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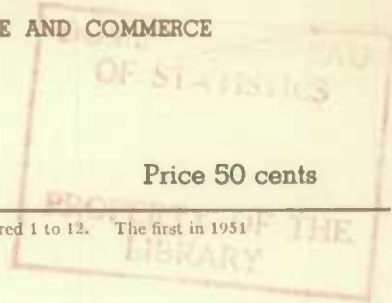
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## THE LABOR FORCE

NOVEMBER 1945 - MARCH 1952

Prepared by the Special Surveys Division





## I INTRODUCTION

At approximately quarterly intervals beginning in November, 1945, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has taken sample surveys to obtain data on the employment characteristics of the Canadian people. The surveys cover the non-institutional population 14 years of age and over. Over 30,000 households chosen by area sampling methods in 112 different areas are visited each quarter. Classification of labour force status is based on the current activity or status of individuals during the specific week covered by each survey.

The final estimates are obtained by weighting the sample survey results to estimated totals of population in age and sex groups in each province. These totals are derived from the official estimates of population based on census counts adjusted by the numbers of births, deaths, immigrants and known emigrants for the intervening period.

The population estimates used for the March, 1952, and November, 1951, surveys are based on 1951 Census data. Estimates for previous surveys had been based on 1941 Census figures and were somewhat higher than if calculated on the basis of 1951 Census data because of the lack of reliable material on certain classes of emigration. The whole labour force series before November, 1951, has been revised to bring the estimates in line with revised population estimates for inter-censal years. This reference paper presents the revised series together with the November, 1951, and March, 1952, estimates.

Data for Canada as a whole are given in Tables 1 to 10, inclusive, Table 1 summarizing labour force characteristics and the remainder dealing with particular classifications. All regional estimates are brought together in Table II. Definitions and explanations with reference to these tables are contained in the following section.

It has not so far been possible to include in the labour force surveys persons living in certain inaccessible areas and Indians living on reservations, an estimated total of 180,000.

## II DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

(a) Labour Force - The civilian labour force is composed of that portion of the civilian non-institutional population 14 years of age and over that had jobs or that did not have jobs and were seeking work during the survey week.

(b) Persons with jobs - For the purpose of the labour force survey, this category consists of two groups:

- (i) those who did any work in the survey week for pay or profit or who did unpaid work which contributed to the running of a farm or a business operated by a relative;

- (ii) those who had jobs but did not work during the survey week because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labour dispute, or temporary layoff with definite instructions to return to work within 30 days of the time of being laid off. (Persons who had jobs but did not work during the survey week and who also looked for work are included in (c) below, "Persons without jobs and seeking work".)

A useful supplement to the estimates of persons with jobs is provided in Table 4 which contains estimates of the weekly hours of work of persons employed in agriculture and in non-agricultural industries, and also of paid workers in non-agricultural industries. While variations in the estimates of the total number of persons with jobs provide a valuable indicator of economic conditions, significant changes in employment conditions may be concealed unless attention is focussed on the extent to which people worked less than full-time. In this table, persons with jobs but not at work in the survey week are classed as working zero hours. Table 5 classifies persons in this category by the reason for their absence from work.

The industry classifications used in Table 6 are those contained in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In Table 7, the occupations classes shown are based on the classifications of occupations prepared for the 1951 Census. Thus these classifications are the same as those used in compiling the 1951 Census.

Estimates of the number of female domestic servants employed in private homes are given in Table II. Particular care should be exercised in interpreting some of the small estimates in this table because of the likelihood of large sampling error.

(c) Persons without jobs and seeking work - This category includes those persons who were looking for work in the survey week and who did no work. Persons who were temporarily away from their jobs during the whole of the survey week and were seeking work are considered as without jobs and are included in this category. In addition to those who actively looked for work, this classification includes persons who would have looked for work, except that they were temporarily ill, were on indefinite or prolonged layoff, or believed that no work was available.

(d) Persons not in the labour force - The non-working part of the population 14 years of age and over consists of those who are outside the labour force in the sense that they do not work for pay or profit or as unpaid workers in family enterprises such as farms or businesses and are not looking for work. Persons not in the labour force include, therefore, such groups as those going to school or keeping house, persons who are too old or unable to work for some other reason, and persons who are voluntarily idle or retired. Persons, such as housewives, students and others, who worked part-time are classed as persons with jobs, or, if they are looking for work, they are classed as persons without jobs and seeking work.

### III COMPARABILITY WITH RELATED DATA

The labour force data contained in this reference paper were obtained from interviews covering a representative sample of households in Canada and therefore differ from other information on segments of the labour force in a number of important respects. Labour force surveys provide data on the labour force participation of the whole civilian population of working age without duplication or omission. Those with more than one job or more than one activity (e.g. working and looking for work) in a week are counted only once.

Although no attempt is made in this publication to label any group as "employed", the category persons with jobs is often used as an indication of the total number employed. These individuals are "employed" in the sense that they either worked at some time during the week or have a job attachment (even though they may not be working) and are therefore not competing for job opportunities. Current employment data based upon reports from business establishments count the number of persons on the payrolls of reporting establishments. Those appearing on two such payrolls during the reporting period are counted twice, but the groups not covered by such reports are the most important source of difference. The monthly report on employment and payrolls is concerned only with paid workers, and, in addition, excludes agriculture, fishing, hunting and trapping, domestic service, some government activities and much of the personal service industry. Also excluded are establishments in the fields surveyed which normally employ 14 or less persons. Among the establishments covered employees who have a job but are not at work and not being paid (and therefore do not appear on a payroll) are excluded.

The segment of the labour force without jobs and seeking work is not directly comparable with applications on hand at National Employment Service offices or with statistics of claimants or beneficiaries under Unemployment Insurance. The National Employment Service takes applications for employment from claimants for Unemployment Insurance and others. The number of applications on hand at a particular date is the number of applications received and not yet disposed of, which depends upon employment conditions and office procedures designed to handle the applications in the most effective manner from the point of view of placing applicants in suitable jobs. In the first place all of those seeking work do not apply at the National Employment Service. Others who apply may be working full time or part time and those with "applications on hand" may obtain work either of a casual nature or otherwise without having the application lapse. In preparing reports of applications on hand the National Employment Service excludes those who are working full time or part time at the time of application and duplicate registrations of those who apply in more than one office. When an applicant is known to have found work (e.g. has been placed by the office or reports that he is going back to work and collects the remaining benefit payable to him) his application is removed from the file immediately. Applicants for Unemployment Insurance benefit who miss two reporting days (they usually report once a week) are removed from the file immediately after the second reporting day. The applications of those who are not claimants for benefit are kept in the file for 30 days since they last visited the office if nothing more is known of them. Claimants for benefit who are involved in

a temporary mass layoff (one involving 50 or more persons where it is expected they will return to work for the same employer) are not registered for employment until 14 to 21 days have elapsed since the layoff. Thus, it is clear that a count of the file of applications on hand does not constitute a survey of labour force activity in any particular week and cannot therefore be compared directly with the labour force group without jobs and seeking work.

Statistics of claimants on the live register and of persons receiving benefit (Unemployment Insurance) are governed by the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act and the administrative regulations and procedures used in implementing that statute. The Act excludes from coverage such employment as agriculture, horticulture and forestry; fishing; hunting and trapping; domestic service in a private home; hospitals and charitable institutions; professional nursing; teaching; police forces; some government employment; and salaried employees earning more than \$4,800 a year (for a full list of exclusions, see part II of the first schedule of the Act). The provisions governing the receipt of Unemployment Insurance benefit differ very considerably from the criteria used in establishing the group without jobs and seeking work. A claimant must satisfy certain minimum contribution requirements to establish benefit rights, so young persons seeking their first jobs are excluded as are others who have had no recent attachment to insured employment. On the other hand, the Act is designed to compensate for involuntary loss of earnings under certain circumstances and not necessarily loss of a job. Thus, those who have lost their jobs through their own misconduct or who have voluntarily left their former employment are subject to disqualification for a period while others who are on temporary layoff or not at work because of bad weather may file a claim and receive benefit. Similarly those on short time (working part of each week or alternate weeks) may receive benefit for all or part of the time lost. The provisions of the Act and the regulations are designed to encourage claimants to find and accept employment of short duration while on claim. Thus some claimants and beneficiaries may have jobs at which they are not working for a time, and may work part or all of a week. The category without jobs and seeking work in the labour force survey includes only those persons who did no work during the survey week and were looking for work.

#### IV RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

The estimates in this reference paper are based on a sample of the population and may differ from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same schedules, instructions and enumerators.

The approximate sampling variability of estimates of various sizes are shown in the table below. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference between the estimate and the figure which would have been obtained from a complete census is less than the sampling variability indicated.

Estimates of characteristics by age and sex are subject to slightly less sampling variability than that shown above.

The estimates of sampling variability given here cannot be applied to estimates of survey-to-survey change. The ratio of two successive published estimates of any labour force characteristic is likely to be relatively more reliable than either of the two estimates from which it is computed.

In addition to the sampling variability outlined above, the data obtained from either a sample or a census will differ from the actual data because of enumerator and respondent variations. The principal elements of this nature are:

1. The respondent may not recall correctly details of the past week particularly relating to persons other than himself.
2. The enumerator may misinterpret the concepts and definitions despite careful instruction.
3. The enumerator may, by chance, phrase questions which influence the answers of the respondent.
4. The respondent may, by chance, phrase answers which influence the questions by the enumerator.
5. There may be deliberate mis-statements by either enumerator or respondent.

The amount of variance associated with these factors varies with the nature of the inquiry. In general, the more personal and more subjective inquiries are subject to greater error.

The non-sampling error is as prevalent in a census as in a sample, and, in some cases, may exceed the error introduced by sampling.

VI APPENDIX

A schematic description of the sample design used in the labour force surveys

There are four stages or levels in the process which leads to the designation of a set of sample households. The first three stages involve the choice of sample areas and the final stage the choice of households. The summary description of the sampling process at each stage given below shows the different steps required in cities of 50,000 population and over and in other areas.
