ON TRAVELLERS VEHICLE PERMITS SEPTEMBER 1957

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits totalled 269,367 in September, a decline of 26,486 crossings or 9 per cent lower than in the same month of 1956. If the months of August and September are taken as a unit there was an increase of 21,702 crossings or between 2 and 3 per cent for the two month period. Cumulative data for the nine months show an increase of between 3 and 4 per cent.

NOTE: Travellers vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a travellers vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by vessel.
