noted that the decrease in imports in 1933 compared with 1932 is largely a matter of price. the declared value falling by 11.3 per cent as compared with only 7.7 per cent in volume.

The statistics in the following table showing the percentages of inerease or decrease in the quantity and value of Canada's imports and exports of some fortyfive (45) representative commodities or groups of commodities, calendar year 1933 compared with 1932, indicate that the quantities in both imports and exports show some remarkable increases. In the list of forty-five (45) import commodities, eighteen (18) show increases in the quantity in 1933 compared with thirteen (13) last year: while thirty-tmo (32) of the forty-five (45) export comodities show inereases in the quantity in 1933 compared with nine (9) in 1932.

Analysis of Canada's Total Trade, 1
1933:-
The total external trade of Canada during the calendar year 1933 was valued at $\$ 935,762,000$, compared with a similar trade in 1931 valued at $\$ 1,2145,341,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 954,453.000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with the year 1931 anounting to $\$ 306,579,000$ or 24.6 per cent; end with the year i932 to $\$ 15,691,000$ or 1.7 ras. cent. Imports in 1933 show a decrease conpared with a similar trade in 1931 and 1932, the decrease compared rith 1931 amounting to \$e? 6, 844,000, and rith 1932 to $\$ 51,350,000$; while the exports also show a decrense compared $w^{2}$ th 1931, but an increase compered with 1932, the decrease amounting to $\$ 79,735,000$, and the increase to $\$ 35,669,00 c$. During 1933 imports amounted to $\$ 401,254,000$, comparod with an import of $\$ 628,008,00$ ) in 1931 . and in 1932 of $\$ 452,614,000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with the year 1931 amouating

to $\$ 226,844,000$ or 36.1 per cent, and compared with 1932 to $\$ 51,360,000$ or 11.3 por cent; while the total exports in 1933 were valued at $\$ 537,508,000$, compared with an export trade in 1931 valued at $\$ 617,243,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 501,839,000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 amounting to $\$ 79,735,000$ or 12.9 per cent, but compared with 1932 the increase was $\$ 35,669,000$ or 7.1 per cent. Canada's domestic exports in 1933 were valued at $\$ 531,474,000$; in 1931 at $\$ 605,336,000$; and in 1932 at $\$ 493,809,000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 amounting to $\$ 73,862,000$ or 12.2 per cent, but compared with 1932 the increase totalled $\$ 37,665,000$ or 7.6 per cent.

For the twelve months ended December 31, 1933, Canada's visible trade balance was favourable to the extent of $\$ 136,254,000$, compared with an unfavourable balance during the same period in 1931 of $\$ 10,855,000$, and afavourable balance in 1932 of $\$ 49,225,000$, the improvement in Canada's visible trade malance in 1933 compared 71 th 1931 amounting to $\$ 147,109,000$, and with 1932 to $\$ 87,029,000$. If the trade in merchandise and coin and bullion are added tocether the trade balance with the world in 1933 mas favourable to the extent of $\$ 197,716,000$, compared with a favourable balance in 1931 of $\$ 59,916,000$, and in 1932 of $\$ 109,892,000$.

Imports into Canada by Countries, 1933:- Canada's total imports from all countries for the twelve months ended December 31, 1933, totalled $\$ 401,254,311$, compared with $\$ 452,614,257$, during the same period in 1932, the decrease in 1933 compared with 1932 amounting to $\$ 51,359,946$ or 11.3 per cent; whereas the Dominion's total fmports from Empire countries were valued at $\$ 132,766,413$ in 1933, and in 1932 at $\$ 128,057,615$, the increase in 1933 over 1932 amounting to $\$ 4,708,798$ or 3.7 per cent (imports from the United Kingdom increased from $\$ 93,508,143$ to $\$ 97,960,008$ or 4.8 per cent); while total imDorts from foreign countries in 1933 mounted to $\$ 268,487,898$, and in 1932 to $\$ 324,556$, 642, the decrease, 1933 compared with 1932, amounting to $\$ 56,068,744$ or 17.3 per cent (imports from the United States decreased from $\$ 263,549,346$ to $\$ 217,292,236$ or 17.6 per cent). In 1932 Empire countries supplied Canade with 28.3 per cent of her total imports, and foreign countries with 71.7 per cent, but in 1933 Empire countries supplied 33.1 per cent, and foreign countries 66.9 per cent.

Trade of Canada with United Kingdom, 1933:- Canada's total trade with the United Kingdom during the calendar year 1933 amounted to $\$ 308,991,000$, compared with a similar trade in 1931 valued at $\$ 282,066,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 272,603,000$; the increase in 1933 compared with the year : S.1. amounting to $\$ 26,925,000$ or 9.6 per cent, and with 1932 to $\$ 36,388,000$ or 13.4 per cont. Tmports, as also exports, show increases, the increase in lmports amounting to $\$ 4,452,000$, and in exports to $\$ 31,936,000$. Imports from the United Kingdom in 1933 were valued at $\$ 97,960,000$; in 1931 at $\$ 109,468,000$; and in 1932 at $\$ 93.508,000$, the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 totalling $\$ 11,508,000$ or 10.5 per cent, but compared with 1932 the increase amounted to $\$ 4,452,000$ or 4.8 per cent; while total export f from Canade to the United Kingdom in 1933 mere valued at $\$ 211,031,000$, in 1931 at $\$ 172,598,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 179,095,000$, the increase in 1933 compared with 1931 amountin to $\$ 38,433,030$ or 22.3 per cent, ar:d with 1932 to $\$ 31,936,000$ or 17.9 per cent. The domestic exports from Canada to the United Kingdom in 1933 were valued at $\$ 210,414,000$; in 1.931 at $\$ 171,535,000$; ond in 1932 at $\$ 178,172,000$; the domestic exnorts, 1933 compared with 1931 showing an increase of $\$ 38,879,000$ or 22.7 per cent, and with 1932, of $\$ 32,242,000$ or 18.1 per cent.

The visible trade balance with the United Kingdom has been favourable to Canada each yenr sinco 1889. For the celendar yeaz 1933 it was favourable to the extent of $\$ 113,071,000$, in 1931 of $\$ 63,130,000$, and in 1932 of $\$ 85,587,000$. Compared with 1931 the fevourable trade balance 1 n. 1933 shows an 1 mprovement of $\$ 49,941,000$, and with 1932 an imp rovement of $\$ 27,484,000$. Canada's favourable trade balance with the United Kingdom is always greater during the last. six months of the calendar year than for the first six months, due to the large exports of grain, especially wheat, during the fall months. If the trade in merchandise and coin and builion are combined, the favourable trade balance with the United Kingdom amounted to $\$ 156,331,000$ in 1933, compared with a favourable balance in 1931 of $\$ 63,113,000$, and in 1932 of $\$ 85,572,000$.

## Pre British Preference:- Since the inauguration of the British Preference in

 1897, statistics giving the average ad valorem rate of duty on dutioble imports into Canada from the United Kingdom and the United States, respectively, have been frequently in use, the average rate of duty being lower on dutiable imports from the United States than from the United Kingdom. It must be remembered, however, in this connection, that the dutiable imports from the United Kingdom consist very largely of highly manufactured comodities, and necessarily are subject to high rates of duty, whereas the dutiable imports from the United States consiat, in a large measure, of semi-manufactured commodities for further processing in Canadian industries, and consequently, are admitted at a reasonably low rate of duty.Another factor in Canada's imports from the United Kingdom, compared with those from the United States, which affects the rates of duty for the two countries, and which is frequently ignored, is the trade of alcoholic liquors, which are imported in large volume from the United Kingdom, but in vary small volume from the United States. Imports of tobacco should alsobe added, as in alnost all countries alcoholic liquors and tobacco are subject to extraordinary high rates of duty. In recent yoars the Canadian Government has considerably expanded the list of comodities which are admitted free under the Preferential Tariff, but which are dutiable under the Intermediate and General Tariffs. In 2933 the imports from the United Kingdom free under the Preferential Tariff were valued at $\$ 22,014,358$. The statistice in the following tables present (1) Imports without the adjustments of these iteme; and (2) Imports with the adjustments. It will be noted from statement No. 2 that the ad valorem rates of duty on dutiable imports from the United Kingdom, after adjustments have been made for the years 1922 to 1933, are lower than for the United States, and that for the year 1933 the average ad valorem rates of duty for the United Kingdom mere: 1931, 15.65 per cent; 1932, 18.62 per cent; and 1933. 14.51 per cent; and for the United States: 1931. 24.73 per cent; $1932,27.45$ per cent; and $1933,28.06$ per cent; indicating an advantage to the United Kingdom under the Preference of 9.08 per cent in 1931: 8.83 per cent in 1932 ; and 13.55 per cent in 1933.

## Trade of Canada with 3mplre Countries; 1933:- The tendency of Canada's trade, quite apart from the Trade

Agrements, during the past three or four years has been towards a greater exchange of compodities with Empire countries. The statistics in the following table showing "Proportion of Canada's Imports from and Exports to Empire and Foreign Countries, Calendar Years 1928 to $1933^{\prime \prime}$, indicate that the proportion of Canada's imports from Hmpire countries from 1929 to 1933 increased from 19.8 to 33.1 per cent, and exports to, from 33.4 to 48.0 per cent; while the proportion of imports from foreign countries decreased from 80.2 to 66.9 per cent, and exports to, from 66.6 to 52.0 per cent. During the same interval the proportion of Canade's imports from the United Kingdom increased from 15.0 to 24.4 per cent, and exports to, fypm 24.5 to 39.6 per cent; while importa from the United States decreased from 68.8 to 54.2 per cent, and export: to, from 44.2 to 32.1 per cent.

It may be of special interest th point out that the trade statistics of the United Kingdom indicate a marked tendency jowards Fmpire trading. The imposition of Customs duties by the United Kinedom in November, 1931, and March, 1932, on foreign imports. 1.e.. imports non-British, evidently had the effect of curtailing imports from foreign countries. The statistics in the follow ng table relative to the "Trade of the United Kingdom, Calendar Years 1930 to $1933^{\prime \prime}$, indicate that imports from foreign countries from 1931 to 1933 decreased from $£ 613,836,000$ to $£ 426,389,000$, while imports from Empire countries increased from $\{? 47,416,000$ to $£ 2 \nmid 9,450,000$; whereas domestic exports to foreign countries during the same interval dncreased from $\& 219,949,000$ to $£ 203,889,000$; while domestic exports to Empire countries decreased from $£ 170,673,000$ to $£ 163,535,000$. During the seme period imports from Canade increased from $£ 32,841,000$ to $£ 46,218,000$; while imports from the United States decreased from $£ 104,009,000$ to $£ 75,790,000$; whereas

domestic exports to Canada decreased from $220,551,000$ to $\$ 17,510,000$ : while domestic exports to the United States increased from $£ 18,246,000$ to $£ 19,054,000$.

In 1931 Empire countries furnished the United Kingdom with 28.7 per cent of her total imports, but in 1933 the proportion was 36.9 per cent; while the proportion from foreign countries during the same period fell from 71.3 to 63.1 per cent: whereas from 1931 to 1933 the proportion of imports from Canada rose from 3.8 to 6.9 per cent; while the proportion from the United States fell from 12.1 to 11.2 per cent. Domestic exports to Fmpire countries in 1931 amounted to 43.7 per cent of the total domestic exports from the United Kingdom, but in 1933 the proportion was 44.5 per cent, compared with 45.4 per cent in 1932; while the proportion to foreign countries in 1931 totalled 56.3 per cent, in 1932. 54.6 per cent, and in 1933. 55.5 per cent; whereas the proportion exported to Canada in 1931 was 5.3 per cent, in 1932 , 4.5 per cent, and in 1933, 4.8 per cent; while the rroportions exported to the United States were: 4.7 per cent in 1931, 4.1 per cent in 1932 , and 5.2 per cent in 1933.

Trade of Canada with the United Statos, 1933:- Canada's total trade with the United States for the calendar year 1933 amounted to $\$ 392,538,000$, compared with a similar trade in 1931 valued at $\$ 660,321,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 432,497,000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 amounting to $\$ 267,783,000$ or 40.5 per cent, and with 1932 to $\$ 39.959 .000$ or 9.2 per cent. Compared with 1932 imports in 1933 shom a decrease of $\$ 46,257,000$ or 17.6 per cent, and exports an increase of $\$ 6,298,000$ or 3.7 per cent. Imports from the United States in 193; mere valued at $\$ 217,292,000$, in 1931 at $\$ 393,775,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 263.549,000$; the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 emounting to $\$ 176,483,000$ or 44.8 per cent, and with 1932, to $\$ 46,257,000$ or 17.6 per cent; while the total exporta to the United States amounted to $\$ 175,246,000$ in 1933, $\$ 266,546,000$ in 1931, and $\$ 168,948,000$ in 1932; the decrease in 1933 compared with 1931 amounting to $\$ 91,300,000$ or 34.3 per cent, but compared with 1932 the increase was $\$ 6.298,000$ or 3.7 per cent. Canada's domestic exports to the United States in 1933 were valued at $\$ 170,534,000$, in 1931 at $\$ 256,942,000$, and in 1932 at $\$ 162,631,000$; the decrease in 1933 campared with 1931 amounting to $\$ 86,408,000$ or 33.6 per cent, but comered with 1932 the increase amounted to $\$ 7,903,000$ or 4.9 per cent.

The visible trade balance with the United States has been unfavourable to Canada each year since 188?. For the calendar year 1933 the unfavourable trade balance with the United States amounted to $\$ 42,046,000$, compared with an unfavourable balance in 1929 amounting to $\$ 348,256,000$, in 1930 to $\$ 241,461,000$, in 1931 to $\$ 127,229,000$, and in 1932 to $\$ 94,601,000$. The improvement in Canada's unfavourable trade balance with the United States in 1933 commered with 1931 was $\$ 85,183,000$, and with the year 1932 it was $\$ 52,555,000$. If, however, the trade in merchandise and coin and bullion are combined, the trade balance with the United States was unfavourable in 1933 to the extent of $\$ 23,828,000$, compared with an unfovourable belance in 1931 of $\$ 56,899,000$, and in 1932 of $\$ 35,40 \%, 000$.

value, while twenty-one (21) show decreases in both the quantity and value. Of the forty-nine (49) comodities entered at value only, six (6) show increases, and fortythree (43) decreases.

In the case of the United Kingdom an analysis of the imports therefrom shows that there were imports under ninety-six of the one hundred comodities listed. There wera no imports from the United Kingdom in 1933 of sugar for refining, gasoline, raw silk, and iron ore. Of the ninety-six (96) commodities imported from the United Kingdom in 1933, compared with 1932, forty-three (43) show increases, and iffty-three (53) decreases. Of the forty-six (46) commodities imported from the United Kingdom for which there were quantity statistics, twenty-four (24) show increases in both the quantity and the value; three (3) show increases in the quantity but decreases in the value; three (3) show decreases in the quantity but increases in the value; while sixteen (16) show decreases in both the quantity and the value. Of the fifty (50) commodities which ware entered at value only, eighteen (18) show increases, and thirtytwo (32) decreases.

In the case of the United States, however, an analysis of the commodities imported indicatesthat there were imports under ninety-seven (97) of the commodities listed. There were no imports under spirits, distilled, sugar for refining, and Wines. Of the ninety-seven (97) commodities imported from the United States, twentyseven (27) show increases and seventy (70) decreases. With regard to the forty-alght (48) commodities for which there were quantity statistics, thirteen (13) show increases in both the quantity and the value; three (3) show increases in the quantity but decreases in the value; four (4) show decreases in the quantity but increases in the value, and twenty-aight (28) show decreases in both the quantity and the value. Of the forty-nine (49) comodities enterad at value only, ten (10) show incraases and thirty-nine (39) decreases.

Cenada's Princinal Emorts, 1933:- The statistics in the attached tabies showing "(a) Cenada's Donectic Brports by Main Groups, with Amounts Exported to the United Kingdcm and the United States", and "(b) Sovoniy Leading Canedian Commodities Exported from Canada, with lmounts Exported to the United Kingdom and the United States", indicate that the total clonestic exports for the calendas year 1933 to (a) All Countries, were valued at $\$ 531,474,000$; (3) the United Kingdom at $\$ 210,414,000$; and (c) the United States at $\$ 170,534,000$; the incrense for the year 1933 over 1932 amounting to (e) Ail Countries, $\$ 37.665,000$ or 7.6 per cent: (b) the Unitted Kingdom, $\$ 32,242,000$ or 13.1 per cent; and (c) the Unised States, $\$ 7.904$. 000 or 4.9 per cent. There were increases in seven (7) of the nine (9) main groups of exports, the Aericultural and Vegetable Products group, and the Food, Mood Products and Paper eroup showing decreases. S1x (6) of the main groupe exported to the United Kingdom show increases, viz.: Agricultural and Vegetable Products; Animals and Animal Prom ducts; Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products; Wood, Wood Products and Peper: Non-Ferrous

Metals and Products；and Non－Metallic Minerals and Products；while seven（7）of the main groups exported to the United States show increases，viz．：Agricultural and Vegetable Products；Animals and Animal Products；Fibres，Textiles and Textile Products： Iron and Its Products；Non－Metallic Minerals and Products；Chemicals and Allied Pro－ ducts；and Miscollaneous Comodities．With respect to table（b）Seventy Leading Comodities Exnorted from Canada，1933，it $w 111$ be noted that the total declared value of these commodities exported to（a）All Countries amounted to $\$ 490,682,000$ or 92.3 per cent of the total domestic exports；（b）the United Kingdom，$\$ 196,449,000$ or 93.4 per cent of the Dominion＇s exports to the United Kingdom；and（c）the United States， $\$ 157,619,000$ or 92.4 ner cent of Canada＇s exports to the United States．

An anelysis，in the cose of exnorts to All Countries，indicates that of the geventy（70）comodities exported in 1933 compared with 1932，forty－three（43）show increases，and twenty－seven（27）show decreases．With roference to the fifty－four（54） comodities for which there were quantity statistics，thirty（30）show increases in both the quantity and value；five（5）increases in the quantity but decreases in the velue；threa（3）decreases in the quantity but increases in the value；while sixteen （16）shom decreases in both the quantity and value．Of the sixteon（16）comodities for which there were no quantity statistics，being entered at value only，ten（1）show increases，and six（6）decreases．

In the case of domestic exports to the Jnited Kingdom，an analysis shows that of the commodities listed as exported to the United Kingdom，forty－two（42）show increases and twenty－one（21）decreases．Under the following heads there were no exports to the Unlted Kingdom，Viz．：Pulptood；electrical energy；potatoes；poles，telegraph and teleohohe；gasoline and naphtha；malt；laths（wood）；crude petroleum；and refined sugar $\mathrm{or}^{\text {or }}$ if there were any exports they were volued at less than $\$ 500$ ．Of the forty－ aix（46）commodities exported to the United Kingdom for which there were quantity statistics，twenty－seven（27）show increases in both quantity and value；six（6）show increases in the quantity but decreases in the velue；one（1）shows decrease in the quantity but increase in the value；while twelve（12）show decreases in both the quan－ tity and velue．Of the seventeen（17）comodities for which there were ho quentity statistics，fourteen（14）show increases，and three（3）decreases．

With reference to the exports to the United States for which there were export figures，thirty－six（36），in 1933 commared with 1932，show increases，and thirty－two （32）decreases．There were no emports to the United States under the following heads． viz．：Barley；rubber footwear；oatmeal and rolled oats；platinum concentrates；and refined sugar；or if there were any exports they were less then $\$ 500$ ．Of the fifty－ one（51）comodities exported to the United States for which there were quantity statiatics，twenty－eight（28）shom increases in both the quantity and value；two（2） show decreases in the quantity but increeses in the value；and twenty－one（21）show decreases in both the quantity and velue．With respect to the axports which were entered at value only，eight（8）show increases，and nine（9）decreases．

Tmports for Canadien Industries, 1933:- An analysis of the statistics in the folloving table givirg "Imports of Sixu: Two Landing Commodizies for Canadinn Industries, 1933", indicates that one-third of Canada's total irnorts consists of commodities for use of the various industries of the Dominion. The totol value of the sixty-tmo (62) commodities imported for Canadion Cidustries in 1933 mounted to $\$ 147,070,000$, compared with $\$ 146,149,000$ in 1932 , the incrense amounting $10 \$ 921,000$ or 0.6 per cent; while the total decrease of Caneda's total imports was $\$ 51,360,000$ or 11.3 per cent. In 1932 , however, the decrease ib the imports of commodities for Canadian industries, comared $\mathbb{T}$ ith 1931, was about 1 per cent. If. however you eliminate from Canada's total imports in 1932 and 1933. the value of Canada's imports of the sixty-two (62) commodities for Canadian iniustries, the imorts of liOther Commodities" not for Canadian industries in 1932 rere valued at $\$ 306,1+65,000$, and in 1933 at $\$ 254,184,000$, the decrease in commodities not for Canadian industries fmounting to $\$ 52,047,000$ or 17.0 per cent. The imports, therefore, of commodities for the use of Canadian industries from 1932 to 1933 increasod 0.6 per cent, while commodities not for Canadian industries decreased 17.0 per cent.

A further amaysis of tha statistics in the folloning thblo shows that twentyeitht (28) of the sixty-tro (6?) comodities listed had increases in 1933 compared :rith 1932, and thirt -four (3't) rad decreases. Last year the mumber of items that had decreases was fifty-four (54). Of the forty-eight (48) commodities for which there were quantity statistics in 1933, nineteen (19) had increases in both the quantity and value, eight (8) had increasas in the quantity but decreases in the value; five (5) had ievreases in the quantity but increases in the valuo; whilo sixteen (16)
had decreases in both the quantity and the value. Of the fourteen (14) commodities entered at value only, five (5) had increases and nine (9) decreases. During 1933, 51.9 per cent of the total imports listed as for Canadian industries was raw materials; 20.6 per cent semi-manufactured products; and 27.5 per cent fully manufactured products.

Canada, in common with every manufacturing country of the world, is, to a greater or less extent, dependent on imported raw materials for certain of her manufacturing industries, viz.: raw rubber, raw cotton, raw silk, sisal fibre, iron ore, bauxite, suiphur, mareenese oxide, crude cotton seed oil, crude peanut oil, raw cocoa, cocoanut oll, etc. An increase or decrease in the volume of the imports of these raw materials invariably reflects a speeding up or slowing down of those industries which dopend alnost wholly on imforted raw materials.

The statistics in the following table show the number of increases or decreases in the si-ty-two (62) commoditics imported for Canadian industries, 1932 compared with 1931, and J. 933 with 1932:-
