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Preliminary Statistics of Education, 1950-51

This report presents preliminary statistics on schools, teachers and enrolment for the school year 1950-51 and financial statistics for 1950.

The data on schools, teachers and enrolment are for all types of schools except the institutions of higher education. Preliminary enrolment figures for these institutions are issued separately.

Most of the data on publicly-controlled schools are taken from the annual reports of the provincial Departments of Education. However, where data for 1950-51 are not yet reported it has been necessary to use some estimates.

The data on private schools are from tabulations made from their reports to the Bureau.

The figures appearing in the financial tables have been assembled from various sources and represent a combination of the several fiscal years of the several school systems and governments. Estimates have been entered in a number of places for which actual figures are not available.

With the movement of population to the urban and suburban areas and the growth of the larger school units there has come a decrease in the number of one-room schools sufficient to account for a decrease in the total number of schools.

The above figures include the cost of operating the schools, the annual payments on capital debt and expenditures on new buildings and equipment provided for by current revenues. Omitting Newfoundland the total for 1950 was \$300,630,000 an increase of 74 per cent of the 1946 total. Between 1946 and 1950 the total for teachers' salaries increased from \$103 million to \$177 million.

To get the total amount spent on public elementary and secondary education it is necessary to add the amounts, other than grants to school boards, spent on these levels of education by the provinces. This is done in Table 14.
