# Preliminary Statistics of Education, 1950-51 

This report presents preliminary statistics on schools, teachers and enrolment for the school year 1950-51 and financial statistics for 1950.

The data on schools, teachers and enrolment are for all types of schools except the institutions of higher education. Preliminary enrolment figures for these institutions are issued separately.

Most of the data on publicly-controlled schools are taken from the annual reports of the provincial Departments of Education. However, where data for 1950-51 are not yet reported it has been necessary to use same estimates.

The data on private schools are from tabulations made from their reports to the Bureau.

The figures appearing in the financial tables have been assembled from various sources and represent a combination of the several fiscal years of the several school systems and governments. Estimates have been entered in a number of places for which actual figures are not available.

As many teachers instruct pupils in both elementary and secondary grades no attempt has been made to divide the number of teachers between the two levels.

With the movement of population to the urban and suburban areas and the growth of the larger school units there has come a decrease in the number of one-room schools sufficient to account for a decrease in the total number of schools.

The above table brings together the anounts spent on formal education. It does not include the sums spent on training such as youth training, apprenticeship etc., nor the expenditure on cultural and other activities such as adult education, libraries and archives, night schools etc.

The provincial governments alone spent nearly $\$ 9$ million on training and over $\$ 3$ million on cultural and other activities.

The above figures include the cost of operating the schools, the annual payments on capital debt and expenditures on new buildings and equipment provided for by current revenues. Omitting Newfoundland the total for 1950 was $\$ 300,630,000$ an increase of 74 per cent of the 1946 total. Between 1946 and 1950 the total for teachers' salaries increased from \$103 million to $\$ 177$ million.

To get the total amount spent on public elementary and secondary education it is necessary to add the amounts, other than grants to school boards, spent on these levels of education by the provinces. This is done in Table 14 。

Except where indicated these are the total provincial grants received as reported by the school boards. They show an increase of 1.9 million or $11 \%$ over the 1949 total and $\$ 0.9$ milion or $97 \%$ over the 1946 total. In 1941 the total of these grants was $\$ 20.8$ million about one fifth of the 1950 total.
