## VOLUME OF HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ENTERING CANADA ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS

JANUARY, 1952

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in January totalled 38,300, a decrease of 6 per cent from the same month last year. Traffic was heavier in the Maritimes, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and the Yukon and lighter in Quebec, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia.

NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles.
