Foreign vehicles entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits in February totalled 59,977, an increase of 7,385 or approximately 14 per cent. Data adjusted for the change of procedure at certain New Brunswick ports are estimated at an increase of around 1,100 or some 2 per cent. Cumulative data for two months adjusted for change of procedure would indicate a decline of nearly 7 per cent instead of a gain of 4.4 per cent.

NOTE: Travellers' vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit.) Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by vessel.
