## VOLUME OF HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ENTERING CANADA ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS MARCH, 1951

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in March totalled 62,700, an advance of 32 per cent over the same month in 1950. The comparison is influenced by the fact that the customary heavy traffic on the Easter week-end occurred in March this year but in April last year.

NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles.
