Canada's trade for the past twelve years may be divided into three distinct periods: (1) 1924 to 1929, a period of expanding trade; (2) 1930 to 1933, characterised by general trade depression, though exports showed a slight increase in 1933 over 1932; and (3) 1934 and 1935, a time of trade recovery. The decline in Canada's imports, however, was much greater than in exports. The statistics in the following table give the percentages of increase or decrease in Canada's imports and exports on a value and volume basis, for the calendar years 1930 to 1935. It will be observed that the Dominion's imports in 1935 compared with 1934, show an increase of 7.2 per cent on a value basis, and 9.7 per cent on a volume basis; while exports show an increase of 11.6 per cent on a value basis, and 10.8 per cent on a volume basis. The expansion in 1935 compared with 1934 was therefore a result of both rising prices and larger volume.

In comparison with the trade of the United Kingdom and the United States, Canada's trade on a percentage basis has made a greater recovery than that of the United Kingdom, though not so great as that of the United States. During 1935 Canada's imports increased 7.2 per cent, compared with 1.8 per cent for the United Kingdom, and 26.6 per cent for the United States; her exports increased 11.6 per cent, as against 6.2 per cent for the United Kingdom, and 8.4 per cent for the United States; while her total trade increased 9.7 per cent, contrasted with an increase of 3.4 per cent for the United Kingdom, and 16.4 per cent for the United States.

Canada's Position in International Trade, 1935:- During the calendar year 1935, Canada maintained a relatively high position amongst the leading commercial nations of the world in international trade, occupying sixth place in 1935, as against eighth place last year, being exceeded in value of total trade in 1935 only by the United Kingdom, the United States, Germany, France and Japan. In import trade Canada in 1935 was in ninth place, as last year, being exceeded in value of imports by the United Kingdom, the United States, Germany, France, Japan, the Netherlands, Italy, and Belgium; while in export trade she occupied fifth position in 1935 as in 1934, being exceeded in value of exports by the United States, the United Kingdom, Germany and France.

The following table gives further details respecting the relative position of the leading commercial countries of the world.

Upward Trend in World Trade, 1935:- The statistics in the following table showing "Net Imports and Domestic Exports of Twenty-Four Leading Countries of the World, Calendar Year 1935 Compared with 1934", indicate an upward swing in world trade in 1935, as the total trade of these twenty-four countries, which comprise about 75 per cent of total world trade, from 1934 to 1935, increased from \$28,099,440,000 to \$29,263,582,000; imports, from \$14,963,112,000 to \$15,540,746,000; and domestic exports from \$13,136,328,000 to \$13,722,836,000. In 1935 compared with 1934, sixteen of the twenty-four countries in imports show increases and eight decreases; in exports, fifteen show increases and nine decreases; while nine out of the twenty-four countries had a favourable trade balance in 1934, and eleven in 1935.

It will be noted from the table that Canada, in value of her total trade, occupied sixth position in 1935, as compared with eighth in 1934; while in imports she occupied ninth position in 1934 and in 1935; and fifth position in domestic exports in 1934 and in 1935. It will also be noted that Canada in percentage of increase in her trade amongst the twenty-four trading countries occupied tenth place in imports, and fifth place in exports. The countries which show a larger percentage of increase in imports are: Argentina, United States, Greece, Hungary, New Zealand, Australia, Sweden, Norway, and Finland; and in exports, Argentina, Greece, Hungary, and Japan. In percentage relation of exports to imports amongst the twenty-four countries, Canada occupied fourth place in 1934, being exceeded by New Zealand, Mexico and Argentina, and first place in 1935, Argentina being in second place, and New Zealand in third place.

Comparison of Value and Volume of Canada's Trade, 1934 and 1935. It is important to bear in mind, in comparing trade for various periods, that values are not necessarily a measure of the quantity or volume of merchandise involved. Changes in the values of imports and exports over a given period may be caused by variations in quantity, fluctuations in price, or by a combination of these factors. A preliminary compilation has been made comparing the value and volume of Canada's trade for the calendar year 1935 with that for 1934. The results are set forth in the following table. The declared values by main groups are shown for 1934 and 1935, together with the values obtained by re-valuing the quantities of 1935 at the average import and export prices prevailing in 1934. This eliminates the element of price fluctuation and permits a comparison of the volume of trade in the two years. It will be noted that the declared value of imports increased from \$513,469,000 in 1934 to \$550,315,000 in 1935. This increase is characteristic of each of the nine main groups. If prices had not risen from the 1934 level the value of imports would have increased nevertheless to \$563,054,000, or an increase of \$49,585,000. Exports also increased substantially both in value and volume, rising from \$653,312,000 to \$729,294,000 in declared value, and to \$723,709,000 after allowance for the element of rising prices. It will thus be seen that the expansion of trade in 1935 over 1934 is a result of both rising prices and larger volume.

Upward Trend in Canada's Trade, 1935:— The Dominion's total trade for the calendar year 1935 valued at \$1,292,667,000, in 1932 at \$954,453,000, in 1933 at \$938,998,000, and in 1934 at \$1,173,297,000; representing an increase in 1935 over 1932 of \$338,214,000 or 35.4 per cent, over 1933 of \$353,669,000 or 37.7 per cent, and over 1934 of \$118,876,000 or 10.2 per cent. The total trade of Canada during each month of the calendar year 1935 exceeded similar monthly trade during 1932 and 1933, and also during 1934, with the exception of the month of June. Canada's imports for the year 1935 amounted to \$550,314,000, in 1932 to \$452,614,000, in 1933 to \$401,214,000, and in 1934 to \$513,469,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$97,700,000 or 21.6 per cent, over 1933 to \$149,100,000 or 37.2 per cent, and over 1934 to \$36,845,000 or 7.2 per cent. Canada's imports during each month in 1935 exceeded similar monthly imports in the years 1932, 1933 and 1934, except for the months of March 1932, and December, 1934. Canada's domestic exports during 1935 were valued at \$729,294,000, in 1932 at \$493,808,000, in 1933 at \$531,749,000, and in 1934 at \$653,312,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$235,486,000 or 47.7 per cent; over 1933 to \$197,545,000 or 37.2 per cent; and over 1934 to \$75,982,000 or 11.6 per cent. Canada's domestic exports during each month in 1935 exceeded similar monthly exports in 1932 and 1933, and also during 1934, except for the months of January and June.

Canada's Imports from Principal Countries, 1935:- Canada's imports from all countries during the calendar year 1935, amounted to \$550,314,000, compared with a similar import trade in 1932 valued at \$452,614,000, in 1933 at \$401,215,000 and in 1934 at \$513,469,000; the increase in the calendar year 1935 compared with 1932 being \$97,700,000 or 21.6 per cent; with 1933, \$149,100,000 or 37.2 per cent; and with 1934, \$36,845,000 or 7.2 per cent. In 1935 the imports from Empire countries were valued at \$173,889,000, compared with \$128,058,000 in 1932; at \$132,686,000 in 1933; and at \$157,067,000 in 1934; the increase in the imports from Empire countries in 1935 compared with 1932 amounting to \$45,831,000 or 35.8 per cent; with 1933 to \$41,204,000 or 31.1 per cent; and with 1934 to \$16,822,000 or 10.7 per cent; whereas imports from foreign countries in 1935 totalled \$376,425,000 compared with an importation in 1932 valued at \$324,556,000; in 1933 at \$268,529,000; and in 1934 at \$356,402,000; the increase in the imports from foreign countries in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$51,869,000 or 16.0 per cent; over 1933 to \$107,896,000 or 40.2 per cent; and over 1934 to \$20,023,000 or 5.6 per cent.

Empire countries in 1935 compared with 1932 accounted for 46.9 per cent of Canada's total increase in imports, and foreign countries for 53.1 per cent; with 1933 Empire countries accounted for 27.6 per cent, and foreign countries for 72.4 per cent; and with 1934 Empire countries accounted for 45.7 per cent, and foreign countries for 54.3 per cent.

The statistics also indicate that in 1935 compared with 1932, twenty-three countries show increases, eleven being Empire and twelve foreign countries; compared with 1933, twenty-six countries show increases, twelve being Empire, and fourteen foreign countries; and compared with 1934, twenty-two countries show increases, nine being Empire and thirteen foreign countries; and also that the proportion of imports from Empire countries of total imports was 28.3 per cent in 1932, 33.1 per cent in 1933, 30.6 per cent in 1934, and in 1935, 31.6 per cent; while the proportion of imports from foreign countries of total imports in 1932 was 71.7 per cent, in 1933, 66.9 per cent, in 1934, 69.4 per cent, and in 1935, 68.4 per cent.

Canada's Domestic Exports to Principal Countries, 1935: During the calendar year 1935 Canada's domestic exports to all countries were valued at \$729,294,000, compared with an export trade in 1932 valued at \$493,809,000, in 1933 at \$531,749,000, and in 1934 at \$653,312,000; the increase in the calendar year 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$235,485,000 or 47.7 per cent, over 1933 to \$197,545,000 or 37.2 per cent, and over 1934 to \$75,982,000 or 11.6 per cent. Canada's domestic exports to Empire countries in 1935 amounted to \$377,645,000, in 1932 to \$217,157,000, in 1933 to \$255,181,000, and in 1934 to \$335,418,000; the increase in the domestic exports to Empire countries in 1935 compared with 1932 amounting to \$160,488,000 or 73.9 per cent, with 1933 to \$122,464,000 or 48.0 per cent, and with 1934 to \$42,227,000 or 12.6 per cent; while domestic exports to foreign countries in 1935 were valued at \$351,649,000, compared with a domestic export in 1932 valued at \$276,652,000, in 1933 at \$276,568,000, and in 1934 at \$317,894,000; the increase in the exports of Canadian products to foreign countries in 1935 over similar exports in 1932 amounting to \$74,997,000 or 27.1 per cent, over 1933 to \$75,081,000 or 27.1 per cent, and over 1934 to \$33,755,000 or 10.6 per cent. In 1935 compared with 1932, Empire countries accounted for 68.1 per cent, and foreign countries for 31.9 per cent of the total increase in Canada's domestic export trade, compared with 1933 Empire countries accounted for 62.0 per cent, and foreign countries for 38.0 per cent, and compared with 1934 Empire countries accounted for 55.6 per cent, and foreign countries for 44.4 per cent.

The statistics also show that in 1935 compared with 1932, twenty countries show increases, ten being Empire and ten foreign countries; with 1933, twenty-one countries show increases, ten being Empire, and eleven foreign countries, and compared with 1934, that eighteen countries show increases, eight being Empire, and ten foreign countries; and also that the proportion of the domestic exports to Empire countries of total domestic exports in 1932 was 44.0 per cent, in 1933, 48.0 per cent, in 1934, 51.3 per cent, and in 1935, 51.8 per cent; while the proportion of domestic exports to foreign countries of total domestic exports in 1932 was 56.0 per cent, in 1933, 52.0 per cent, in 1934, 48.7 per cent, and in 1935, 48.2 per cent.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH THE WORLD, 1935.

(a) Summary of Canada's Trade with the World, 1935:- Canada's trade, both import and export, with the world, during the calendar year 1935, was larger than for similar trade in the years 1932, 1933 or 1934. Canada's total external trade in 1935 was valued at \$1,292,667,000, compared with a similar trade in 1932 valued at \$954,453,000, in 1933 at \$938,998,000, and in 1934 at \$1,173,797,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$338,214,000 or 35.4 per cent, over 1933 to \$353,669,000, or 37.7 per cent, and over 1934 to \$118,870,000, or 10.1 per cent. During 1935 Canada's imports amounted to \$550,314,000, in 1932 to \$452,614,000, in 1933 to \$401,215,000, and in 1934 to \$513,469,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$97,700,000 or 21.6 per cent, over 1933 to \$149,099,000 or 37.2 per cent, and over 1934 to \$36,845,000 or 7.2 per cent; while total exports in 1935 were valued at \$742,353,000, in 1932 at \$501,839,000, in 1933 at \$537,783,000, and in 1934 at \$660,328,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$240,514,000 or 47.9 per cent, over 1933 to \$204,570,000 or 38.0 per cent, and over 1934 to \$82,025,000 or 12.6 per cent. Domestic exports from Canada in 1935 totalled \$729,294,000, in 1932 \$493,809,000, in 1933, \$531,749,000, and in 1934, \$653,312,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$235,485,000 or 47.7 per cent, over 1933 to \$197,545,000 or 37.1 per cent, and over 1934 to \$75,982,000 or 11.6 per cent.

For the calendar year 1935, Canada's visible merchandise trade balance was favourable to the extent of \$192,039,000, compared with a favourable trade balance in 1932 of \$49,225,000, in 1933 of \$136,568,000, and in 1934 of \$146,859,000; the improvement in Canada's merchandise trade balance in 1935 compared with 1932 amounting to \$142,814,000, in 1933 to \$55,461,000, and in 1934 to \$45,180,000. If the trade in merchandise and coin and bullion are combined, the visible trade balance with the world in 1935 was favourable to the extent of \$297,353,000, compared with a favourable trade balance in 1932 of \$116,997,000 in 1933 of \$219,980,000, and in 1934 of \$252,152,000.

(b) Canada's Principal Imports from the World, 1935.— The increase in Canada's imports from the world in the calendar year 1935 compared with the year 1934, amounting to \$36,845,000 or 7.2 per cent, occurred in each of the nine main groups. From 1934 to 1935 imports under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products increased from \$109,202,000 to \$109,690,000, an increase during this period of \$488,000 or 0.4 per cent. Under this group the following commodities show increases: Cocoa and chocolate; corn; fruits, green; fruits, dried; fruits, canned; gums and resins; molasses; nuts, except coconuts; rubber, manufactured; sugar for refining; tobacco, raw; vegetable oils; and vegetables, fresh; while the following commodities show decreases: Coffee, green; rice; rubber, crude; seeds; spirits, alcoholic; tea; vegetables, canned; and wines.

During the same period the imports under the main group of Animals and Animal Products increased from \$20,236,000 to \$22,627,000, an increase of \$2,391,000 or 11.8 per cent. Under this group the following commodities show increases: Fish; furs, chiefly raw; grease for soap and leather; hides, raw; leather, unmanufactured; leather, manufactured; and sausage casings; while the following items show decreases: Animals, living; butter; and meats. The imports under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$83,872,000 to \$85,191,000, an increase of \$1,319,000, or 1.6 per cent. The leading commodities to show increases under this group were: Binder twine; cotton yarn; cotton fabrics, coloured; cotton handkerchiefs; cotton lace and embroidery; cotton wearing apparel; flax, hemp and jute fabrics; linen handkerchiefs; manila, sisal, etc., fibres; silk, raw; wool noils and tops; woollen carpets; woollen dress goods to be dyed; woollen tweeds; worsteds and serges; and woollen wearing apparel; while the imports of the following items show decreases: Artificial silk yarn; artificial silk products; cotton, raw; cotton fabrics, bleached; cotton fabrics, unbleached; fishing lines; hats and caps; jute fabrics; silk fabrics and velvets; silk wearing apparel; wool, raw; and woollen yarn.

Under the Wood, Wood Products and Paper Group, from 1934 to 1935, imports increased from \$20,855,000 to \$22,462,000, representing an increase of \$1,607,000, or 7.7 per cent. The chief items to show increases under this group were: Books and printed matter, largely advertising pamphlets; newspapers and magazines and text books; paper; wood, unmanufactured, mainly lumber and timber and veneers; and wood, manufactured, chiefly cork manufactures, furniture, and wood pulp. The imports under the main group of Iron and Its Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$93,615,000 to \$112,136,000, an increase during this period of \$18,521,000 or 19.8 per cent. Under this group the following commodities show increases: Automobiles; automobile parts; band and hoop iron; bars, including rails; castings and forgings; engines and boilers; farm implements; hardware and cutlery; iron ore; machinery; plates and sheets; stamped and coated products; structural iron and steel; tools; tubes and fittings; and wire; while imports of pigs, ingots and blooms show a decrease.

The imports under the Non-Ferrous Metals and Products Group from 1934 to 1935, increased from \$25,959,000 to \$33,614,000, an increase during this interval of \$7,655,000 or 29.5 per cent. Under this group the following leading imports show increases: Aluminium, chiefly bauxite; brass and products; clocks and watches; copper and products; electric apparatus; nickel and products; precious metals, chiefly silver; and tin in blocks; while imports of printing materials show a decrease. From 1934 to 1935 the imports under the main group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products increased from \$101,994,000 to \$103,837,000, an increase of \$1,843,000 or 1.8 per cent. Under this group the leading imports increased, viz: Asbestos products; clay and products; diamonds, unset; gasoline; glass and glassware; lubricating oil; petroleum oil, crude; and stone and products; while imports of the following items show decreases: Coal; coke for fuel; salt; and sulphur.

The imports under the Chemical and Allied Products group, from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$28,150,000 to \$29,758,000, an increase during the period of \$1,608,000 or 5.7 per cent. Under this group the principal increases were: Acids; cellulose products; compounds of tetraethyl lead; drugs and medicines; dyeing and tanning materials; paints and varnishes; potash and compounds; and soap; while the following imports show decreases: Fertilizers; perfumery; and soda and compounds. From 1934 to 1935 the exports under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities increased from \$29,586,000 to \$31,000,000, representing an increase of \$1,414,000 or 4.8 per cent. From 1934 to 1935 the following items under this group show increases: Articles for exhibition; express parcels; films; jewellery; musical instruments; pocket books, purses, etc.; and scientific and educational equipment; while the following items show decreases: Articles returned within five years; containers; settlers' effects; and works of art.

(c) Imports for Canadian Industries, 1935. - An analysis of the statistics in the following table giving "Imports of Sixty-Two Leading Commodities for Canadian Industries, 1935" indicates that more than one-third of Canada's total imports comprise commodities for use in the various industries of the Dominion. The total value of the sixty-two commodities imported for Canadian industries in 1935 amounted to \$212,820,000, compared with a similar import in 1933 valued at \$147,071,000, and in 1934 at \$196,381,000; the increase in 1935 over 1933 amounting to \$65,749,000, or 44.7 per cent, and over 1934 to \$16,439,000, or 8.3 per cent. If you eliminate from the total value of Canada's imports in 1933, 1934 and 1935, the total value of commodities imported for Canadian industries in those years, the total value of the imports of commodities not for Canadian industries in 1933 amounted to \$254,144,000, in 1934 to \$317,209,000, and in 1935 to \$337,494,000; the increase in the value of commodities not for Canadian industries in 1935 compared with 1933 amounting to \$83,350,000, or 32.8 per cent, and with 1934 to \$20,285,000, or 6.4 per cent. The value of imports for Canadian industries from 1933 to 1935 increased 44.7 per cent, and from 1934 to 1935, 8.3 per cent, while the value of imports not for Canadian industries from 1933 to 1935 increased 32.8 per cent and from 1934 to 1935, 6.4 per cent.

A further analysis of the statistics in the table shows that forty-eight of the sixty-two commodities listed for use of Canadian industries had increases in 1935 compared with 1934, and fourteen decreases. Of the forty-eight commodities for which there were quantity statistics in 1935, twenty-eight had increases in both the quantity and value; two had increases in the quantity but decreases in the value; eight had increases in the value but decreases in the quantity, while nine had decreases in both the quantity and the value. Of the fourteen commodities entered at value only, eleven had increases and three decreases. During 1935, 50.7 per cent of the value of the imports of commodities listed as for Canadian industries comprised raw materials, 19.9 per cent semi-manufactured products, and 29.4 per cent fully manufactured products.

Canada, in common with every manufacturing country of the world, is, to a greater or less extent, dependent on imported raw materials for certain of her manufacturing industries, viz.: raw rubber, raw cotton, raw silk, sisal fibre, iron ore, bauxite, sulphur, manganese oxide, crude cotton seed oil, crude peanut oil, raw cocoa, coconut oil, etc. An increase or decrease in the volume of the imports of these raw materials invariably reflects a speeding up or slowing down of those industries which depend almost wholly on imported raw materials.

(d) Canada's Principal Domestic Exports to the World, 1935:— The increase in Canada's domestic exports to the world in the calendar year 1935, amounting to \$75,982,000 or 11.6 per cent, occurred in each of the nine main groups. Canada's domestic exports under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$229,380,000 to \$229,822,000, an increase during this period amounting to \$442,000 or 0.2 per cent. The chief items to show increases under this group were: Fodders, n.o.p.; fruits, chiefly green apples and canned fruits; grains: (under this sub-group oats and wheat show increases, while exports of barley and rye show decreases); grain products: (under this sub-group bran and shorts; cereal foods; oatmeal and rolled oats; and wheat flour show increases; while exports of malt show a decrease); hay; rubber and products; (under this sub-group exports of pneumatic tire casings show an increase; while exports of footwear; and inner tubes show decreases); seeds; tobacco, raw; and vegetables: (under this sub-group pickles and sauces; and vegetables, canned, show increases; while exports of potatoes and turnips show decreases); while exports of alcoholic beverages, chiefly whiskey; and sugar and products, show decreases.

The exports under the main group of Animals and Animal Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$82,570,000 to \$97,219,000, an increase of \$14,649,000 or 17.7 per cent. The exports of animals, living, chiefly cattle and horses, show an increase; also fish: (under this sub-group fish, fresh, and fish, canned, largely canned salmon,

show increases; while exports of dried and salted fish show decreases); furs, undressed; hides, raw; lard and compounds; leather, unmanufactured; leather, manufactured; meats, mainly bacon and ham; and milk and products, chiefly butter; while exports of eggs and sausage casings show decreases. During this same period the exports under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products increased from \$7,335,000 to \$9,640,000, an increase under this main group of \$2,305,000 or 31.4 per cent. Under this main group the following commodities exported show increases. Binder twines; rags; socks and stockings; and wool, raw; while exports of cotton goods, and felt manufactures show decreases.

From 1934 to 1935 Canada's exports under the main group of Wood, Wood Products and Paper increased from \$161,137,000 to \$175,871,000, an increase during this interval of \$14,734,000 or 9.1 per cent. Under this group the following items exported show increases: Books and printed matter; paper; (under this sub-group paper board, book paper, and newsprint paper increased; while the exports of wrapping paper decreased); and wood and products (under this sub-group the exports of doors, sashes and blinds; match splints; pulpwood; shingles; and wood pulp show increases; while exports of logs; planks and boards; railway ties; and timber square show decreases). The Iron and Its Products main group, from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$37,402,000 to \$50,027,000, an increase during this period of \$12,625,000 or 33.8 per cent. Under this main group the following items exported show increases: Automobiles; automobile parts; farm implements; hardware and cutlery; machinery; pigs, ingots and blooms; rolling mill products; scrap iron and steel; tools; tubes and fittings; and wire.

The exports under the main group of Non-Ferrous Metals and Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$93,677,000 to \$119,989,000, an increase under this group of \$26,312,000 or 28.1 per cent. The leading commodities under this group from 1934 to 1935 to show increases were: Aluminium and products, chiefly aluminium in bars, ingots, etc.; copper and products, mainly copper in forms and copper blister; electric apparatus; gold-bearing quartz, dust, nuggets, etc.; lead in pigs; nickel; (under this sub-group exports of nickel, fine, increased, while nickel in matte, and nickel oxide decreased); silver in ore; silver bullion; and zinc spelter; while exports of brass products under this group, and platinum in concentrates or other forms show decreases. From 1934 to 1935, the exports under the main group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products increased from \$15,758,000 to \$17,900,000, an increase during this period of \$2,142,000 or 13.6 per cent. Under this main group the following leading commodities show increases: Asbestos, raw; coal; and stone and products, chiefly artificial abrasives, crude; while exports of the following commodities show decreases: Coke; petroleum and products; and tar and pitch.

Under the main group of Chemicals and Allied Products, from 1934 to 1935, Canada's exports increased from \$14,349,000 to \$16,373,000, an increase of \$2,024,000 or 14.1 per cent. Under this group exports of acids; drugs, medicinal; fertilizers; paints and varnishes; soaps; and soda and compounds show increases; while exports of cobalt oxide and salts show a decrease. The exports under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities from 1934 to 1935, increased from \$11,704,000 to \$12,453,000, an increase during this period of \$749,000 or 6.4 per cent. Under this group the exports of brushes; containers; electrical energy; films; musical instruments; and stationery, increased; while exports of settlers effects, and ships, decreased.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM, 1935.

(a) Summary of Canada's Trade with the United Kingdom, 1935:- The total trade of Canada with the United Kingdom during the calendar year 1935 amounted to \$420,989,000, in 1932 to \$272,603,000, in 1933 to \$309,193,000, and in 1934 to \$384,786,000; the increase in 1935 over the year 1932 amounting to \$148,386,000 or 54.4 per cent; over 1933 to \$111,796,000 or 36.2 per cent, and over 1934 to \$36,203,000 or 9.4 per cent. Imports as well as exports in 1935

show increases over the years 1932, 1933 and 1934. The imports into Canada from the United Kingdom in 1935 were valued at \$116,670,000, in 1932 to \$93,508,000, in 1933 at \$97,878,000, and in 1934 at \$113,416,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$23,162,000 or 24.8 per cent, over 1933 to \$18,792,000 or 19.2 per cent, and over 1934 to \$3,254,000 or 2.9 per cent; while the Dominion's total exports to the United Kingdom in 1935 amounted to \$304,319,000, in 1932 to \$179,095,000, in 1933 to \$211,315,000, and in 1934 to \$271,370,000; the increase for the year 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$125,224,000 or 69.9 per cent, over 1933 to \$93,004,000 or 44.0 per cent, and over 1934 to \$32,949,000 or 12.2 per cent. Canada's domestic exports to the United Kingdom in 1935 totalled \$303,502,000, in 1932, \$178,172,000, in 1933, \$210,698,000, and in 1934, \$270,492,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$125,330,000 or 70.3 per cent, over 1933 to \$92,804,000 or 44.0 per cent, and over 1934 to \$33,010,000 or 12.2 per cent.

For the calendar year 1935, Canada's visible merchandise trade balance with the United Kingdom was favourable to the extent of \$187,649,000, compared with \$85,587,000 in 1932, with \$113,437,000 in 1933, and with \$157,954,000 in 1934; the improvement in Canada's merchandise trade balance with the United Kingdom in 1935 compared with 1932 amounting to \$102,062,000, with 1933 to \$74,212,000, and with 1934 to \$29,695,000. If the trade in merchandise and coin and bullion are combined, the favourable trade balance with the United Kingdom in 1935 amounted to \$198,133,000, in 1932 to \$85,572,000, in 1933 to \$175,818,000, and in 1934 to \$184,786,000.

Note:- If adjustment is made in the value of the imports from the United Kingdom in 1935 to account for the exclusion of the excise duty on distilled spirits, as from April 1, 1935, the imports of dutiable goods in 1935 in the above table from the United Kingdom, the total imports, and the total trade, would have been increased, and the favourable merchandise trade balance decreased, by about \$8,000,000. (See General Note page 1).

(b) Canada's Principal Imports from the United Kingdom, 1935:- The increase in Canada's imports from the United Kingdom, calendar year 1935 compared with 1934, amounting to \$3,254,000 or 2.9 per cent, occurred in six out of nine main groups. The increase in the six main groups to show increases amounted to \$6,526,000, and the decrease in the three main groups to show decreases, viz.: Agricultural and Vegetable Products, Non-Metallic Minerals and Products, and Miscellaneous Commodities, amounted to \$3,272,000. The imports under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products from 1934 to 1935 decreased from \$21,303,000 to \$18,701,000; a decrease of \$2,602,000 or 12.2 per cent. Under this main group imports of the following leading commodities show increases: Biscuits; cocoa and chocolate; confectioner molasses; pickles and sauces; rubber goods; seeds; spices; tobacco, manufactured; vegetable oils; and wines; while these increases were more than offset by decreases in the imports of the following items: Dried fruits; alcoholic spirits; tea and wheat flour.

Under the main group of Animals and Animal Products the imports from the United Kingdom, 1934 to 1935, increased from \$3,212,000 to \$3,533,000, representing an increase of \$321,000 or 10.0 per cent. Under this group the following commodities imported show increases: Animals, living; fish; furs; grease for soap and leather; hides; leather, unmanufactured; leather, manufactured; and meats; while the following commodities show decreases: Butter, gelatine; and sausage casings. The imports under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$37,269,000 to \$39,361,000, representing an increase under this group of \$2,092,000 or 5.6 per cent. The following items show increases under this group: Artificial silk yarn; binder twines; cotton yarn; cotton fabrics, printed, dyed and coloured; cotton fabrics, unbleached; cotton handkerchiefs; cotton lace and embroidery; cotton wearing apparel; flax and hemp fabrics; linen thread; velveteens and corduroys; wool, raw; wool noils and tops; woollen dress goods to be dyed; woollen tweeds; worsteds and serges; and woollen wearing apparel; while imports of the following items show decrease: Artificial silk goods; cotton, bleached; fishing lines; flax, hemp and jute yarn; hats and caps; and jute fabrics.

Under the main group of Wood, Wood Products and Paper, imports from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$3,206,000 to \$3,501,000, an increase of \$295,000 or 9.2 per cent. Under this heading books and printed matter show an increase; also paper, and wood, manufactured. The imports under the main group of Iron and Its Products increased from \$18,684,000 to \$20,407,000, representing an increase of \$1,723,000 or 9.2 per cent. Imports of automobiles under this group show an increase; also automobile parts; band and hoop iron; bars, including rails; castings and forgings; engines and boilers; hardware and cutlery; plates and sheets; structural iron and steel; tools; tubes, pipes and fittings; and wire; while imports of machinery show a decrease.

From 1934 to 1935, imports under the main group of Non-Ferrous Metals and Products increased from \$4,071,000 to \$6,000,000, an increase during the period of \$1,929,000 or 47.3 per cent. Imports of the following items under this group show increases: Aluminium and products; copper and products; electric apparatus; precious metals; and tin in bloc

Imports from the United Kingdom under the group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products decreased from \$13,355,000 to \$12,690,000, a decrease of \$665,000 or 5.0 per cent. Imports of clay and products, mainly tableware of china show an increase; also diamonds, unset; and stone and products; while imports of coal; coke; and salt show a decrease.

The imports under the main group of Chemicals and Allied Products increased from \$6,165,000 to \$6,331,000, an increase from 1934 to 1935 of \$166,000 or 2.5 per cent. Under this group imports of acids show an increase; also drugs and medicines; paints and varnishes; and soda and compounds; while imports of dyeing and tanning materials, and potash and compounds show decreases. Under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities imports decreased from \$6,151,000 to \$6,146,000 or \$5,000. Under this group articles for exhibition; articles returned within five years; and settlers' effects, show decreases; while the following items under this group show increases: Containers; scientific and educational equipment; and works of art.

(c) Canada's Principal Domestic Exports to the United Kingdom, 1935:- The increase in Canada's domestic exports to the United Kingdom, calendar year 1935 over 1934, amounting to \$33,010,000 or 12.2 per cent, occurred in seven out of the nine main groups. The increase in the seven main groups to show increases totalled \$33,336,000, while the decrease in the two main groups to show decreases, viz.: Non-Metallic Minerals and Products (\$90,000) and Chemical and Allied Products (\$236,000) totalled \$326,000. The exports under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$125,345,000 to \$146,240,000, an increase of \$20,895,000 or 16.7 per cent. The chief commodities under this group to show increases were: Fruits, chiefly apples, fresh; and fruit juices; grains, principally barley, oats, and wheat; grain and products, mainly cereal foods and wheat flour; rubber and products, chiefly rubber footwear; seeds; raw tobacco; and vegetable products, chiefly pickles and canned vegetables.

Under the main group of Animals and Animal Products Canada's exports to the United Kingdom from 1934 to 1935, increased from \$52,870,000 to \$54,966,000, representing an increase of \$2,096,000 or 3.9 per cent. Under this sub-group the chief exports to show increases were: Fish, principally fresh fish, and preserved fish, chiefly canned

salmon; lard and compounds; leather, unmanufactured; meats, chiefly bacon and hams; milk and products; and sausage casings; whereas the exports of animals, living, mainly cattle, decreased; also eggs; furs, and honey. From 1934 to 1935 exports to the United Kingdom under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products increased from \$2,135,000 to \$2,463,000, an increase of \$328,000 or 15.4 per cent. Under this group the exports of binder twine increased; also socks and stockings; while exports of cotton goods, and felt manufactures decreased.

Under the main group of Wood, Wood Products and Paper from 1934 to 1935, exports to the United Kingdom increased from \$26,685,000 to \$27,663,000, an increase under this group of \$978,000 or 3.6 per cent. The chief items under this group to show increases were: Paper, principally paper board and newsprint paper; doors, sashes and blinds; railway ties; spoolwood; and wood pulp; while the exports of logs, and planks and boards decreased. The exports under the main group of Iron and Its Products increased from \$8,988,000 to \$11,298,000, an increase of \$2,310,000 or 25.7 per cent. Exports of automobiles under this group increased; also farm implements; machinery; pigs, ingots and billets; rolling mill products; tools and wire; while the exports of hardware and cutlery decreased.

From 1934 to 1935 exports to the United Kingdom under the main group of Non-Ferrous Metals and Products increased from \$46,459,000 to \$52,762,000 representing an increase under this group of \$6,303,000 or 13.6 per cent. Under this group the leading items to show increases were: Aluminium products, largely aluminium in bars, ingots, etc.; copper in forms; electric apparatus; lead in pigs; nickel; and zinc spelter; while exports of brass; copper in ore; platinum; and silver bullion decreased. Exports under the main group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products decreased from \$2,183,000 to \$2,093,000, a decrease of \$90,000 or 4.1 per cent. Under this group exports of asbestos, raw, and coal increased; while the exports of petroleum and products and stone and products, chiefly artificial abrasives, crude, decreased.

The exports to the United Kingdom under the main group of Chemicals and Allied Products from 1934 to 1935 decreased from \$3,258,000 to \$3,022,000, a decrease of \$236,000 or 7.3 per cent. Exports of acids under this group, and soap, decreased; while the exports of cobalt oxides and salts; drugs; paints and varnishes; and soda and compounds, increased. Under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities, the exports to the United Kingdom increased from \$2,569,000 to \$2,995,000, representing an increase under this group of \$426,000 or 16.6 per cent. Under this group the exports of films, and stationery, increased; while the exports of containers; musical instruments; and settlers' effects decreased.

There were some notable increases in the exports to the United Kingdom, calendar year 1935 compared with 1932. The statistics in the following table respecting Canada's exports to the United Kingdom for the years 1932 and 1935, which comprise about 90 per cent of the total exports to the United Kingdom, demonstrate this:-

(d) Proportion of Imports from the United Kingdom of Canada's Total Imports, 1929 to 1935:- The proportion of the imports from the United Kingdom of Canada's total imports in the calendar year 1933, amounting to 24.4 per cent, was greater than for any year for the past twenty-four years, i.e., since the year 1910. In 1935, however, the proportion of the imports from the United Kingdom, amounting to 21.2 per cent, though somewhat less than for the years 1933 and 1934, was greater than for any year from 1914 to 1933. The statistics in the following table indicate the proportion of Canada's imports from the United Kingdom by main groups and leading commodities or groups of commodities for the calendar years 1929 to 1935. The statistics in this table also demonstrate that the proportion of the imports from the United Kingdom of Canada's total imports in the years 1933, 1934 and 1935 were greater than for the years 1929, 1930 or 1931, for each of the nine main groups, except in the case of the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products; and also that the proportions of the commodities or groups of commodities imported from the United Kingdom under each of the nine main groups generally show an upward trend in 1933, 1934 and 1935 compared with the years 1929, 1930 or 1931.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH THE UNITED STATES, 1935.

(a) Summary of Canada's Trade with the United States, 1935:- The total trade of Canada with the United States during the calendar year 1935 was valued at \$589,926,000, compared with a similar trade in 1932 valued at \$432,497,000, in 1933 at \$392,545,000, and in 1934 at \$521,818,000; the increase in the total trade with the United States in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$157,429,000 or 36.4 per cent, over 1933 to \$197,381,000 or 50.3 per cent, and over 1934 to \$68,108,000 or 13.1 per cent. Imports from, as well as exports to the United States in 1935 show increases over the years 1932, 1933, and 1934. The imports from the United States in 1935 amounted to \$312,416,000, compared with \$263,549,000 in 1932, with \$217,291,000 in 1933, and with \$293,780,000 in 1934; the increase in the imports in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$48,867,000 or 19.0 per cent, over 1933 to \$95,125,000 or 43.8 per cent, and over 1934 to \$18,636,000 or 6.3 per cent, while the total exports to the United States totalled \$277,510,000 in 1935, in 1932, \$168,948,000, in 1933, \$175,254,000, and in 1934, \$228,038,000; the increase in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$108,562,000 or 64.3 per cent, over 1933 to \$102,256,000 or 58.3 per cent, and over 1934 to \$49,472,000 or 21.7 per cent. Domestic exports from Canada to the United States were valued at \$265,975,000 in 1935 compared with \$162,631,000 in 1932, with \$170,542,000 in 1933, and with \$222,588,000 in 1934, the increase in the domestic exports to the United States in 1935 over 1932 amounting to \$103,344,000 or 63.5 per cent, over 1933 to \$95,433,000 or 56.0 per cent, and over 1934 to \$43,387,000 or 19.5 per cent.

For the calendar year 1935 Canada's visible merchandise trade balance with the United States was unfavourable to the extent of \$34,906,000, in 1932 of \$94,601,000, in 1933 of \$42,037,000, and in 1934 of \$65,742,000; the improvement in Canada's visible merchandise trade balance with the United States in 1935 compared with 1932 amounted to \$59,695,000, with 1933 to \$7,131,000, and with 1934 to \$30,836,000. If Canada's trade with the United States in merchandise and coin and bullion is combined, the visible trade balance with the United States in 1935 was favourable to the extent of \$60,249,000, and in 1934 of \$12,758,000, but in 1933 it was unfavourable to the extent of \$21,010,000, and in 1932 of \$28,525,000.

(b) Canada's Principal Imports from the United States, 1935. The increase in Canada's imports from the United States, calendar year 1935 compared with 1934, amounting to \$18,636,000 or 6.3 per cent, occurred in seven out of the nine main groups; the increase in the seven groups to show increases, 1935 compared with 1934, amounting to \$24,143,000, while the decreases in the two groups to show decreases, viz.: Agricultural and Vegetable Products, and Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products, amounted to \$5,507,000. The imports from the United States under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products from 1934 to 1935 decreased from \$35,425,000 to \$30,822,000, a decrease of \$4,603,000 or 13.0 per cent. Under this group the leading items to show decreases were: Broom corn; cocoa and chocolate; corn; dried fruits; rubber, crude; seeds; tobacco, raw; and yeast; while the following principal imports show increases: Fruits, green; gums and resins; nuts; rubber, manufactured; vegetable oils; and vegetables, fresh.

From 1934 to 1935 Canada's imports from the United States under the main group of Animals and Animal Products increased from \$10,250,000 to \$10,354,000, an increase under this group of \$104,000 or 1.0 per cent. Under this group the leading items to show increases were: Hair and bristles; hides, raw; leather, unmanufactured; and leather, manufactured; while the following leading imports show decreases: Animals, living; fish; furs; grease for soap and oil; meats; and sausage casings. The imports from the United States from 1934 to 1935 under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products decreased from \$30,982,000 to \$30,078,000, a decrease of \$904,000 or 2.9 per cent. Under this main group the following imports show decreases: Cotton, raw; cotton fabrics, bleached and unbleached; cotton wearing apparel; fishing lines; manila, sisal, jute, etc., fibre; silk fabrics and velvets; and silk wearing apparel; while the following imports show increases: Artificial silk yarn; artificial silk products; cotton yarns; cotton fabrics, coloured; flax, hemp and jute products; and silk, raw.

The imports under the main group of Wood, Wood Products and Paper, from the United States from 1934 to 1935, increased from \$15,785,000 to \$17,027,000, an increase during this period of \$1,242,000 or 7.8 per cent. Under this group, imports of books and printed matter, largely advertising matter, newspapers and magazines and text books; paper; and wood and manufactures show increases; (under this sub-group lumber and timber; veneers; and wood pulp, show increases; while the imports of logs and staves, show decreases). Under the main group of Iron and Its Products, imports from the United States increased from \$71,056,000 to \$86,473,000, an increase under this group of \$15,417,000 or 21.7 per cent. The chief commodities imported to account for this increase were: Automobiles; automobile parts; band and hoop iron; bars, including rails; castings and forgings; engines and boilers, principally automobile engines; farm implements and machinery; hardware and cutlery; iron ore; machinery; plates and sheets; structural iron and steel; tools, hand or machine; and tubes, pipes and fittings; while imports of pigs, ingots and blooms and wire, show decreases.

Under the main group of Non-Ferrous Metals and Products, imports from the United States from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$19,026,000 to \$23,411,000, an increase of \$4,385,000 or 23.0 per cent. Under this group imports of aluminium and products, largely alumina, bauxite, and cryolite; brass and products; clocks and watches; copper and products; electric apparatus; metallic articles for farm implements; precious metals, chiefly silver; and zinc show increases. Imports from the United States from 1934 to 1935 under the main group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products, increased from \$76,335,000 to \$77,133,000, an increase of \$798,000 or 1.0 per cent. The following leading imports under this group show increases: Asbestos products; carbons, electric; clay and products, chiefly firebrick; glass and glassware; lubricating oils; petroleum oil, crude; and stone and products; while the following leading items under this group show decreases: Coal; coke for fuel; gasoline; kerosene oil; and sulphur.

From 1934 to 1935 imports from the United States under the main group of Chemicals and Allied Products increased from \$16,575,000 to \$17,459,000, an increase under this group of \$884,000 or 5.3 per cent. Under this group cellulose products; compounds of tetraethyl lead; drugs and medicines; dyeing and tanning materials; paints and varnishes; potash and compounds; and soap show increases; while imports of acids; fertilizers; and soda and compounds show decreases. Under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities, imports from the United States from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$18,346,000 to \$19,659,000, an increase during this period of \$1,313,000 or 7.2 per cent. Under this group articles for exhibition; express parcels; jewellery; musical instruments; pocket books; purses, etc.; scientific and educational equipment; and toys and dolls, show increases; while the imports under this group of articles returned within five years; containers; settlers' effects; and works of art show decreases.

(c) Canada's Principal Domestic Exports to the United States, 1935:— The increase in Canada's domestic exports to the United States, calendar year 1935 compared with 1934, amounting to \$43,387,000 or 19.5 per cent, occurred in seven out of the nine main groups, the increase in the seven main groups to show increases amounting to \$48,034,000, while the decrease in the two main groups, viz.: Agricultural and Vegetable Products, and Miscellaneous Commodities, amounted to \$4,647,000. The domestic exports to the United States under the main group of Agricultural and Vegetable Products from 1934 to 1935, decreased from \$47,092,000 to \$42,543,000, a decrease of \$4,549,000 or 9.7 per cent. Under this group the chief commodities to show decreases were: Alcoholic beverages, mainly whiskey; fruits; sugar; and vegetables, chiefly potatoes and turnips; while these decreases were offset by increases in the following commodities: Fodders; grains; (under this group wheat shows an increase while exports of barley, oats, and rye show decreases); grain products, chiefly bran and shorts; hay; rubber products; and seeds, principally grass seed.

The exports under the main group of Animals and Animal Products from 1934 to 1935 increased from \$17,677,000 to \$29,549,000, an increase under the group of \$11,872,000 or 67.1 per cent. Under this group the following items show increases: Animals, living, mainly cattle; fish, principally fresh and salted, dried and pickled fish; furs, undressed; hides; leather, unmanufactured; meats; and tankage; while the exports of the following items show decreases: Milk and products; sausage casings; and whale oil. Under the main group of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products the exports to the United States during this period increased from \$808,000 to \$2,240,000, an increase of \$1,432,000 or 177.8 per cent. Under this main group the exports of the following items show increases: Binder twine; rags; and wool, raw.

Under the main group of Wood, Wood Products and Paper, from 1934 to 1935, the exports to the United States increased from \$107,805,000 to \$120,759,000, an increase of \$12,954,000 or 12.0 per cent. Under this group the chief commodities to show increases were: Books and printed matter; paper, largely newsprint paper; and wood and manufactures; laths; logs; planks and boards; pulpwood; shingles; and wood pulp. Under the Iron and Its Products group the exports to the United States increased from \$2,782,000 to \$4,781,000, an increase under this group of \$1,999,000 or 72.2 per cent. The chief commodities exported under this group to show increases were: Farm implements; hardware and cutlery; pigs, ingots and billets; scrap iron or steel; and tubes, pipes and fittings.

From 1934 to 1935, exports to the United States under the group Non-Ferrous Metals and Products, increased from \$23,554,000 to \$39,794,000, an increase of \$16,240,000 or 68.9 per cent. Under this group the principal items to show increases were: Aluminium products; copper and products, chiefly copper in ore and copper blister; gold-bearing quartz, dust, nuggets, etc.; nickel, mainly nickel, fine; silver in ore; and silver bullion. Under the main group of Non-Metallic Minerals and Products, the exports increased from \$9,140,000 to \$11,025,000, an increase under this group of \$1,885,000 or 20.6 per cent. The chief commodities to show increases were: Asbestos, raw; coal; stone and products, chiefly abrasives, artificial, crude; and gypsum, crude; while exports of coke; petroleum and products; and tar and pitch show decreases.

From 1934 to 1935 under the main group of Chemicals and Allied Products, exports increased from \$6,331,000 to \$7,983,000, representing an increase of \$1,652,000 or 26.1 per cent. Under this main group the following commodities show increases: Acids; fertilizers; soap; and soda and compounds. The exports to the United States under the main group of Miscellaneous Commodities from 1934 to 1935 decreased from \$7,399,000 to \$7,301,000, a decrease of \$98,000 or 1.3 per cent. Under this group exports of settlers' effects show a decrease, while exports of containers; electrical energy; films; musical instruments; and stationery show increases.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH AUSTRALIA, 1935.

The trade of Canada with Australia, both import and export, during the calendar year 1935 shows a marked improvement over that for the years 1932, 1933 and 1934. Canada's imports from Australia during the year 1935 were 26 per cent in excess of similar imports in 1932, 45 per cent in excess of those in 1933, and 17 per cent in excess of those in 1934; while the Dominion's domestic exports to Australia in 1935 were 220 per cent greater than for the year 1932, 123 per cent greater than for 1933, and 35 per cent greater than for 1934. During the year 1935 imports from Australia were valued at \$7,396,000, compared with an import trade valued at \$5,845,000 in 1932, at \$5,080,000 in 1933, and at \$6,331,000 in 1934; while the domestic exports to Australia in 1935 were valued at \$22,800,000 compared with an export trade in 1932 valued at \$7,133,000, in 1933 at \$10,208,000 and in 1934 at \$16,870,000. Canada's imports from Australia during the year 1935 (\$7,396,000) were the highest on record, the previous high record (\$6,331,000) was for the fiscal year 1934, while the domestic exports to Australia (\$22,800,000) were also the highest on record, the previous high record (\$19,924,000) was for the fiscal year 1924.

There were some marked increases as well as decreases in imports of commodities from Australia in 1935 compared with 1934, though the increases exceeded the decreases by \$1,065,000 or 17 per cent. The leading commodities or groups of commodities to show increases in the imports from Australia in 1935 compared with 1934, were: Brandy; fruits, dried, chiefly raisins; fruits, preserved, largely pears in cans; gelatine; grease for soap and oils; meats; onions; rags and waste; sausage casings; tallow; and wool and products, principally worsted tops. Imports of the following items, however, show decreases during the same period: Fruits, fresh; grain and products, mainly wheat flour; sugar; tin; wines; and wood.

Canada's domestic exports to Australia from 1934 to 1935 show marked increases in practically every important item of trade, except in the case of brass products; coal; cotton goods; farm implements; films; oilcloth; pipes and fittings; and wood, manufactured. The following exports to Australia from 1934 to 1935 show increases: Aluminium; asbestos, raw; automobiles; automobile parts; clocks and watches; copper; carbon electrodes; electrical apparatus; felt manufactures; fish, chiefly canned salmon; glass; lamps and lanterns; machinery; paper, largely newsprint paper; silk goods; soda and compounds; tools; wire; and wood, unmanufactured, mainly Douglas fir logs, planks and boards, and shooks.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH BRITISH SOUTH AFRICA, 1935.

Canada's trade with British South Africa during the calendar year 1935 exceeded similar trade in the calendar years 1932, 1933 and 1934. Imports from British South Africa in 1935 were 16 per cent greater than in 1932, 4 per cent greater than in 1933, and 57 per cent greater than in 1934, while Canada's domestic exports to British South Africa in 1935 exceeded similar export trade in 1932 by 198 per cent, in 1933 by 121 per cent, and in 1934 by 9 per cent. Canada's imports from British South Africa in 1935 amounted to \$4,737,000, contrasted with an import trade in 1932 valued at \$4,085,000, in 1933 at \$4,537,000, and in 1934 at \$3,007,000; while the Dominion's domestic exports to British South Africa were valued at \$13,185,000 in 1935 compared with an export trade valued at \$4,416,000 in 1932, at \$5,974,000 in 1933 and at \$12,102,000 in 1934. During the calendar year 1935 Canada's imports from British South Africa were greater than for any year on record, except for the fiscal year 1933 (\$4,907,000), while her domestic exports to British South Africa in 1935 were also the largest on record, except for the fiscal year 1921 (\$14,649,000), a year of extremely high export prices.

The increase in the imports in 1935 compared with 1934, amounting to \$1,730,000, occurred chiefly in two items, viz.: Corn, and sugar, the increase in the imports of corn amounting to \$1,833,000, and of sugar to \$111,000. These increases, however, were offset in a measure by a decrease in the imports of fresh fruits, chiefly oranges, amounting to \$259,000. During the period 1934 to 1935, the imports of alcoholic beverages increased; also corn; preserved fruits, largely fruit pulp; raw sugar; and raw wool; while the imports of fresh fruits and dried fruits decreased.

The increase in the domestic exports to British South Africa from 1934 to 1935, amounting to \$1,083,000, occurred in nearly every important item of trade, though there were quite large decreases in the exports of wheat (decrease \$1,487,000); rubber goods (decrease \$305,000), wood (decrease \$82,000), machinery (decrease \$76,000), and wire (decrease \$54,000). The following items during this period show increases: Artificial silk; automobiles; automobile parts; electric apparatus; farm implements; fish, chiefly canned; fruits; hardware and cutlery; paper, largely newsprint and paper board; paints; porcelain insulators; pipes and fittings; rails (iron and steel); socks and stockings; and vegetables, canned. The following exports to British South Africa during the period 1934 to 1935, show decreases:- Binder twine; candy; chains; coal; lead; machinery; rubber goods; chiefly tire casings and inner tubes; wheat; wire; and wood, chiefly lumber and shooks.

CANADA'S TRADE WITH NEW ZEALAND, 1935.

Canada's imports from New Zealand during the calendar year 1935 were 225 per cent higher than during the same period in 1932, 38 per cent higher than in 1933, but about 5 per cent lower than in 1934; while the Dominion's domestic exports to New Zealand in 1935 were 149 per cent higher than in 1932, 121 per cent higher than in 1933, and 24 per cent higher than in 1934. Canada's imports from New Zealand in 1935 were valued at \$2,787,000, compared with \$856,000 in 1932, \$2,013,000 in 1933, and \$2,936,000 in 1934; whereas her domestic exports to New Zealand in 1935 amounted to \$8,493,000, compared with an export trade valued at \$3,406,000 in 1932, at \$3,833,000 in 1933, and at \$6,821,000 in 1934.

During the period 1934 to 1935 practically every important import from New Zealand shows a decrease except raw hides and sausage casings. Imports of butter decreased; also gelatine; gums (chiefly kauri gum); meats; onions; and raw wool; while the imports of green apples; raw hides; sausage casings; and seeds increased.

From 1934 to 1935 every principal export to New Zealand from Canada shows an increase except clover seed (decrease \$5,000), cotton goods (decrease \$4,000) fish (decrease \$17,000), wheat (decrease \$11,000), salt (decrease \$2,000), socks and stockings (decrease \$46,000), wire (decrease \$1,000) and manufactured wood (decrease \$2,000). The following principal exports to New Zealand during this interval show increases: Automobiles; automobile parts; clocks and watches; copper; corsets and brassieres; electric apparatus; farm implements; furs; hardware and cutlery; unmanufactured leather; manufactured leather; machinery; paper, chiefly newsprint paper; pipes, tubes and fittings; rubber goods; chiefly footwear and tire casings; tools; vegetables; and unmanufactured wood, chiefly lumber.

THE CANADIAN BRITISH PREFERENCE, 1935.

Since the inauguration of the British preference in 1897, statistics giving the average ad valorem rate of duty on dutiable imports into Canada from the United Kingdom and the United States, respectively, have been frequently in use, the average rate of duty being lower as a rule on dutiable imports from the United States than from the United Kingdom. It must be remembered in this connection, however, that the dutiable imports from the United Kingdom consist very largely of highly manufactured commodities, and necessarily are subject to high rates of duty, whereas the dutiable imports from the United States consist, in a large measure, of semi-manufactured commodities for further processing in Canadian industries, and consequently are admitted at reasonably low rates of duty.

Another factor in Canada's imports from the United Kingdom, compared with those from the United States, which affects the rates of duty for the two countries and which is frequently ignored, is the trade of alcoholic liquors, which are imported in large volume from the United Kingdom, but in very small volume from the United States. Imports of tobacco should also be added, as in almost all countries alcoholic liquors and tobacco are subject to extraordinary high rates of duty, the principle of tariff makers in dealing with these commodities being not so much protection as the raising of revenue or the discouraging of consumption. In recent years the Canadian Government has considerably expanded the list of commodities which are admitted free under the Preferential tariff, but which are dutiable under the Intermediate and General tariffs. In the fiscal year 1935, the imports from the United Kingdom free under the Preferential tariff were valued at \$41,468,717. The statistics in the following tables present (1) Imports without the adjustments of these items, and (2) Imports with the adjustments. It will be noted from statement No 2, that the ad valorem rates of duty on dutiable imports from the United Kingdom, after adjustments have been made for the fiscal years 1922 to 1935 are lower than those for the United States, and that the average ad valorem rates of duty for the United Kingdom were: 1931, 15.65 per cent; 1932, 18.62 per cent; 1933, 14.52 per cent; 1934, 11.97 per cent; and 1935, 12.03 per cent; and for the United States: 1931, 24.73 per cent; 1932, 27.45 per cent; 1933, 28.06 per cent; 1934, 28.54 per cent; and 1935, 27.37 per cent; indicating an advantage to the United Kingdom under the Preference of 9.08 per cent in 1931; 8.83 per cent in 1932; 13.54 per cent in 1933; 16.57 per cent in 1934; and 15.34 per cent in 1935.

The statistics in the following table re "Imports into Canada from the United Kingdom, fiscal years 1925 to 1935", indicate a very marked increase in the imports of goods from the United Kingdom free under the Preferential Tariff. The proportion of imports subject to duty of total imports from the United Kingdom in 1925 was 82.5 per cent and free goods 17.5 per cent; imports free under the Preferential Tariff amounting to 0.6 per cent, and under the General Tariff to 16.9 per cent; in 1930 the proportion of dutiable imports of total imports was 78.6 per cent, and free goods 21.4 per cent, imports free under the Preferential Tariff amounting to 5.6 per cent, and under the General Tariff to 15.8 per cent; whereas in the fiscal year 1935 the proportion of dutiable imports of total imports from the United Kingdom was 52.7 per cent, and free imports 47.3 per cent, imports free under the Preferential Tariff amounting to 37.1 per cent, and under the General Tariff to 10.2 per cent.

PROPORTION OF CANADA'S TRADE WITH EMPIRE AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES, 1926 TO 1935.

The tendency of Canada's trade during the past five or six years has been towards a greater exchange of commodities with Empire countries. The statistics in the following table showing "Proportion of Canada's Imports from and Exports to Empire and Foreign Countries, 1926 to 1935", indicate that the proportion of Canada's imports from Empire countries from 1929 to 1935 increased from 19.8 to 31.6 per cent, and exports to, from 33.4 to 51.8 per cent; while the proportion of imports from foreign countries decreased from 80.2 to 68.4 per cent, and exports to, from 66.6 to 48.2 per cent. During the same interval the proportion of Canada's imports from the United Kingdom increased from 15.0 to 21.2 per cent, and exports to, from 24.5 to 41.6 per cent; while imports from the United States decreased from 68.6 to 56.8 per cent, and exports to, from 44.2 to 36.5 per cent.

TRADE OF THE UNITED KINGDOM, 1935.

(a) Trade of the United Kingdom with Empire and Foreign Countries, 1935:- The statistics in the following table give the "Trade of the United Kingdom with Empire and Foreign Countries, Calendar Years 1931 to 1935". The statistics in the table indicate that the imports into the United Kingdom from 1931 to 1935 decreased from £861,253,000 to £756,936,000, or 12.11 per cent, that the imports from Empire countries during this period increased from £247,417,000 to £284,866,000 or 15.14 per cent, and that the imports from foreign countries decreased from £613,836,000 to £472,070,000 or 23.10 per cent; whereas the domestic exports from the United Kingdom from 1931 to 1935 increased from £390,622,000 to £425,921,000 or 9.04 per cent, that the exports to Empire countries during the same interval increased from £170,673,000 to £204,314,000 or 19.71 per cent, and that the exports to foreign countries increased from £219,949,000 to £221,607,000 or 0.75 per cent.

The statistics in the table indicate an upward trend in the proportion of the imports into the United Kingdom from Empire countries in the case of thirty-six out of the forty-two main groups from 1931 to 1935, the six main groups to show decreases being: Raw tobacco; non-ferrous metalliferous ores and scrap; silk, raw, knubs and noils; other textile materials; hides and skins, undressed and paper-making materials. A further examination of the statistics in the table shows that in the classes of products the Empire can supply, the proportions of the imports from Empire countries from 1931 to 1933, 1934 and 1935, show marked increases. (d) Chief Countries in United Kingdom Trade, According to Rank, 1935:- There have been some notable changes in recent years in the position of the chief trading countries of the world in the import and export trade of the United Kingdom.

The United States has occupied first place in United Kingdom import trade for the past six years, as also in the year 1924. In 1935, as in 1931, Canada occupied second place, being in fifth place in 1924, eleventh in 1930, twelfth in 1931, fourth in 1932, and third in 1933; while Australia occupied third place in 1935, as also in 1934, being in sixth place in 1924, seventh in 1930, fifth in 1931, third in 1932, and second in 1933.

The following table shows the principal countries from which the United Kingdom imports were consigned in 1924, 1930, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, and 1935, the figures indicating the order of importance in each year.

British India has occupied first place in United Kingdom export trade for the past six years, as also for the year 1924. In 1935 British countries occupied the first three places in United Kingdom export trade, British India occupying the first place, the Union of South Africa and Australia being in second and third places respectively, as in 1933 and 1934, while Canada moved up to fourth place from seventh in 1933, but dropped back to fifth place in 1935, the United States moving into fourth place, being in sixth place in 1934. In 1924, Canada occupied eighth place, fifth in 1930 and 1931, sixth in 1932, and seventh in 1933. The drop in the position of the Irish Free State as in imports, in the past three years, was due to the special conditions affecting the trade between the two countries.

The following table shows, in the order of importance, the principal markets for United Kingdom exports in 1924, 1930, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934 and 1935.
