Foreign vehicles entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits in January totalled 56,519, a decrease of approximately 2,500 or more than 4 per cent. If data are adjusted for the change of procedure at certain New Brunswick ports it is estimated the decline would have been some 8,500 entries or about 14 per cent.
