

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STATISTICS ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT MONTHLY REPORT - APRIL AND MAY, 1943.

The number of applications for benefit payments under the Unemployment Insurance Act during April and May, 1943, showed a decided drop from preceding months, reflecting normal seasonal tendencies. In May the number of claims filed at local offices in Canada was 2,027, as compared with 3,953 in April, 5,046 in March and 4,822 in February. During April and May, 1942, claims registered at local offices numbered 2,925 and 2,799, respectively.

In previous monthly reports, data on claims and benefits were given according to the jurisdiction of district and regional offices. In some cases these jurisdictions extend over Provincial boundaries. In the present report the data have been arranged by Provinces and will be so presented in subsequent reports.

The number of applications for employment by insured persons was slightly higher in March (191,100) than in recent months. In April it was 157,895 and in February 144,103. Data on insured applicants for employment unplaced on the last day of each four weeks have shown greater stability, being 53,945 on February 25th, 51,546 on April 1st, and 51,776 on April 29th. These figures are not strictly conparable with those of 1942 because late in August 1942 the National Selective Service regulations requiring, with a few exceptions, seven days' notice of separation by either the employer or employee, came into effect. At the same time, employees and employers affected by the order were required to obtain employment or to recruit workers only through the Federal employment offices. This resulted in a great increase in applications for employment and unplaced applicants on any given date, since most transfers of workers are now included as applicants. With the present compulsory employment transfers successively influencing applications, placements, etc., it would seem that the usefulness of employment office figures as a measure of unemployment among the insured population over any period of more than a few months, will be largely vitiated.

The number of persons receiving benefit (5,434 in April and 4,848 in May) also shows a decline since March, when the number was 5,996. This decline in the number of beneficiaries is relatively less than the decline in the number of claimants since March, indicating the influence of the time lag between the submission of a claim and the receipt of benefit. The number of beneficiaries in the corresponding months of 1942 were: March, 1,249; April, 2,202; and May, 2,206.

During April the proportion of those entitled to benefit who actually commenced receiving it was 75 per cent, while in May it was 112 per cent. In April and May, 1942, these percentages were 67 and 54, respectively. There is a time lag of approximately ten days to two weeks between the adjudication of a claim and the receipt of benefit, which explains the figure of 112 per cent in May.

In April and May the averages of days benefit paid per beneficiary were 14 and 14.2, as against 10.4 and 13.1 in April and May, 1942.

The average amount paid per beneficiary was \$26.26 in April and \$26.64 in May. In April and May, 1942, the corresponding amounts were \$18.87 and \$23.68. While the average amount paid per compensated day of unemployment was \$1.38 both in April and May, it stood at \$1.82 and \$1.80 in April and May, 1942. The increased average amounts paid per beneficiary over the corresponding months of last year might have been due merely to the increased average days paid, but the increase in the average amount paid per compensated day indicates that it was due in part also to a rise in the average daily rate of benefit. The daily rate of benefit of each beneficiary depends upon his daily average contribution in the past two years, which in turn depends upon his average earnings. The daily rate of benefit is about 17 p.c. higher, for those having dependents than for those having no dependents. Thus, it would seem that those in the higher earnings brackets or those with dependents, or both, were subject in April and May, to proportionately greater compensated unemployment, as compared with the insured population as a whole, than was the case a year ago. During the twelve months April, 1942, to March, 1943 the average amount paid per compensated day of unemployment fluctuated between \$1.74 in August, 1942, and \$1.89 in March, 1943. The arithmetic mean of these monthly averages is \$1.82; the standard deviation is \$.052.

The following tables set forth the pertinent data concerning the number of claims filed, their disposition, the chief reasons for non-entitlement to benefit, employment applications by insured persons, number of beneficiaries, number of days' benefit paid and amount of benefit paid during April and May, 1943.
