INTRODUCTION

During the year 1935 a new death certificate was placed in the field throughout the Provinces of Canada. The most important changes were in the medical certificate and in these were certain specific questions regarding violent deaths, which were defined to bring out fuller information in these cases. These questions were as follows:-

If death was due to external causes (violence) fill in also the following:-

Accident, suicide or homicide?.....Date of injury.....19...  
(State which)  
Manner of injury.....  
(How sustained)  
Nature of injury.....  
Specify whether injury occurred in  
industry, in home, or in public place.....

The year 1936 being the first year for which the new certificate was in practically full use, a special study has been made of the accidental deaths of that year, giving details not contained in the regular tables, so far as they were available from the statements on the certificates. This detailed study has been made by Miss Yvonne Baudry, R.N., of the Vital Statistics Branch.

The detailed study, is prefixed by three summary tables:-

Table I presents a cross-classification of the causes of accidental deaths as grouped under the numbers of the International List with the circumstances of the accident, e.g. accidents in mines and quarries, machine accidents, automobile and motorcycle accidents, etc. In the detailed study letters have been used in conjunction with the numbers of the International List to designate the general circumstances, as follows:-

A - Mines and quarries	F - Other land transportation
B - Machinery	G - Water transportation
C - Railway	H - Air transportation
D - Street-car	I - Other accidents
E - Automobile and motorcycle	

Table II classifies the accidental deaths as grouped under the numbers of the International List according to whether they occurred "in home", "in public place" or "in industry". Although this supplementary question has been surprisingly well answered considering the newness of the certificate which contains it, the reply was omitted in a number of cases. In the great majority of these cases, however, the nature of the accident allowed reasonably safe distinction between "home" and "public place" and only 21 accidents have been classified as "not stated" in this respect. The term "public place" is somewhat lacking in definiteness, but may be taken to indicate any environment which is not that of the home, for accidents which were not indicated as industrial.

The Federal Department of Labour publishes yearly a table of fatal accidents in Canada, the material being obtained from various sources. From the fact that the Labour Department's total of fatal industrial accidents during 1936 was 1,043 (1), and

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that the total of accidental deaths in industry in Table II of this report is only 980, it is evident that not all accidents which occurred in industry were so indicated on the death certificates. Nevertheless, investigation has shown that in certain industries, particularly in agriculture, the death certificates have shown a higher number of industrial accidents than the table published by the Labour Department, owing no doubt, to the lack of organized sources from which the Labour Department's figures for these industries could be obtained. Thus these two methods of compiling information regarding industrial accidents will tend to supplement each other. The deaths from industrial accidents in 1936 will be tabulated at a later date by the occupation of the deceased in relation to the cause of death according to the International List.

Table III shows the sex and age-groups of decedents in conjunction with the classification of the accident as occurring "in the home", in public place" or "in industry".

In the detailed study the deaths have been subdivided according to the age-groups listed in Table III in order that it may be possible to observe what types of accidents are particularly characteristic of certain periods of life.

In the age-group of 70 years and over the mention of fractured femurs on death certificates is so frequent that these have been separately compiled and are given in a note on page 30.

An unusual heat wave here in July, 1936, caused 780 deaths as compared with only 42 in July of the preceding year. This heat wave, the fatal results of which were mainly confined to Ontario and Manitoba, lasted about ten days beginning July 8th with 9 deaths and reaching a peak of 162 deaths on July 12th. It was observed by the author of the detailed study that in a great many cases morbid conditions were mentioned on the death certificate as contributing to deaths from excessive heat, and for such deaths the detailed study indicates the nature of these conditions.

The figures in the present report are preliminary and correspond with those of the Preliminary Report on Vital Statistics for 1936. The final total of accidental deaths will, however, add only 14 deaths to the preliminary figure of 6,351.

ACCIDENTAL DEATHS, JANUARY - SEPTEMBER, 1935.

According to a report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the number of accidental deaths in Canada during the first nine months of 1935 was 4,365 as compared with 4,041 during the corresponding period of 1934. The equivalent annual rate was 53.4 per 100,000 population in the nine months of 1935 against 50.0 for the nine months of the preceding year.

The deaths from certain accidental causes are shown for Canada and each province in the table which follows. Automobile accidents include collisions with other vehicles, such as trains, street-cars, etc.
