VOLUME OF HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ENTERING CANADA ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS

APRIL, 1954

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits totalled 107,022 in April, an increase of less than 1 per cent over the same month of 1953. Cumulative entries for the first four months are practically unchanged from last year, the decrease amounting to less than 900 vehicles during the period. Gains and losses were unevenly distributed throughout the different regions in April and the cumulative period.

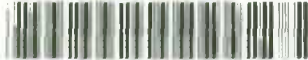
NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by ship.
