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



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CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE, CALENDAR YEAR, 1937.

The expansion of Canada's external trade in recent years continued into 1937. The value of total trade for the complete year reached a new high level since 1929. Imports in each month of 1937 were higher than for the corresponding month of the previous year, and for the full year amounted to a value of \$808,896,000, compared with \$635,191,000 in 1936, and with \$401,214,000 in 1933 - the lowest year of the depression. The increase in 1937 over 1936 represented a gain of 27.3 per cent, and over 1933 of 101.6 per cent. The total exports in 1937 were higher in each of the first nine months than in the corresponding part of 1936. In the last three months of the year, owing mainly to the abnormally small exportable surplus of wheat and other grains, the adverse effect of unsettled business conditions in the United States, a weakening of prices and a slowing up of world economic factors generally, exports from Canada registered smaller values in 1937 than in 1936. Notwithstanding these declines, total exports for the full year amounted to \$1,124,950,000 in 1937, compared with \$1,027,902,000 in 1936, and \$554,240,000 in 1932, the low point for exports during the depression, being increases respectively of 9.4 per cent and 102.9 per cent over 1936 and 1932. The following table summarizes the principal facts of Canada's trade in the calendar years 1916 to 1937.

NOTE

It is pointed out with reference to the statistics in the above table, and particularly regarding Canada's imports in 1935, 1936 and 1937, throughout this review, that the excise duty, which has been included in the value of distilled spirits, chiefly whiskey, imported into Canada from countries entitled to the British Preferential Tariff since the fiscal year 1920-21 is excluded as from April 1, 1935. Imports in 1935, 1936 and 1937, particularly from United Kingdom, are consequently lower than would otherwise be the case.

Revenue collected on imports increased from \$87,775,082 in 1936 to \$104,807,698 in 1937, the highest amount in any year since 1931. In spite of this increase the duty collected expressed as a percentage of the value of imports declined. The average rate of duty on all imports declined to 24.0 per cent in 1937 compared with 25.0 per cent in 1936 and 30.0 per cent in 1932. Since 1926 there has been a tendency for free imports to increase relatively to dutiable imports - free imports representing 46.1 per cent of the total in 1937 as compared with 36.3 per cent in 1926. The average ad valorem rate of duty collected on dutiable imports in 1937 at 24.0 per cent was the lowest for any year during the period.

WORLD TRADE, 1937.

The moderately upward progress of world trade which was noted in 1936 continued in 1937, although a definite slowing up was apparent in the last half of the year. According to calculations of the League of Nations, the value of world trade, taking 1929 as 100, reached 46.2 in 1937 compared with 37.4 in 1936. On a volume basis the index for the full year 1937 stood at 97.5 compared with 85.9 in 1936. The falling-off in the latter part of 1937 is indicated by the fact that the index volume for the second quarter attained the 1929 level, or 100. Preliminary statistics indicate that the bulk of the growth of world trade is accounted for by raw materials largely of mineral origin. The general picture of world trade is one in which the dominant characteristics remain hazy and indistinct. European trade policies, in particular, continue to be subordinated to political and non-commercial factors. Although several advances were made in the actual removal or reduction of restrictions on world commerce, in general, trade barriers remain high.

The factor of monetary instability has greatly diminished in importance although uncertainty regarding the price of gold and the difficulty in stabilizing the French franc were disturbing elements. Ocean freight rates rose appreciably during the year and undoubtedly exercised considerable influence on the composition and amount of world trade.

The statistics in the table above indicate the generality of the upward movement of trade in 1937 as compared with 1936. All twenty-seven countries recorded increases in exports, and China alone failed to show an increase in imports. Exports from Canada increased 9.4 per cent, and imports 27.7 per cent, compared with increases of 21.8 per cent and 24.1 per cent respectively for the total of the twenty-seven countries in the table.

CANADA'S POSITION IN WORLD TRADE.

It will be seen from statistics in the following table that Canada maintained its rank among the leading trading nations as the world's fourth exporting country and eighth in respect to imports. In total trade Canada moved from fifth to sixth position, being supplanted by Japan whose trade, particularly imports, reflected the stimulus to import requirements arising out of military activities in China.

COMPARISON OF VALUE AND VOLUME OF CANADA'S TRADE, 1936 AND 1937.

It is important to bear in mind in comparing trade over different periods that changes in value are not necessarily a measure of changes in the quantity or volume of merchandise involved. Changes in the values of imports and exports over a period may be caused either by variations in quantity, by fluctuations in prices or by a combination of those factors. A preliminary compilation has been made comparing the value and volume of Canada's trade for the calendar year 1937 with that of 1936. The results are set forth in the following table. The declared values, by main groups, are shown for 1936 and 1937 together with the values obtained by re-valuing the quantities of 1937 at the average unit prices prevailing in 1936. In this way the element of price fluctuation is eliminated and a comparison of the volume of trade in the two years is prevented.

It will be noted that all main groups of imports increased both in declared value and on the basis of the revaluation. The declared value of total imports increased from \$635,191,000 in 1936 to \$808,896,000. in 1937 - an increase of \$173,705,000.

If there had been no rise in prices the value of imports would have increased nevertheless to \$756,882,000. The largest increase occurred in the Iron Products group, imports rising from \$135,359,000 in 1936 to \$211,003,000 in 1937, and on the basis of the revaluation, to \$188,091,000. The leading import items accounting for this increase were, - plates and sheets, automobiles, and traction engines. Other items showing substantial increases in value were crude rubber, hides, raw wool, iron ore, scrap iron and steel, bituminous coal and crude petroleum.

In exports, all main groups except Agricultural and Vegetable Products increased in value and volume in 1937 over the previous year. The decline in that group is more than accounted for by the decline in exports of wheat, which dropped in value from \$226,913,000 in 1936 to \$124,439,000 in 1937, while on the basis of the revaluation, (i.e., 1936 prices), they would have been worth only \$89,671,000. This reflects a drastic decline in volume, from 243,041,000 bushels in 1936 to 96,008,000 bushels exported in 1937. Exports of barley declined from \$14,928,000 to \$7,917,000 (\$8,584,000) while wheat flour exported increased from \$20,639,000 to \$23,872,000. (\$17,394,000).

The chief export increases were shown by the Non-Ferrous Metals, and Wood Products and Paper groups. Exports of gold bullion increased from 71 to 105½ million, (106) nickel from 45 1/3 to 59 (56), copper from 32½ to 46½ (31½), lead from 10 to 17 (11), zinc from 8½ to 12½ (8), aluminium from 10.8 to 17.6 (18.2), newsprint paper from 103.6 to 126.4 (119.7), wood pulp from 31.2 to 41.8 (36), planks and boards from 8.2 to 12 (11.4).

Total exports increased in value from \$1,015,205,000 in 1936 to \$1,110,192,000 in 1937, but on the basis of 1936 prices, declined slightly to \$993,816,000, indicating an increase in value of 9.4 per cent and a decline in volume of 2.1 per cent.

Imports, on the other hand, increased in value from \$635,191,000 in 1936 to \$808,896,000 in 1937, (\$756,882 on the basis of the revaluation), indicating an increase in value of 27.4 per cent and a rise in volume of 19.2 per cent.

In 1937 imports under the Agricultural and Vegetable Products group amounted to \$148,152,230 as against \$126,245,938 in 1936, an increase of 17.1 per cent. Principal items accounting for this increase were fresh oranges and bananas, corn, oats, crude rubber, tea, coffee and whiskey. Imports of rum declined substantially, also dried fruits and raw tobacco.

Imports under the Animal and Animal Products group increased 21.9 per cent from \$25,845,624 in 1936 to \$31,528,395 in 1937. Hides and furs showed the principal import increases.

Imports of Fibres, Textiles and Textile Products increased from \$98,915,100 in 1936 to \$115,273,202 in 1937, a gain of 16.6 per cent. Chief increases occurred in imports of raw wool, raw silk, worsteds and serges, woven fabrics and cotton yarns, artificial silk yarn, over-coatings, rags and waste materials. Imports of binder twine and sisal fibre showed a substantial decline.

Imports under the Wood, Wood Products and Paper group increased from \$27,099,785 in 1936 to \$33,999,087 in 1937, a gain of 25.6 per cent. Chief items showing increases were lumber, and paper manufactures.

Iron and Its Products was the largest main group of imports, amounting to \$211,002,837 in 1937 as against \$135,359,104 in 1936, a gain of 55.9 per cent. Chief increases were shown by plates and sheets, traction engines, automobiles, iron ore, rolling mill products and scrap iron and steel. Practically all major items showed increases.

Imports of Non-Ferrous Metals increased from \$35,040,115 in 1936 to \$47,016,907 in 1937, a gain of 34.1 per cent, chief increases being registered by bauxite ore, zinc bars and aluminium.

Imports of Non-Metallic Mineral Products increased from \$115,497,181 in 1936 to \$136,473,376 in 1937, a gain of 18.2 per cent. The leading import items were crude petroleum, coal, gasoline and lubricating oil. Coke imports declined.

Imports under the Chemical Group increased from \$31,971,047 in 1936 to \$37,393,423 in 1937, a gain of 16.9 per cent. Chief increases were shown by fertilizers, compounds of tetraethyl lead, acids, ethylene glycol and copper sulphate. Imports of aniline dyes declined slightly in value.

Imports under the Miscellaneous Group increased from \$39,216,950 in 1936 to \$48,056,868 in 1937, a gain of 22.6 per cent. Chief increases were shown in imports of refrigerators, scientific equipment, ships and vessels, settlers' effects and waste paper clippings. Imports of containers and articles for exhibition declined.

Full details of imports by items are not shown in the present report but these data by principal countries for 1936 and 1937 are published in the "Report on the Trade of Canada, Calendar Year 1937". The table below shows imports into Canada of forty leading commodities in 1937 with comparative figures for 1936 and 1929. The items listed account for nearly three-quarters of total imports in each of the three years.

Of the forty items shown only two, viz: Sugar and products and dyeing and tanning materials declined in value of imports in 1937 compared with the previous year. Of the items for which quantity statistics are recorded one (coffee) showed a decline in quantity but increased in value.

It will be noted that, while all but four of the items, i.e., vegetable oils, raw wool, aluminium products and dyeing and tanning materials, show declines in value of imports in 1937 compared with 1929, the quantity or volume of imports compare favourably with, and in many cases, exceed the 1929 figures. Imports of crude petroleum, raw wool, raw cotton and coffee are particularly notable in this respect.

Canada like other manufacturing countries is dependent on imports to large measure for her supply of certain raw materials, viz: Raw rubber, raw cotton, raw silk, sisal fibre, iron ore, bauxite, sulphur, manganese oxide, etc. An expansion of imports of commodities such as these reflects increased industrial activity in Canada. The table on the following page shows the imports into Canada of 65 commodities for Canadian industry. The list is not exhaustive but it represents, none the less, 37.6 per cent of the total imports in 1937, or \$304,000,000. The increase over 1936 was \$63,000,000 or 20.7 per cent. The figures have been aggregated according to the amount of industrial processing the items have already undergone, and it will be noted that \$29,000,000 of the \$63,000,000 increase was accounted for by raw materials and \$21,000,000 by manufactured articles. Of the last amount "Automobile parts" and "Tin plate" made up \$13,000,000.

Agricultural and Vegetable Products, usually the largest main group of exports, in point of value, declined from \$346,980,652 in 1936 to \$244,583,151 in 1937, a decrease of 29.5 per cent, and, for the first time was exceeded by Exports of the Non-Ferrous Metal group. The decline is due almost entirely to exports of wheat which fell by over 100 million dollars. Barley and whiskey also declined, while exports of wheat flour, clover seed and rubber tire casings increased.

Exports of Animals and Animal Products increased in value from \$124,694,815 in 1936 to \$144,532,334 in 1937, an increase of 15.9 per cent. The principal increases were shown by bacon and hams, cattle and cheese. Moderate increases were registered by fish, both fresh, dried and canned, processed milk, fox skins, hides and fresh, chilled or frozen pork. Mink and muskrat skins declined.

Exports of Fibres and Textiles increased from \$12,227,387 in 1936 to \$14,400,522 in 1937, or 17.8 per cent. Chief increases were shown by cotton fabrics and silk stockings. Exports of binder twine increased slightly, while raw wool declined substantially.

Exports of Wood, Wood Products and Paper, increased in value from \$210,206,707 in 1936 to \$262,967,688 in 1937, a gain of 25.1 per cent. For the first time exports of this group exceeded those of Agricultural Products in value. The chief export items were newsprint paper, planks and boards, wood pulp and pulpwood, all of which showed substantial increases over the preceding year. Logs, square timber, doors and shingles also showed modest increases.

Exports of Iron and Its Products increased in value from \$52,303,878 in 1936 to \$66,027,238 in 1937, a gain of 26.2 per cent. Pigs, castings, farm implements, automobiles and machinery were among the items accounting for the increase. On the other hand, exports of scrap iron, rolling mill products and wire declined.

The Non-Ferrous Metals group increased from \$211,817,242 to \$307,701,616. This constitutes a record export value for this group, coinciding with a new high Canadian production of the leading base metals. The principal items showing increases were: Aluminium, brass, copper, lead, nickel, platinum, zinc and electric apparatus.

Increased exports of asbestos, clay products, glass and glassware, artificial abrasives and gypsum were the principal items accounting for the 28.9 per cent increase in exports under the Non-Metallic group. Coal and petroleum exports were lower than in 1936.

Acids, drugs and medicines, cobalt oxide, fertilizers, paints and varnishes, soaps and sodium compounds were among the items in the Chemicals group showing increases. Acetate of lime decreased.

The 14.2 per cent increase in exports of Miscellaneous Commodities is absorbed mostly in containers, electrical energy, settlers' effects and stationery, n.o.p. Films show a decrease.

The following table shows exports of forty leading commodities from Canada in 1937 with corresponding figures for 1936 and 1929. The items shown represent 84 per cent of the total exports in 1937, 86 per cent in 1936 and 82 per cent in 1929.

Of the forty items in the above table, twenty-two show increases in both quantity and value, four items increased in value with a decrease in quantity and five show decreases in both quantity and value. One item, whiskey, increased in quantity and declined in value, while of the eight which are shown in value only six show substantial increases and two decreased.

Comparison of the exports in the forty leading items with the 1929 statistics reveals the extent of the recovery in Canadian trade, especially on a quantity basis. Although the value of the forty items in the table declined from \$973,268,000 in 1929 to \$932,203,000 in 1937 the majority of the items were exported in greater quantity in 1937. These include newspaper, gold, nickel, meats (principally bacon and hams), copper, cattle, lead, asbestos, zinc, platinum, apolea, fertilizers, electrical energy, lard and compounds, and oatmeal.

GOLD EXPORTS AND EARMARKED GOLD.

In Canadian Trade Statistics, exports of gold are distinguished as between monetary and non-monetary. Monetary gold exports are those which entail a reduction in the Dominion's monetary gold stocks. All other gold exports are classed as non-monetary and shown as merchandise in the trade statistics.

Since February 1936, the Bank of Canada has held gold under earmark. This gold, although sold abroad, does not appear in the trade statistics as an export because it remains in Canada. In view of its relation to export trade, however, and since Canada is a large gold-producing country and exports of gold are as much a part of national production as any other item, statistics respecting holdings of earmarked gold are given on the following page.

The table above shows Canada's trade with forty leading countries which account for over 98 per cent of the total imports and total exports in each year. It will be noted that the increase was well diversified in geographical distribution. Of the forty countries shown, increases in imports numbered 27 and declines 13, while exports to 30 countries increased over 1936 compared with declines in exports to 10 countries. The total value of increases substantially outweighed the declines. The proportion of imports from Empire countries was 29.8 per cent in 1936 and 29.2 per cent in 1937. Exports to Empire Countries represented 47.7 per cent of the total in 1936 and 45.8 per cent in 1937. Largely responsible for this was the decrease in exports of wheat to the United Kingdom which decreased in value from \$154,873,000 in 1936 to \$95,794,000 in 1937.

TRADE OF CANADA WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Trade of Canada with the United Kingdom in 1937 continued the upward movement of recent years. Imports were valued at \$147,294,000, the highest figure in any year since 1930; while domestic exports valued at \$404,600,000 were higher than in any year since 1928. TRADE OF CANADA WITH THE UNITED STATES.

In 1937, as in 1936, the United States was Canada's greatest external source of supply and most valuable market. Both imports and exports, which have been increasing since 1933, showed further increases in 1937. Compared with 1936 the gain in imports amounted to 32.9 per cent and in exports to 15.6 per cent.
