

## VOLUME OF HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ENTERING CANADA ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS

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MARCH, 1952

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in March totalled 62,500 -- practically unchanged from 62,700 in the same month last year. Losses in the East were almost balanced by gains in the West. The comparison with last year's traffic is influenced by the fact that Easter occurred in April this year but in March last year.

NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles.
