



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STATISTICS ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT

MONTHLY REPORT - JUNE AND JULY, 1943

During June and July, applications for benefit payments under the Unemployment Insurance Act numbered 1,772 and 1,087 respectively. The number of claims lodged at local offices of the Unemployment Insurance Commission has declined notably each month since March, when 5,046 claims were filed. In June and July, 1942, 4,629 and 2,668 claims were registered in local offices. The figure for June 1942 is not typical, however, since it includes 2,373 claims from the Maritimes, where there was a partial shut-down of the collieries, particularly in the Sydney, N.S. area.

The number of claims forwarded to insurance offices shows a similar decline, from a high point of 4,775 in March to 1,692 in June, and 1,068 in July. During June and July of last year claims sent forward to insurance offices numbered 2,551 and 4,024. The July 1942 figure on claims received at insurance offices was influenced by the large number of claims lodged in local offices in June, of these claims 2,067 being received at the Moncton regional office.

That the claimant voluntarily left his employment without just cause remains' the most important cause for non-entitlement to benefit, with insufficient contributions the second most important cause.

During June, 2,729 persons received benefit, while in July, 1,868 persons were paid benefit, compared with 1,881 and 1,616 persons who received benefit payments during June and July of last year.

The number commencing the receipt of benefit payments was 1,096 in June and 871 in July, while during June and July a year ago, it was 1,130 and 1,071, respectively. The number of persons <u>commencing</u> the receipt of benefit each month fluctuates directly with the claims lodged, but there is a lag of about one and one-half months between fluctuations in the number of claims and in the <u>total</u> number of persons to whom benefits are paid. Thus, from November 1942 until February 1943, when the number of claims lodged each month was increasing, more persons submitted claims than received benefit, but since March 1943, with the number of claims decreasing each month, there have been more beneficiaries than claimants. The lag between claims submitted and benefits paid is due to a combination of factors. The statutory provisions such as the nine waiting days required in each benefit year before benefit can be paid, is one cause. Then, although the average period compensated runs around thirteen days this average is influenced by the comparatively many who draw less than five days. Those who continue on benefit for forty or more days may appear in the figures of persons receiving benefit for three or more consecutive months. In addition, once an insured person has set up a benefit year and has accumulated "waiting days", a few days unemployment will result in a renewal claim and almost immediate payment of benefit.

The average duration of the unemployment compensated in June was 13.2 days, and in July 13.5 days, compared with 11.8 days and 12.5 days in June and July, 1942.

During June and July averages of \$24.30 and \$24.40 were paid per beneficiary, while in June and July of last year the average amounts paid were \$21.02 and \$22.03.

The average amount paid per compensated day of unemployment was \$1.84 in June and \$1.81 in July, while in June and July, 1942, it was \$1.78 and \$1.77, respectively.

Tables A to G, following, set forth the pertinent data respecting claims filed, their disposition, reasons for non-entitlement to benefit, employment applications by insured persons, and the duration and amount of benefit paid, by provinces.
