

ANNUAL REPORT ON BENEFIT YEARS ESTABLISHED UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT - 1942.

This is the first annual statistical report on the operation of the benefit provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act. The data were supplied to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics by the Unemployment Insurance Commission through the Treasury Office.

To provide a population reference for the data regarding benefit years established and benefits paid, the first three tables (Tables A, B and C) present breakdowns of the total insured population by industry, sex, age group and Province, and by occupation, sex and Province. These tables are identical in form with Tables 9 to 14 dealing with Industrial and Occupational classification of persons who established benefit years.

The term "insured population" is susceptible of a variety of interpretations, each of which is valid according to different points of view. Under the Unemployment Insurance Act, one of the factors determining the duration of the benefit to which a claimant is entitled is the number of days contributions made in respect of him in the five years immediately preceding the date of his claim. All persons who have contributed during the past five years and who are still living may, therefore, be considered potential claimants, and constitute one definition of the "insured population". Contributions have been payable under the Act only since July 1, 1941, so it is to be expected that with new entrants into and seasonal movements through the field of insurable employment, the total number of persons coming within the purview of the Act will increase up to July, 1946 even on the hypothesis of stable employment conditions.

Many persons who have contributed at some time but to whom a current book has not been issued will not, however, re-enter insurable employment and become what might be called "actively insured". Thus the most practical definition of "insured population" is - "Those persons to whom a current insurance book has been issued and who are employed or potentially employable". This would include those who are currently working in insurable employment and contributing, insured applicants for employment (including claimants), and those who have stopped contributing within the preceding few months but about whom nothing is known. Those who are permanently incapacitated, retired, or by any means removed indefinitely from the employment field, should be excluded. This might be called the "actively insured population".

Tables A, B and C, following, approximate the definition of the "actively insured population" which is subject to continuous change. These tables are the result of a registration of persons to whom insurance books ware issued for the year 1942-43, between April 1, 1942 and August 31, 1942. In point of time this is the population from which the claimants represented in Tables 1 to 16 were drawn, since each claimant must have contributed for at least one hundred and eighty days prior to December 31, 1942. Thus, he must have been issued a book before June 1, 1942.

Benefit Years Established.

The following tables exhibit data respecting the 17,188 cases in which benefit years were established during 1942. Contributions first became payable on behalf of insured persons on July 1, 1941, but, since one hundred and eighty days contributions are necessary prior to the establishing of a benefit year, none could be set up until January 27, 1942. As a matter of fact, none was established until February, 1942, and during that month only about 800 were established.

The Unemployment Insurance Act provides that a benefit year is set up when an insured person, upon becoming unemployed and submitting a claim, proves that contributions have been made on his behalf for at least 180 days. This does not mean that the claimant is immediately eligible to benefit since other provisions of the Act determine his eligibility. For example, the Act specifies that the claimant must put in nine "waiting days", i.e., nine "working days" of unemployment before the first day of unemployment for which he can be paid benefit in any benefit year. In addition, the Act provides that only involuntary unemployment can be compensated, i.e., persons who voluntarily leave their employment without just cause, who are dismissed for misconduct, or whose unemployment is due to a labour dispute in which they are directly involved, are not eligible for benefit during these cases of unemployment. Persons in certain circumstances are excluded from benefit so long as these circumstances apply, i.e., a claimant must be capable of and available for work during his period of compensated unemployment, he must not have refused a suitable offer of employment, he must be sixteen years of age or over, he must not be an inmate of an institution maintained in whole or in part out of public funds, and in most cases he must be resident in Canada. The foregoing is not an exhaustive survey of the statutory regulations concerning eligibility for benefit, but is given merely by way of illustration.

The establishment of a benefit year merely means that the claimant's right to certain benefits within the succeeding twelve months has been determined. The duration of this benefit is determined by the duration of his contributions during the past five years and the duration of benefit drawn within the past three years. The amount of daily or weekly benefit payable depends upon his daily or weekly average contribution within the past two years and upon whether or not he has a dependent. (See Third Schedule of the Act.)

Once a benefit year has been set up and the duration and rate of the benefit that can be drawn within the following twelve months is determined, the claimant may draw upon these benefits in subsequent periods of unemployment at the determined rate and for a total number of days not exceeding the days authorized.

A benefit year may be terminated in a variety of ways, but there are three chief causes of termination that are covered in this and subsequent reports. These are: (1) Through exhaustion, i.e., the benefit year automatically terminates when the benefit rights to which the claimant has been declared entitled are used up; (2) through lapsing, i.e., twelve months after the date of the claim upon which the benefit year is based, it automatically lapses if the benefits have not been exhausted. (In the present report no benefit years have lapsed, since in no case had twelve months elapsed between the date of the claim and the end of the calendar year); (3) through the death of the claimant.

When a benefit year is terminated, the claimant may set up another benefit year if, becoming unemployed, he submits an initial claim and proves that contributions have been made on his behalf for at least sixty days since he last drew benefit in the benefit year immediately preceding. Thus, an individual may establish more than one benefit year during the calendar year. During 1942, as will be seen in Table 2, nine persons established two benefit years, the total benefit years set up being 17,188, and the number of persons involved being 17,179.

The following tables, numbered 1 to 16, set forth the data on benefit years established, some characteristics of the persons involved, benefit days authorized, benefit days paid and benefit years terminated.

Table 1 is a general statement showing the number of benefit days authorized and the benefit days paid during 1942, as well as the benefit days outstanding at the end of 1942. The total benefit days authorized to those who actually drew benefit during the year, is also noted. This provides information regarding the general adequacy of the benefit rights available to meet the unemployment encountered during the period. Since less than 25 per cent of the days authorized were used, and since, on the whole, less than 45 per cent of the days authorized to those who drew any benefit were used, the rights available would seem to have been more than adequate to meet the unemployment encountered during 1942. Since the employment situation during 1942 is known to have been good, this is not surprising.

Table 2 is also a general statement, setting forth, by provinces, the number of benefit years established, the number of days authorized and the persons involved, showing the number who set up more than one benefit year. This indicates to what extent those who exhaust one benefit year are able, by re-establishing their rights, to draw further benefit. The Act has been in force for so short a period, and unemployment has been so relatively light that few persons during 1942 found it necessary to set up more than one benefit year.

Table 3 classifies the persons who established benefit years, the persons who drew benefit, the benefit days paid and the amount of benefit paid, by sex and province. These data can be used to determine the average number of days paid and the average amount of benefit paid to those who established benefit years, and to those who actually drew benefit.

The amount of benefit paid, as presented in this table is not precisely the amount paid out of the Unemployment Insurance Fund during 1942. If, for exemple, a claimant did not prove that he had a dependent prior to the issuing of his first check but subsequently proved his right to the higher rate for those having dependents, the change in his rate would not be reflected here. Similarly, rebates of benefit or other adjustments due to payments in error, are not included. This is due to the manner in which these data must be collected. A punch card is set up for each benefit year that is established and such stable data as the name, sex, age, daily rate of benefit, days authorized, etc. are punched immediately. Then, when the benefit year is terminated, if this should happen during the year, or at the end of the calendar year in the case of those not terminated, the days paid and days remaining are punched. At the end of the calendar year these punch cards are sent to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics where the sorting and tabulating is undertaken. The figures for the amount of benefit paid are obtained in the Bureau by sorting the cards on the daily rate of benefit and obtaining for each daily rate a total of days paid. The total days paid to each sex in each Province is then multiplied by that daily rate and the sum of the emounts so obtained gives the total amount of benefit paid. It is highly improbable that the amount obtained by these means will agree exactly with the net amount actually paid out. But no other means exist at the present time for obtaining the amount of benefit paid by sex and Province.

Table 4 classifies the persons who established benefit years by sex and the number of benefit days peid according to whether or not he or she had a dependent at the time the benefit year was set up. If a person set up more than one benefit year the status at the time of the establishment of the first benefit year in the calendar year is recorded. It is felt that since a person's status with regard to dependents is subject to change from time to time, the above procedure yields as accurate material as could be obtained.

Tables 5 and 6 classify the persons who drew benefit and the benefit days paid by sex and Province according to the number of benefit days paid and the daily rate of benefit. Table 5 indicates the distribution of the persons who drew benefit with regard to the number of days paid and the number of days paid to the persons in each group. The distribution of males with reference to number of days benefit paid shows that the largest single group falls within the 1 - 4 day class, with the second and third largest groups falling within the 5 - 9 day and 10 - 14 day classes, respectively. The largest group of females falls within the 5 - 9 day class with the 35-39 day class second and the 1 - 4 day class third. Both sexes show a concentration of cases drawing relatively few days benefit, e.g., 50 per cent of the males and 39 per cent of the females who drew benefit, drew less than 15 days. At the same time 43 per cent of the males and 35 per cent of the females who set up benefit years drew no benefit and 71 per cent of the males and 60 per cent of the females who established benefit years

either drew no benefit or drew less than 15 days. The number of days benefit paid to each sex is concentrated mainly in the 35 - 39 day class. The duration of the benefit to which a person is entitled is calculated by subtracting from one-fifth of the days contributed during the past five years, one-third of the days benefit drawn during the past three years. Since 180 days contributions are necessary to establish a benefit year and at least 60 days contributions must be paid since benefit was last drawn before another benefit year can be established, the minimum for days authorized in any benefit year is 36. The concentration of days paid in the 35 - 39 day class can be largely attributed to those who established benefit years of the minimum duration and then exhausted their benefit rights.

Table 6 distributes the persons who drew benefit according to the daily rate of benefit. The daily rate of benefit can be calculated in any given case by multiplying the average daily contribution of the insured person during the two years immediately preceding the date of claim by 34 in the case of persons having no dependent, and by 40 in the case of persons having one or more dependents. According to the amount of his daily earnings an insured person contributes either 1.5, 2, 2.5, 3, 3.5, 4, 5 or 6 cents a day. During any two-year period the individual may contribute at a different rate from time to time, but many will contribute at the same rate during the entire period. Thus, the concentration of persons in the \$2.00 - \$2.09 rate consists mainly of those who contributed 5 cents a day throughout and who were paid at the dependency rate, as well as those who contributed 6 cents a day throughout and were paid at the dependency rate, and those who were paid \$2.40 a day contributed throughout at 6 cents a day, and were paid at the dependency rate, and those who were paid from \$2.05 to \$2.39 contributed at 6 cents a day for part of the time and must have been paid at the dependency rate.

Whereas 63 per cent of the female beneficiaries were paid between \$1.00 and \$1.39 a day, 63 per cent of the male beneficiaries were paid \$1.90 to \$2.40 a day. This can be explained in part by the fact, as shown in Table 4, that the great majority of males were paid at the rate for persons having dependents while few females were paid for a dependent. In part, however, it must be due to the difference in earnings and the consequent difference in contribution rates.

Tables 7 and 8 classify the persons who established benefit years and the benefit days paid by the age, sex and province of the person setting up the benefit year. Although Table B shows that the age groups over 50 contain relatively few insured persons, they established proportionately more benefit years than did those in the younger age groups. Even more notable is the distribution of benefit days paid in Table 8, indicating that the duration of the unemployment suffered by persons over 50 was markedly longer than that of younger individuals.

Tables 9 to 12 set forth the industry, sex, age and province of the persons who set up benefit years, as well as the days paid to these persons. These tables parallel in form Tables B and C for the insured population.

Tables 13 and 14 classify the persons setting up benefit years and the benefit days paid to these persons, by occupation groups, sex and province. These tables parallel Table A for the insured population.

Tables 15 and 16 are concerned with the benefit years terminated during 1942. Of the total benefit years terminated (1,847) only 3 were terminated from causes other than the exhaustion of the benefit rights available, since sufficient time did not elapse between the setting up of the first benefit year in February, 1942 and the end of the calendar year to allow for the lapsing of rights. The three cases not covered in the table were caused by death in two instances and "other causes" in the third.

Table 15, which classifies the benefit years terminated by the age and sex of the beneficiaries as well as by the cause of termination, demonstrates the extent to which persons in the upper age brackets suffer from longer periods of unemployment than do the younger individuals. The largest number of benefit years terminated in any age group occurs in the group, "65 and over".

Table 16 distributes the benefit years terminated and the days paid according to daily rate of benefit. It will be noted that the distribution of persons here is, roughly, the same with respect to daily rate as that shown in Table 6 for all persons who drew benefit.
