ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS NOVEMBER, 1951

Early snow reduced the volume of highway traffic from the United States in November, the number of vehicles entering on traveller's vehicle permits, at 78,000, being 5 per cent lower than in November, 1950. Total for the first 11 months was up 8 per cent with all provinces showing gains over last year.
