ANNUAL REPORT ON CURRENT BENEFIT YEARS UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT - 1943.

The basic material for this report was supplied to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics by the Unemployment Insurance Commission through the Treasury Offices. Each of the nine Treasury Offices submits a daily report on benefit years established and, from these reports, a punch card is set up for each benefit year. At the end of every month the Treasury Offices also submit reports on benefit years terminated and, on the basis of these reports, cards representing terminated benefit years are completed. The cards not completed at the end of the calendar year (i. e. those representing benefit years current at that time) are then completed from a report supplying the "days paid" and "days remaining" as at December 31st, for each.

INSURED POPULATION

The population from which the persons who established benefit years in 1943 were drawn, would be, roughly, those who exchanged their insurance books at April lst, 1943, plus those to whom books were issued during April and May of that year. This represents a minimum estimate of the "actively insured population" since some who had previously held a book might have sufficient contribution credits to establish a benefit year and some with partial credits from a past book might re-enter insurable employment after May 1943 and add sufficient contributions to credits from a past cook might rementer insurable employment after May 1945 and add sufficient contributions to become eligible for benefit before the end of the year. June 1st is taken as the significant date, however, since at least 180 days' (about 7 months) contributions must be paid before an insured person is entitled to establish a benefit year. The first three tables (Tables A. B and C.) of this report present data respecting the occupation and sex, by province; the industry and sex by age groups; and the industry and sex by province of the 1,997,700 persons who are known to have been issued insurance books in April 1945. By May 51st of that year, a total of 2,162,200 insurance books for the insurance year 1945—44 had been issued. Comparable data for the persons who established benefit years and the benefit days paid on those benefit years, during the calendar year 1943, are presented in Tables 9 to 14.

BENEFIT YEARS

Upon becoming unemployed an insured person may submit a claim for benefit and if it is proven that contributions have been made on his behalf for at least 180 days in the two years immediately preceding the date of his claim, a benefit year is established for him. This means that certain benefit rights (so many days at a certain rate) are due him and he may draw upon them (until they are exhausted) during this and subsequent periods of unemployment for the succeeding twelve months.

If the authorized benefit rights are exhausted within twelve months, the benefit year is terminated by exhaustion, but if, at the end of twelve months the authorized benefits are not used up, the benefit year automatically terminates (lapses). Upon the termination of one benefit year, the insured person can immediately establish another, provided it is proven that not less than 60 days' contributions have been paid in respect of him since the commencement of his last benefit year.

The establishment of benefit years and their termination is thus a continuous process and during any twelve-month period an individual may, theoretically, establish as many as three benefit years. For the purposes of the present statistical report, however, the calendar year is taken as the unit of time covered, so that some benefit years in existence at the beginning of the year and carried over from the proceeding calendar year, as well as some established in the calendar year being surveyed and carried over into the text calendar year are included, in addition to those that were established and terminated during 1943.

Table 2 of this report indicates, for example, that during 1948 a total of 19,678 benefit years were established but, since 90 persons established two benefit years, the total of persons involved was only 19,588. At the same time, 35,558 persons had benefit rights available during 1943 (see Table 3) so that the benefit rights available in 1945 for 15,970 persons represented benefit years carried over from 1942.

The 19,588 persons who established benefit years comprise only 1.0% of those who might be considered potential claimants, as presented in Tables A. B and C. Unemployment Insurance contributions first became payable in Canada on July 1, 1941 and benefit payments commenced in February 1942. Relatively full employment has been maintained since that time to meet the expanding needs of Canadian and allied armed forces and civilian populations. The majority of the contributors to the Unemployment Insurance Fund have, therefore, contributed steadily and have not established benefit years.

The fact that a benefit year has been established does not mean that the insured person involved is entitled to benefit at that time - it merely means that the duration and rate of his benefit rights have been determined from the duration and rate of the contributions made in his behalf during the past five years, the duration of benefits drawn by him in the past three years and whether or not he has a dependent as defined by the Act.

Entitlement to benefit at any time is, of course, determined on the basis of the provisions of the Act as applied to the circumstances surrounding the particular case. Generally speaking, the provisions of the Act are such that cases of involuntary unemployment are compensated whereas cases of voluntary unemployment are not compensated. The circumstances surrounding a particular case may change during the period of unemployment and thus the decision regarding entitlement to benefit may be amended.

The general statement above concerning voluntary and involuntary unemployment is subject to some qualification, since certain provisions of the Act render some days of involuntary unemployment "non-compensable". For example, no compensation is paid for the first nine days of unemployment in each benefit year since these are set aside as a "waiting period". Similarly, days on which the claimant is incapacitated, such as sick days, are not compensated, since the claimant is considered not "capable of and available for work".

Some provisions of the Act defining voluntary and involuntary unemployment are the following: An insured person shall be disqualified from receiving benefit if he has neglected to avail himself of an opportunity of suitable employment; if he has lost his employment because of a stoppage of work due to a labour dispute in which he is directly interested; if he has been discharged from his employment because of his own misconduct; or if he voluntarily leaves his employment without just cause.

On the other hand, refusing an offer of work or neglecting an opportunity to work, does not constitute a cause for disqualification unless the employment involved is "suitable employment" as defined in the act. In addition, an insured person is not disqualified if he has declined an offer of employment arising in consequence of a stoppage of work due to a labour dispute.

Certain personal circumstances must also be taken into consideration in determining eligibility for benefit. For example, an insured person is disqualified from receiving benefit while he is: under sixteen years of age, an inmate of any prison or institution wholly or partly supported out of public funds, etc.

The foregoing should not be construed as an exhaustive survey of the statutory regulations concerning eligibility for benefit. It is given merely by way of illustration.

Many of the insured persons who had benefit rights available in 1945 did not draw benefit. In some cases this was due to re-employment before benefit payment actually commenced, while in other cases it was a result of an opinion that the insured person was not entitled to receive benefit under existing circumstances because of certain provisions of the Act. Table 5 indicates that, of the 35,558 persons who had established benefit years that were currently in existence at some time during 1945, only 16,592 actually drew benefit during the year.

The Tables numbered 1 to 17, following, set forth data respecting the persons having benefit years current in 1945, benefit years established in 1943, some characteristics of the persons involved, benefit days authorized, benefit days paid and benefit years terminated in 1943.

Table 1 is a general statement showing the total number of benefit days available in 1943 and the number of benefit days paid. To complete the picture, the number of days that lapsed because of the lapsing of benefit rights that were not exhausted within twelve months of the establishment of the benefit year, is also included. This statement indicates that, although a total of 2,133,810 days were available in 1943 only 475,799 days (or 22.3%) were paid. Since employment conditions are known to have been good in 1943, it is not surprising to find that the benefit rights available were, on the whole, much more than sufficient to meet the need for them.

Table 2 is also a general statement classifying the total benefit years established in 1943, the benefit days authorized in those benefit years, and the number of benefit years established by the persons involved, by province. It will be seen that no one established three benefit years, and, of the 19,538 persons who established benefit years only 90 established two benefit years.

Table 3 classifies the 33,558 persons with benefit years current in 1943 (this includes those whose benefit years carried over from 1942), the persons who drew benefit in 1943, the benefit days paid to them and the amount of benefit paid, by sex and province.

The amount of benefit paid as presented in the Table is not precisely the amount paid out of the Unemployment Insurance Fund during the year. Adjustments due to the changing status of claimants, underpayments or overpayments made in error, etc., cannot be reflected here. This is so because of the method necessarily used to obtain the figures in Table 3. The punch card representing each benefit year contains the daily rate of benefit and the number of days paid. These are sorted by daily rate of benefit for each sex and province and the total of days paid at each daily rate is obtained. The amount of benefit paid by sex and province is then obtained by multiplying each daily rate by the number of days paid at that rate and obtaining the sum of the products for each sex and province.

Although the resulting amount is not exactly the amount paid out of the fund, it has two main advantages for statistical purposes. It is, strictly speaking, the comparable figure to the number of days paid and persons included as presented in Table 3 and the method outlined above is the only one currently available for obtaining the amount of benefit paid by sex and province.

Table 4 presents the number of persons with benefit years current in 1943 and the benefit days paid to them, classified according to whether or not the persons involved had a dependent at the time the benefit year was established. If a person set up more than one benefit year, the dependency status as at the time the first benefit year in 1943 was established, is used. In the case of those whose only benefit year current in 1943 was carried over from 1942, the dependency status is taken as at the time that benefit year was established. Since a person's status with regard to dependents is subject to change over any period of time, it is felt that this procedure yields as accurate material as could be obtained by any other means.

In Table 5 the persons with benefit years current in 1943 are classified according to the number of benefit days paid to them in that year. In addition, the number of benefit days paid to the persons in each class of the frequency distribution, are given by sex and province. The distribution of males with respect to number of days paid shows that 13,978, or 52% of the total (27,053) drew no benefit. Of the males who drew benefit, the largest single group falls within the 5-9 day class and the second largest group within the 1-4 day class. The females follow a similar pattern, with 2,988, or 46% of the total (6,505) arawing no benefit and with the two largest single groups falling within the 5-9 and 1-4 day classes. Both sexes show a definite concentration of cases drawing either no benefit or relatively few days. Thus, 63% of the males and 61% of the females either drew no benefit or drew less than ten days.

Table 6 distributes the persons who drew benefit according to daily rate of benefit and dependency status. The daily rate of benefit is determined by the amount of the insured person's daily average contribution during the past two years and whether or not he has a dependent within the meaning of the Act. Persons contribute either 1.5, 2.0, 2.5, 3.0, 3.5, 4.0, 5.0, or 6.0 cents a day depending upon the amount of their earnings. As earnings fluctuate an individual's daily contribution may fluctuate, so the daily average does not necessarily coincide with any one of the schedule rates. The daily rate of benefit is calculated by multiplying the daily average contribution during the preceding two years by 40 if the claimant has a dependent and by 34 if he has no dependent. Thus, the concentration of males at rates over \$2.00 a day is due partly to the large proportion of them who claimed at the dependency rate, but more particularly to their relatively high earnings. This is immonstrated by the fact that the largest single group of males having no dependents falls within the \$2.00 - \$2.09 class, the upper limit for a person without dependents being \$2.04 a day.

The largest group of females, on the other hand, falls within the \$1.30-\$1.39 class and even for the relatively few females who drew benefit at the rate for those having dependents, the largest groups fall between \$1.50-\$1.69. This reflects the generally lower earnings of females in the insured group.

Tables 7 to 14 are restricted to those who established benefit years during the calendar year 1943 and the benefit days paid on those benefit years. Tables 7 and 8 classify the persons who established benefit years in 1943 and the benefit days paid on those benefit years by age group, sex and province. Although Table B. shows that the age groups over 50 contain relatively few insured persons, the number of males in those age groups who established benefit years was approximately equal to or greater than the corresponding numbers in the age groups under 50. At the same time, the number of benefit days paid to males in each age group over 50 was consistently greater than the number paid in each age group under 50. Thus, both the incidence of unemployment and its duration were markedly greater for insured males over 50 than for younger insured males.

The age composition of the females in the insured population shows a much greater concentration of females than of males in the age groups under 30. This, along with the small number of females who established benefit years, make definite conclusions regarding the relationship between age and female unemployment somewhat tenuous. It would seem, however, from the data available here that the pattern is somewhat different for the two sexes.

Tables 9 to 12 set forth the industry, sex, age and province of the persons who established benefit years in 1943 as well as the days paid on these benefit years. These tables parallel in form Tables B and C for the insured population.

Tables 13 and 14 classify the persons who set up benefit years in 1943 and the days paid on those benefit years by occupation groups, sex and province. These tables parallel in form Table A for the insured population.

Tables 15 to 17 are concerned with the benefit years terminated in 1943. In Table 15 the total benefit years terminated and those terminated by exhaustion of rights, are classified according to the ages of the persons who established them. The distribution of ages among males who exhausted their benefit rights indicates again the extent to which males in the older age brackets suffered from longer periods of unemployment than those at younger ages.

The benefit years not terminated by exhaustion were predominantly those carried over from 1942 which lapsed during 1943.

Table 16 distributes the benefit years terminated according to the number of benefit days authorized in each case, cross-classified according to the number of days actually paid. This table can be used to determine the extent to which the days authorized in terminated benefit years were utilized. If all benefit years terminated were terminated by exhaustion of rights, Table 16 would show merely a diagonal line of figures. The distribution of days paid to the left of this diagonal line indicates the extent to which those benefit years which lapsed were utilized.

Table 17 classifies terminated benefit years and the days paid on these benefit years by daily rate of benefit, sex and dependency status of the beneficiary.
