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

### Acknowledgements

This report is the product of a collaborative effort involving individuals representing government agencies responsible for adult criminal courts in Canada. The Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics gratefully acknowledges the assistance of the Nova Scotia Department of the Attorney General and the departments of justice in Prince Edward Island, Ouebec, and the Yukon.

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### INTRODUCTION

The Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics (CCJS) is the focal point of a federal-provincial/territorial initiative dedicated to the production of national statistics and information on the justice system in Canada. The objective of the Courts Program at CCJS is to collect and disseminate statistical information describing the operation of adult criminal courts and youth courts in Canada.

This report is one of a series of annual data releases produced by the Courts Program from the Adult Criminal Court Survey (ACCS). This report contains data collected to one of the two components of the ACCS - the caseload component. Provincial and territorial criminal court data for Nova Scotia, Quebec, and the Yukon are presented for fiscal years 1990-91 and 1991-92 and for Prince Edward Island from July 1991 to March 1992. The report is designed to provide information on the changing nature of caseload volume and backlog. The Introduction of the report describes the objective, methodology, units of count, and coverage of the Adult Criminal Court Survey. The Caseload Trends section of the report includes a number of tables and charts reporting the caseload volume and backlog trends as evidenced in the ACCS - Caseload database.

The report also includes a number of appendices providing additional information for the benefit of the reader. Contextual information on persons charged by law enforcement agencies, and population estimates are included in Appendix A. The Adult Criminal Court Survey standard definitions for the caseload component form Appendix B. Appendix C, Methodological Notes, provides more detailed information on data quality issues, and the error detection and correction procedures used in the ACCS.

Also available from the Courts Program is the Adult Criminal Court Statistics report which provides more detailed information on the characteristics of provincial/territorial criminal court. The report contains data reported to the case characteristics component of the Adult Criminal Court Survey. The report describes provincial court processes, charge characteristics and outcomes, and basic accused characteristics.

The following pages describe the concepts and methodology used in preparing the adult criminal court data for dissemination.

### **Adult Criminal Court Survey**

### 1.1 Scope

The objective of the Adult Criminal Court Survey (ACCS) is to develop and maintain a national adult criminal court database of statistical information on appearances, charges, and cases. The survey is intended to be a census of completed federal and provincial/territorial statute charges and municipal by-law infractions heard in adult criminal courts in Canada. The Adult Criminal Court Survey has two components: Case Characteristics and Caseload. The Case Characteristics component collects data on charges, appearances, and cases for federal statute offences dealt with in provincial/territorial criminal court. The Caseload component, which is the focus of this report, collects aggregate data on charges, appearances and cases for federal and provincial statutes and municipal by-law offences dealt with in provincial or territorial adult criminal court.

### 1.2 Coverage

Prince Edward Island (5 courts), Nova Scotia (38 courts), Quebec (54 courts), and the Yukon (18 courts) are currently providing data to the ACCS. Together, they account for approximately 23 percent of the provincial/territorial adult criminal court caseload in Canada. Data for Halifax Municipal Court and Liverpool Provincial Court are not available at this time. Approximately 15 percent of Nova Scotia's federal statute charges are heard in these courts. Similarly, data for Quebec's 133 municipal courts are currently not included in the survey. Approximately 20 percent of federal statute charges in Quebec are heard in municipal court.

It is recognized that the absence of national coverage of provincial/territorial counts and the unavailability of data from municipal, superior and appeal courts represent major limitation for some data applications. Implementation of the ACCS at the provincial/territorial criminal court level is the current project priority due to the relatively large caseload at this court level and the extent of information system automation in the provincial and territorial courts. Municipal, superior and appeal courts may be added to the survey as local operational systems become automated and as survey development resources become available.

Currently, the ACCS collects indicators dealing with adult criminal activities at the provincial/territorial court level. Information related to youths raised to adult court under the Young Offenders Act and the summary offence tickets (SOT's) of youths is also included in this report.

### 1.3 Caseload Component

The Caseload Component of the ACCS is designed to collect aggregate information on charges, cases and appearances on a quarterly basis from all jurisdictions in Canada. Counts of cases and charges pending, initiated and disposed of during each quarter are collected by statute type. The total number of court appearances held during the reference period is also collected. All counts of charges are captured while case and case appearance counts are limited to the most serious statute dealt with at the initial appearance.

Data are extracted from the local court system by the ACCS system interface programs. The data are also received by the CCJS in the form of a standard aggregate report for each local court. The survey's reliance on machine readable data facilitates data processing with a minimum of respondent burden.

### 1.4 Units of Count

The data elements collected from provincial court systems are listed below under four unit of count categories (See Appendix B for detailed definitions).

The four caseload units of count are defined as follows:

Charge: An aggregate count of all charge counts dealt with during the reference period (fiscal year quarter). Charges are listed by statute type (federal statutes, provincial statutes, and municipal by-laws). Counts are collected under four categories: Pending at Start, Initiated, Disposed Of and Pending at End. Detailed descriptions of these categories are presented in Appendix B.

Charge - Summary Offence Tickets: An aggregate count of all charges listed on summary offence tickets (SOT's) for the reference period. SOT counts are collected under four categories: Pending at Start, Initiated, Disposed Of and Pending at End.

Case: An aggregate count of all cases dealt with in court during the reference period. A case is one or more charges against an accused where the charges are first presented in the same court on the same date. Each case is counted against the most serious statute (MSS) dealt with on the initial court appearance date and the most serious disposition (MSD).

Appearance: An aggregate count of appearances, by most serious statute, dealt with during the reference period. An appearance is defined as a court appearance by an accused on any given date during the reference period.

### 1.5 Methodological Overview

The caseload component of the ACCS collects aggregate court data on volumes of charges, cases, and appearances from provincial and territorial automated operational systems. These data are extracted using computer interface software and are submitted to the CCJS quarterly. The data undergo assessment procedures on the operation systems in the provinces/territories. The ACCS also submits these caseload data to a limited number of edits, identifying duplicates or missing data, and logical inconsistencies in the relationships among data elements or between time periods. The results of this process form the basis of reports which are produced to monitor data quality.

Data quality procedures are also applied during interface development and data production to assess data limitations and comparability (definitions and units of count). These procedures include an initial data review to look at the relationship between variables and to uncover major problems in the record format or layout. A quantitative assessment of the data is then conducted to see how the values are distributed within the variables. Other manual assessment procedures include: consistency checks using other sources of the same information for example annual reports; and the examination of comparable units of count within the ACCS - Case Characteristics database.

For more detailed information on data quality issues, and the error detection and correction procedures employed in the ACCS, please refer to Appendix C: Methodological Notes.

### 1.6 Data Limitations

ACCS data must be interpreted as indicators of caseload and case characteristics rather than precise measures for several reasons.

Under-reporting -- that is, the degree to which all appearances, charges and cases have been reported to the survey -- is not known. Survey coverage and reporting is monitored and the provinces and territories inform the Courts Program of suspected reporting problems or anomalies wherever possible.

Case data presented in the tables are reported by most serious statute. This type of data representation results in an under-counting of less serious situations.

The ACCS counts a charge more than once for a province or territory under any of the following circumstances: a) if it is stayed and then restarted with different identifiers; b) if it

is waived from one court location to another; or c) if it is committed for trial in Superior Court and then returns to Provincial Court with different identifiers. Due to the aggregate nature of the Caseload counts, these charges cannot be isolated and therefore are included in this report.

The above-mentioned data limitations reduce the possibilities for making accurate links with data from other sectors of the justice system, such as police and corrections. Differences in sectoral policies, administration, definitions and data collection methods may also result in differences in counts. For these reasons, caution must be exercised when comparing ACCS data with data from other sectors of the criminal justice system.

### 1,7 Comparability of ACCS Caseload Data and Case Characteristics

Readers are cautioned that counts for completed charges and cases contained in this report are not directly comparable with similar counts presented in ACCS reports from the Case Characteristics component. The following technical differences should be noted when examining similar counts from the two survey components:

- a) The Caseload component considers bench warrants as final dispositions such that any subsequent appearances constitute the beginning of new charges or a new case. The Case Characteristics component, however, considers any appearances subsequent to a bench warrant as being related to the original charge or case. This results in higher counts for Caseload than for Case Characteristics.
- b) The Caseload component reflects aggregate data from the provincial and territorial case management databases while the Case Characteristics component processes the data to eliminate uninterpretable or duplicate records, corrects errors and imputes some missing data. This may cause the Caseload counts to differ from the Case Characteristics counts.
- c) The two ACCS components employ different rules for counting cases having multiple charges. While the Case Characteristics component employs a most serious offence rule for this purpose, the Caseload component uses a most serious statute rule.
- d) The data for both survey components may be extracted at different times from the provincial/territorial operational systems. While Case Characteristics data may be extracted on a monthly basis, Caseload data are generally extracted on a semi-annual basis. Counts for either component may be influenced by updates or corrections made at any time in the provincial and territorial databases.
- e) Charges committed for trial in Superior Court are included in this report but are not available in the 1991 Adult Criminal Court Statistics report.

### 1.8 Comparisons Across Provinces and Territories

Inter-provincial and territorial differences may be observed in the data included in this report. These differences may in part be the result of variation in court operations and recording procedures, interpretation of statutes or legal concepts, sentencing practices and demographics. For this reason, caution should be exercised when comparing data for different provinces and territories.

### 1.9 Comparability of ACCS Data to Data for Other Sectors of the Criminal Justice System

Police counts from the Uniform Crime Reporting Survey(UCR) for offences cleared by charge are lower than counts for charges disposed of in provincial/territorial court contained in this report. This is the result of scoring rules applied in creating the counts of offences cleared by charge for the UCR Survey. Violent offences are counted by the UCR Survey in terms of the number of victims in the incident and non-violent offences are counted in terms of the number of separate incidents. Furthermore, the UCR Survey counts of offences do not rely on the number of persons charged. Therefore one UCR offence may result in more than one charge presented in court. For example, one UCR incident of break and enter involving two accused, would result in at least two charges of break and enter and could include more if other charges are laid for theft, possession of stolen property, etc. Since the ACCS does not use such scoring rules in creating charge counts, the charge counts reported for the courts tend to be higher than the counts from the Uniform Crime Reporting Survey.

Police counts for adult accused are generally higher than the counts of cases disposed of in provincial/territorial court contained in this report. This is in part explained by the fact that one or more charges for a case may be screened out of the system at the prosecutorial stage. Diversion and alternative dispute resolution activities may also reduce the number of cases heard in court. Finally, the time lag between the charging of an accused and the disposal of a case by the courts may result in differences in accused counts indicated in police statistics and courts statistics for cases disposed of in the same reference period.

Differences in indicators across sectors within a province or territory also result from definitional differences in counts being reported and differences in data collection, derivation, and tabulation methods.

The number of elements captured by the Caseload Component of the ACCS permits the development of a wide range of data presentations. For the purpose of this report, selected volume indicators are presented at the provincial/territorial level. This section includes a review of the volume measures for initiated and disposed of charge and case counts as well as case-appearance counts. The text is accompanied by the relevant tables.

### 2.1 Volume Indicators

### 2.1.1 <u>Initiated Charges and Cases</u> - Tables 1 to 2(d)

Charge and case counts presented in this section are aggregate measures of criminal court workload initiated during the reference periods. The term "initiated" is used to describe charges and cases that have been introduced to the court process in a first appearance during the reference periods. Totals are also displayed by major statute type.

### 2.1.2 Disposed of Charges and Cases - Tables 3 to 5

Charge and case counts presented in this section are aggregate indicators of criminal court workload disposed of during the reporting periods. The term "disposed of" is used to describe charges and cases that have been processed (and have received a disposition) in court during the reference periods. This section presents the volume of counts disposed of at the provincial/territorial court level for charges, summary offence tickets (SOT's) and cases; the variation in counts over the available reference periods; and the types of dispositions handed down by the courts.

Case counts are tabulated using the most serious statute (MSS) rule whereby an individual is only counted once for the most serious of charges being heard at the first appearance. Therefore, the counts of actual charge dispositions will not match the case count distribution of dispositions.

### 2.1.3 <u>Case-Appearances</u> - Table 6

The term "case-appearance" refers to the number of court appearances made by an accused during the reference period. A person appearing in court on three different days during the same reference period would equal three case appearances. Case appearances are counted as trial or non-trial. Non-trial appearances include judicial interim release hearings, first appearances and sentencing hearings.

Information on case-appearances provides a measure of the actual utilization of court facilities (i.e., every appearance before the courts is captured).

This section reviews the case appearances in terms of the volume of appearances by hearing types and by statute types; and, the change in counts over time.

### 2.2 Process/Backlog Indicators

### 2.2.1 <u>Difference in Initiated and Disposed of</u> - Tables 7 to 8(d)

The absolute difference between initiated and disposed of counts in each reference period provides information on the state of caseload backlog. This process indicator measures in absolute terms the quarterly change in backlog (i.e., the caseload being added or removed from backlog). This information is presented by statute type.

### 2.2.2 Charges and Cases Pending at End - Table 9

This section examines the measurable backlog in the provincial/territorial criminal courts in Canada. The term "pending at end" is used in this section to refer to that workload which passes from one quarter to the next without being disposed. Table 9 presents the absolute volume of charges and cases pending at end of each reference period by province and by statute type.

### **APPENDIX B:**

### ACCS-CASELOAD COMPONENT DEFINITIONS

### **ELEMENT DEFINITIONS**

Federal Statutes: Acts and regulations, including the Criminal Code, enacted by Parliament and relating to matters within the authority of the federal government under the <u>Constitution Act</u>. Federal statutes will be classified according to four headings; Criminal Code, Narcotic Control Act, Food and Drugs Act and Other Federal Statutes.

Provincial Statutes: Acts, ordinances and regulations enacted by a provincial or territorial legislature relating to matters within the authority of the provincial or territorial government, excluding Municipal By-Laws. The statutes for display are Traffic, Liquor and Other Provincial Statutes. Specific to each jurisdiction, all related Acts, Ordinances and Regulations will need to be determined for the Traffic and Liquor categories.

Municipal By-Laws: Acts and Regulations enacted by a municipal council relating to matters within the authority of the municipal government.

Reference Periods - Quarters: The four quarters within a year with a span of three consecutive months. The four quarters commence with the months of January, April, July and October.

Court Level: Level of court at which hearings take place. The current focus is on provincial/territorial courts which hear criminal matters, but future project development could include all other levels of court.

Court Location: Location of provincial/territorial court at which the appearance takes place, or in the case of summary offence tickets, the court location from which the ticket is issued.

### **Units of Count**

This aggregate survey is an adult criminal court survey and the units of count, with two exceptions, deal with <u>adult</u> criminal activities at the provincial/territorial court level. Youths raised to adult court under the Young Offenders Act, by virtue of the seriousness of their crimes, are counted as this represents workload for the adult provincial court within the scope of this survey. The second exception involves charge counts for summary offence tickets.

These are counted for both young offenders and adults.

## Charges:

The Caseload component includes an aggregate total of all charges dealt with during the reference period. Charges are listed by statute type (federal statutes, provincial/territorial statutes, and municipal by-laws) and by court location. Charges not resulting in a court appearance are excluded from the survey.

By way of example, twenty break and enter charges against person A result in twenty charges being recorded by the survey under the federal statute category. Further, five criminal code charges and two provincial statute charges against person B result in five federal statute and two provincial statute charges being recorded by the survey.

"Charges" are collected under four separate headings: Pending at Start; Initiated; Disposed Of; and Pending at End. These are described below.

Pending at Start: Charges resulting in a court appearance in any previous reference period, but not yet disposed of at the beginning of the current reference period. Charges stayed or bench warranted in a previous reference period are not included in Pending at Start counts.

Initiated: Charges having a <u>first court appearance</u> taking place during the reference period. It also includes initial appearances for charges transferred from another court or court level (i.e. superior court) within the province, charges transferred from outside the province/territory and charges which, after being stayed or bench warranted in a previous or current reference period, have been restarted during the reporting period.

Disposed Of Counts: A charge is considered as being <u>disposed of</u> for the purposes of the caseload component of ACCS if it contains any one of the disposed of types listed below within the reference period.

The disposed of category is sub-categorized as follows:

- 1. Stayed (includes adjourned sine die);
- 2. Withdrawn;
- 3. \* Dismissed/Discharged at preliminary hearing;
- 4. \*\* Guilty plea;

- 5. \*\*\* Found guilty;
- 6. Found not guilty (acquitted of offence charged,

acquitted on account of insanity);

- 7. Bench warrant;
- 8. Other (committed for trial in superior court,

waived out of province, waived in province,

quashed, nullity,

unfit to stand trial,

defence raises Charter argument).

- \* "Discharged" under the 3. Dismissed/Discharged sub-category refers only to charges discharged at preliminary inquiry. Absolute or conditional discharge occurring after the finding of guilt would be counted under the 5. Found guilty sub-category.
- \*\* "Guilty Plea" indicates the accused pleaded guilty and the court accepted the plea.
- \*\*\* "Found Guilty" indicates the accused's guilt is based on the facts against him and not on plea information.

**Pending at End:** Charges initiated in the current or any previous reference period but which have not been disposed of by the end of the current reference period. <u>Pending at End</u> is derived by adding all <u>Pending at Start</u> plus <u>Initiated</u> charges, and subtracting all charges <u>Disposed of during</u> the reference period.

## **Charges: Summary Offence Tickets**

The Caseload component also includes an aggregate count of all offences listed on summary offence tickets (SOTs) dealt with during the reference period. SOTs will be collected under four separate headings described below.

Pending at Start: Charges initiated with the <u>issuance</u> of a SOT in any previous reference period, but not yet disposed of at the beginning of the current reference period. Charges stayed

or bench warranted in a previous reference period are not included in pending at start counts. SOTs issued to an accused near the end of the preceding reference period, for which the scheduled court date falls in the reporting period, are also counted under Pending at Start.

Initiated: SOTs issued to accused during the reference period based on <u>date of issuance</u> to the accused. Initiated includes charges stayed or bench warranted in a previous or current reference period that are restarted during the reporting period.

**Disposed Of:** A SOT is considered as being <u>disposed of</u> for the purposes of ACCS if it contains any one of the disposed of types listed below and if it has no subsequent provincial court appearances in the court location at which it received the disposition.

The disposed of category is sub-categorized as follows:

1. Voluntary payment (voluntary payment, effort or agreement to pay prior to the appearance date);

2. Deemed guilty (automatic conviction);

3. Found guilty (includes guilty plea);

4. Found not guilty (acquitted of offence charged);

5. Bench warrant;

6. Other (stayed,

withdrawn, dismissed, discharged,

waived out of province, waived in province,

quashed, nullity, cancelled).

**Pending at End:** Charges initiated in the current or any previous reference period but which have not been disposed of at the end of the current reference period. <u>Pending at End</u> is derived by adding all <u>Pending at Start</u> plus <u>Initiated</u> charges, and subtracting all charges <u>Disposed Of during</u> the reference period.

#### Cases:

An aggregate count of all cases dealt with in court during the reference period.

In order to properly tabulate the cases and case appearances units of count, a Most Serious Statute (MSS) rule and a Most Serious Disposition (MSD) rule are used.

The first rule entails identifying the Most Serious Statute where two or more related charges are involved, and counting the case against the most serious statute. Charges including SOT charges, are considered <u>related</u> if they have the same accused identification, court location and first appearance date. For example, a case may involve several related charges, all having the same initial court date. The case will be counted only once against the most serious statute. Further, the case will be counted only once during the reference period regardless of the number of court appearances.

The statute hierarchy from most to least serious is as follows:

- 1. Federal Statutes
  - a. Criminal Code
  - b. Narcotic Control Act
  - c. Food and Drugs Act
  - d. Other
- 2. Provincial Statutes
  - a. Traffic
  - b. Liquor
  - c. Other
- 3. Municipal By-laws (all).

The second rule entails identifying the Most Serious Disposition when two or more related charges have the same most serious statute. The case is counted against the appropriate disposition category based on the seriousness of the disposition and is used after the Most Serious Statute category has been determined. For example, a case involves three charges, a robbery (CCC) charge, an assault (CCC) charge and a possession of drugs (NCA) charge. The disposition for the robbery charge is found not guilty, but there is a disposition of guilty for the assault and the drug offence. In applying the MSS rule, the case is counted under CCC statute. The MSD rule is needed because there were two CCC offences with different dispositions (found not guilty for the robbery charge and found guilty for the assault charge). Based on the MSD rule, the disposition found guilty is more serious than found not guilty and therefore the case disposition is to be counted under found guilty.

The complete hierarchy from most to least serious is as follows:

- 1. Found Guilty (335)
- 2. Guilty Plea (334)
- 3. Other (338)
- 4. Stayed (331)
- 5. Found Not Guilty (336)
- 6. Dismissed/Discharged (333)
- 7. Withdrawn (332)
- 8. Bench Warrant (337).

Pending at Start: Cases for which the first appearance occurred in a previous reference period and for which related charges have not all been disposed of by the start of the current reference period. Pending at start does not include counts of cases where the most serious statute was stayed or bench warranted prior to the reference period.

Initiated: Cases for which the <u>first appearance</u> occurred in the current reference period. Initiated charges include charges that were stayed or bench warranted in previous or current reference period and restarted during the current reference period. Cases Initiated count derived from a SOT, is calculated the same way as if it is derived from a Charge. However, if the SOT charge is disposed of by "Voluntary Payment" prior to the first appearance date, then no Cases Initiated count is included.

Disposed Of: Cases for which the first appearance occurred in the current or any previous reference period and the last of the cases's related charges has received a final disposition during the current reference period. Disposition types are the same eight as those listed under the Charges unit of count. Again if a SOT is disposed of by "Voluntary Payment" prior to the first appearance date, then no Cases Disposed of count is included.

Pending at End: Cases for which the first appearance occurred in the current or any previous reference period and all related charges have not been disposed of by the end of the current reference period. Pending at End is derived by adding all Pending at Start plus Initiated cases, and subtracting all cases Disposed Of during the reference period.

## **Case Appearances:**

An aggregate count of case appearances, by most serious statute, during the reference period. A case appearance is defined as a court appearance by an accused on any given date during the

reference period. For example, an accused appearing in court on three different days during the same reference period would equal three case appearances. Similarly, if two accused involved in similar charges having the same first appearance date appeared in court on three different days during the same reference period, a count of six case appearances would be registered by the survey.

Non-trial: Includes appearances for all judicial interim release (bail) hearings, preliminary hearings, fitness hearings, and first appearances or subsequent appearances which are not trial appearances. This includes appearances held for sentencing purposes.

Trial: Includes appearances for all trial hearings. One person appearing in a given calendar day for a trial hearing will count as one trial appearance. Two persons appearing in the same calendar day for the same trial will count as two trial appearances.

## APPENDIX C

#### **METHODOLOGICAL NOTES**

## Stages of Data Flow and Sources of Error

The ACCS caseload data contained in this and other similar reports have undergone numerous types of processing since the original data collection took place in the court room. Each process may have introduced the possibility for error, or a difference between the original court event and the final tabulated data.

The following is a description of the three basic stages of data flow for the ACCS and the types of errors which may be introduced at each stage.

## Stage 1. Collection of the Original Data

The initial stage involves the recording of court proceedings in some form of docket.

Response and Measurement Error: Provinces and territories or court locations within the same province or territory may differ in terms of court operations and recording procedures, interpretation of statutes or legal concepts and sentencing practices.

Non-response Error: Data pertaining to some ACCS variables may not be collected if it is not required for operational and administrative purposes.

Data Coding Errors: There may be clerical errors in the recording of court proceedings.

## Stage 2. Jurisdictional Processing of the Original Data

Data from court dockets are captured into the provincial and territorial automated operational systems. From there they are loaded into the automated management information system files of the provinces and territories.

Coverage Error: Data for certain court locations may not be captured for inclusion in the automated files.

Non-response Errors: Data pertaining to some ACCS variables may not be captured for inclusion in the automated operational systems, even though they exist in the court dockets.

Data coding and capture Errors: There may be clerical errors or delays in the coding of data on the docket or in the transformation of data from the docket into a machine-readable format.

Edit and Imputation Errors: The edit and imputation rules may be misinterpreted or they may be too strict or too lax.

System Errors: Processing of operational system files or management information system files may introduce some error.

## Stage 3. Transcription of Information into ACCS Format

Interface software selects the applicable records from automated court operational systems or management information systems in the provinces and territories. Then the records are transcribed into the ACCS format and sent to CCJS for processing.

System Errors: ACCS interface software specifications may be incorrect or misinterpreted or the interface software itself may be incorrect.

Coverage Errors: The ACCS interface software could extract unwanted records or miss records that should be covered by the survey.

## **ACCS Tools for Assuring Data Quality**

A number of tools have been developed by the ACCS to minimize or correct the errors identified above.

## **ACCS Edit System**

The edit system is the main tool developed by the ACCS to identify and correct errors in the data and to guide interface software development. Erroneous data processed by the ACCS Edit System may result in any one of the following outcomes:

## a) Data are Rejected

Three types of errors cause data to be rejected: missing units of count; invalid units of count, court level or court identifier; duplicate records.

#### b) A Warning is Issued

This occurs when there are inconsistencies in the combination of data elements, data missing in optional secondary fields or incorrect coding.

Data quality reports, which describe the nature and extent of these errors, are sent to each province/territory. Follow-up conversations are held to discuss the issues and problems identified and to find possible solutions.

## Interface Software Development Methodology

It has been identified above that system error may be introduced during the extraction and transcription of provincial or territorial data into ACCS format. The ACCS has attempted to minimize this possibility by implementing a standard interface development methodology which requires a complete testing of the software by both the ACCS and the province or territory before implementation of the software. Interface development must proceed through the following stages:

- a) The feasibility of developing interface software is investigated. A test environment is established in the operational system of the province or territory to assist in the feasibility investigation and in the development of interface software.
- b) Provincial or territorial data elements are mapped to the ACCS data requirements.
- c) The interface software is run in the test environment using test data and the results are verified by both the ACCS and the province or territory. Any differences between actual and expected results are identified and the required corrections are made.
- d) The interface software is run in the production environment and the results are verified by both the province or territory and ACCS. Any errors are identified and the required corrections are made.
- e) An evaluation exercise is undertaken to assess the extent to which the data extracted by the interface match the data contained in the original provincial or territorial court files and automated operational system files. The results of the evaluation exercise will fulfil the additional function of permitting the investigation of response errors, or discrepancies between the final published data and the original recording of the court event.

# Data Quality Issues Arising from Provincial and Territorial Systems

Certain limitations are imposed on the quality of ACCS data due to the fact that they are byproducts of provincial and territorial automated operational systems. Errors in the design, development, and implementation of provincial and territorial systems may diminish the quality of the ACCS data.

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
