VOLUME OF HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ENTERING CANADA ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS OCTOBER, 1952

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in October totalled 140,600, a drop of 5 per cent below the volume for October last year. Lighter traffic arriving by way of the central and eastern provinces more than balanced heavier traffic in the west. Totals for ten months were 2 per cent higher than in the year before.

NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by ship.
