ON TRAVELLERS' VEHICLE PERMITS

MAY, 1958

A new record was established for the month of May in the number of foreign vehicles entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits. Entries totalled 202,419, an increase of 16,602 entries over the same month of 1957 and 1,748 higher than the previous record for the month in 1955. Cumulative entries for the first five months were between 3 and 4 per cent heavier than the same period of 1957.

NOTE: - Travellers' vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by vessel.
